





AC voltage selection

This unit operates on 110 - 120 or 220 - 240 volts AC. The AC voltage selector switch Type A or Type B on the rear panel is set to the voltage that prevails in the area to which the unit is shipped. Before connecting the power cord to your AC outlet, make sure that the setting position of this switch matches your line voltage. If not, it must be set to your voltage in accordance with the following direction.

Move switch lever to match your line voltage with a small screwdriver or other pointed tool.

- Power sources The unit should be connected to a power supply only of the type described in the operating instructions or as marked on the appliance.
- 2. Power-cord protection Power-supply cords should be routed so that they are not likely to be walked on or pinched by items placed upon or against them, pay particular attention to cords at plugs, convenience receptacles, and the point where they exit from the unit.




- 13.Nonuse periods The power cord of the unit should be unplugged from the outlet when left unused for a long period of time.
- 14. Abnormal smell If an abnormal smell or smoke is detected, immediately turn the power OFF and pull out the power cord. Contact your dealer or nearest service center.



- **15.Damage requiring service** The unit should be serviced by qualified service personnel when:
 - **A.** The power-supply cord or the plug has been damaged; or
 - **B.** Objects have fallen, or liquid has been spilled into the unit; or
 - C. The unit has been exposed to rain; or
 - **D.** The unit does not appear to operate normally or exhibits a marked change in performance; or
 - **E.** The unit has been dropped, or the enclosure damaged.
- 16. Servicing The user should not attempt to service the unit beyond that described in the operating instructions. All other servicing should be referred to qualified service personnel.

17. Outdoor antenna grounding — If an outside an tenna is connected to the receiver, be sure the antenna system is grounded so as to provide some protection against voltage surges and built up static charges. Section 810 of the National Electrical Code, ANSI/NFPA 70, provides information with respect to proper grounding of the mast and supporting structure, grounding of the lead-in wire to an antenna discharge unit, size of grounding conductors, location of antenna-discharge unit, connection to grounding electrodes, and requirements for the grounding electrode. - 18.Power lines An outdoor antenna should be located away from power lines.
- 19.AC outlets Do not connect other audio equipment with a power consumption larger than that specified to the AC outlet on the rear panel. Never connect other electrical units, such as an iron or toaster, to it to prevent fire or electric shock.



System connections

Make connections as shown in the diagram below. When connecting the related system components, refer also to the instruction manuals of the related components.


Do not plug in the power lead until all connections are completed.

■ Connection of audio components



- 1. Connect all cords firmly. If connections are loose, there could be loss of sound or noise produced.
- 2. Do not connect up a power source which is larger than that indicated on the socket at the rear of the unit.
- When plugging and unplugging connection cords, be sure to first remove the power cord from the AC outlet. Plugging / unplugging connection cords without removal of the power cord can cause malfunctions or damage to the unit.
- 4. Never short-circuit the + and speaker cords.
- 5. If the left and right speakers are connected inversely or if the speaker cords are connected with reversed polarity, the sound becomes unnatural with ambiguous acoustic image positioning. Be sure to connect the speakers and speaker cords correctly.






■ AM loop antenna connection




■ AM outdoor antenna connection


FM DE-EMPHASIS/CHANNEL SPACE switch (Except for some areas)

The FM DE-EMPHASIS/ CHANNEL SPACE switch on the rear panel is set to the correct setting that prevails in the area to which the unit is shipped. However, if the FM DE-EMPHASIS/ CHANNEL SPACE settling is not matched to the area where the unit is to be used; for instance, when you move from area 1 to area 2 or vice versa, desired reception of AM/ FM broadcasts is not expected. In this case, change the FM DE-EMPHASIS/ CHANNEL SPACE setting in accordance with the area corresponding to the table. The FM DE-EMPHASIS is switched over at the same time.



■ Connection for system control operation

Using the system control cords provided with KENWOOD system component models, make connections as shown below.



CD player

By connecting this unit to KENWOOD cassette deck, CD player and turntable models equipped with system control jacks, the following integrated operation features become available.

1. Automatic play operation

When starting play with the turntable, cassette deck, or CD player connected to the receiver, press the desired input selector keys on the receiver. The turntable, cassette deck, or CD player will automatically enter play mode.

In the same way, pressing the Play key of the turntable, cassette deck, or CD player will automatically switch the input selector on the receiver to the component on which the Play key is pressed.

2. Synchro recording


To record the sound from the CD player or turntable onto a tape with the cassette deck, press the CD or PHONO of the input selector keys and load a CD or record. Set the cassette deck to rec pause mode, then press the Play (start) key of the CD player or turntable. The cassette deck will start recording automatically, synchronized with the CD player or turntable starting play.

3. Remote control


The remote control unit provided with this unit, to which a KENWOOD system, cassette deck, or CD player is connected, is equipped with related control keys. The related components can be controlled using these keys.




Controls and indicators



SPEAKERS A and B keys A, B OFF — This position silences all speakers to permit private use of headphones. A ON — Activates speakers connected to the SPEAKERS A terminals on the rear panel. B ON — Activates the speakers connected to the SPEAKERS B terminals on the rear panel. A, B ON — Activates the speakers connected to the SPEAKERS A and B terminals simultaneously. • If you press the DOLBY PRO LOGIC key, DOLBY 3 STEREO key when both the A and B SPEAKERS switches are ON, the unit will automatically switch to A so that sound is heard only from the A speakers. Pressing the B key at this time will switch the sound so that it is heard from the B speakers only.

Display



STAND BY mode of POWER key

When the power cord of this system is plugged into an AC outlet, the STAND BY indicator lights up regardless of the ON / OFF setting of the POWER key. This indicates that a small amount of current is being supplied to the unit to back up the memory contents. This mode is referred to as the Stand By mode. While the STAND BY indicator is lit, the power of the system can be switched ON / OFF from the remote control unit.

Remote control operation

In addition to the remote control of the receiver unit, the provided remote control unit can control a KENWOOD cassette tape deck, CD player, turntable, etc., connected via the KENWOOD system control cords.

■ Loading batteries

1 Remove the cover. · While gently pressing the cover located on the rear of the remote control unit, slide it in the direction of the Insert batteries. Make sure that the batteries are inserted as indicated with the polarity marking on the bottom. The batteries provided are to be used for checking the remote control operations. Their service life may be short. Close the cover.




- If two or more remote control operation keys are to be pressed successively, press each key securely and leave an interval of more than 1 second between presses.

 Pressing a key immediately after pressing another key may cause malfunction.
- Malfunction may occur in case direct sunlight or the light of a high-frequency lighting fluorescent lamp enters the remote control light receptor. In such a case, change the installation position of the unit so that the malfunction does not occur.





LOUDNESS control


Listening at high volume allows to enjoy dynamic sound, but human ears tend to feel low frequencies insufficient when listening at low volume. When the VOLUME CONTROL is set to a low position, the insufficiency of low frequencies felt by human ears can be compensated by turning the LOUDNESS control clockwise.


Surround effect

The powerful feeling of enveloping sound experienced in places such as movie theaters is due to the fact that sound comes from not only in front but also from the periphery. To reproduce this type of feeling, this unit incorporates surround decoder. To extract the maximum surround effect, read this instruction manual thoroughly and adjust the system to match the configuration of your listening room.







- Calculate the proper delay time for Dolby Surround by referring to the illustration below.
- The delay time can be adjusted in the range from 16 to 29 ms.
- When the DELAYTIME key is pressed a delay time appears on the display. It varies every time the key is pressed.
- 15 ms ↔ 20 ms ↔ 23 ms ↔ 26 ms ↔ 29 ms
 Once a delay time is set, it is automatically held in memory so the same delay time is displayed whenever Dolby Surround is switched ON later.







- If you cannot identify whether your center speaker is of the medium or compact size, try both the NORMAL and WIDE BAND mode and use the one that can provide better sound positioning.
- PHANTOM: Use this mode when the center speaker is not used.
 - Even without the center speaker, the signal is processed in a simulated manner to ensure proper center image positioning and provide the enjoyment of Dolby Surround.




Surround Information Memory

The Surround Information Memory function allows to store up to four sets of Surround information.


