Important Safety Instructions For Your Display

- 1. Read and apply the operating instructions provided with your display.
- 2. Read all of the instructions given here and retain them for later use.
- 3. Follow all warning and instructions marked on the display.
- 4. WARNING: To reduce the risk of fire or electric shock, do not expose this appliance to rain or moisture.
- 5. WARNING: Because the temperature of the lamp is high immediately after use, direct contact with the lamp may cause burns. Do not replace the lamp module until it is cooled down
- 6. Caution: To prevent electric shock do not use this (polarized) plug with a receptacle or other outlet unless the blades can be fully inserted to prevent blade exposure.
- 7. Unplug this display from the wall outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners. Use a dry cloth for cleaning.
- 8. Do not use attachments/accessories not recommended by the manufacturer as they may cause hazards.
- 9. Do not use this display near water. For example: avoid placing it in or near a bathtub, kitchen sink, laundry tub, wet basement, swimming pool, etc.
- 10. Do not place this display on an unstable cart, stand or table. The display may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the appliance. Use only with a cart or stand recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the display.
- An appliance and cart combination shall be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the appliance and cart combination to topple.
- 12. Slots and openings in the cabinet and the back or bottom are provided for ventilation, to insure reliable operation of the display and to protect it from overheating. These openings must not be blocked or covered. There should be at least 2-inches of clearance from these openings. Never block the openings by placing the display on bed, sofa, rug or other similar surface. Never place this display near or over a radiator, or heat registers, stoves or other apparatus (including amplifiers) that produce heat.
- 13. Operate only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supplied, contact your television dealer or local power company.
- 14. This display is equipped with a polarized alternating-current line plug (a plug having one blade wider than the other). This plug will fit into the power outlet only one way. This is a safety feature. If you are unable to insert the plug fully into the outlet, try reversing the plug. If the plug still doesn't fit, contact your electrician to replace your obsolete outlet. Do not defeat the safety purpose of the polarized plug.
- 15. Do not allow anything to rest on or pinch the power cord. Do not locate this display where the cord could be stepped on.
- 16. Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in fire or electric shock.
- 17. Never push objects of any kind into this display through cabinet openings. This could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the display.

- 18. If an outside antenna is connected to the television equipment, be sure the antenna system is grounded so as to provide some protection against voltage surges and built up static charges. In the U.S., Section 810 of the National Electrical Code provides information with respect to proper grounding of the mast and supporting structure, grounding of the lead-in wire to an antenna discharge unit, size of grounding conductors, location of antenna-discharge unit, connection to grounding electrodes, and requirements for the grounding electrodes.
- 19. For additional safety during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet and disconnect the antenna. This will prevent damage to the receiver due to lightning and power-line surges.
- 20. An outside antenna system should not be located in the vicinity of overhead power lines or other electric light or power circuits, or where it can fall into such power lines or circuits. When installing an outside antenna system extreme care should be taken to avoid touching any power lines or circuits as contact with them could cause fatal injuries.
- 21. Unplug this display from the wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:

 - c. If the display has been exposed to rain or water.
 - d. If the display does not operate normally by follow the operating instructions. 



Battery Installation

1. Place the remote control face down and remove the battery cover.




2. Insert two "AAA" size batteries, matching the + and - signs on each battery cell with the corresponding signs in the battery compartment.



3. Slide the battery cover shut until the lock clicks.

This remote control is capable of generating discrete IR codes. Discrete IR codes allow you to control a specific function by sending a direct command from the remote control, instead of having to use multiple onscreen menus to achieve the same result. This enhances control over frequently used functions that do not have specific key commands on the remote control. This is especially useful if you want to program these IR codes of this remote control to a "learning" universal remote control.



video sources to the AV connectors at the same time.



Your display is designed to accept and display a wide range of video programs and signal sources, including VHS, DVD, HDTV, video game consoles, and regular TV broadcasts. It is important to ensure that your external devices are properly connected to your display to ensure an optimum viewing experience.

Connecting Cable TV / Antenna

Connect your cable TV cable or antenna cable to either of the ANT inputs (ANT-1 Input, ANT-2 Input)



- For your convenience, this TV is bundled with a RF splitter and short RF cable, so that you can connect both your TV and VCR so that you can connect additional devices to one RF source.

Connecting to a Computer/Notebook

If you would like to connect the unit to a computer, you can choose to connect as following:


- 1. If your computer has a DVI-D output, connect it to the PC1 input
- 2. If you have a notebook computer, it is probably more convenient to connect it using the PC2 input on the front
- 3. If your computer has a RGB output, it can be connected to HD1 or HD2 or PC2. A VGA to RGBHV BNC cable is needed for HD1. A VGA to RGBHV RCA cable is needed for HD2. Or it can be connected directly using a VGA cable to PC2 input in the front



- Please carefully review all sections of the accompanying manual pertaining to the connection of external devices.
- Before attempting to connect the unit to any external device, be sure to power down any secondary power sources.

Connecting Video Game Units

To connect a video game console to the display, you can either connect it to the AV1 or AV2 connector on the rear connector panel, or you can use the AV3 connectors located on the front connector panel.




- If your video game console has an S-video output, we recommend connecting to the display instead, as this will provide superior picture quality.
- If your video game console has an YPbPr option, connect it to HD1 or HD2 for even better picture quality.

Connecting to High-definition Picture Sources

If you have a D-VHS unit or a digital receiver , connect it to the display using the HD1 or HD2 connector jacks on the rear of the display.

If your digital receiver has a DVI output, you can connect it to PC1.




Connecting VCR

Your VCR may have different kinds of outputs like RF, composite video and S-Video. Normally S-Video delivers the best video quality, RF output delivers lower quality video.

If S-Video is available, connect the S-Video output of your VCR to AV1, AV2 or AV3. If S-Video is not available, connect the composite video output on your VCR to AV1, AV2 or AV3. Connect the RF output of your VCR to ANT-2 of the TV if this is the only output available or if the VCR is located very far away from the TV.

If your VCR has a composite video input and you want to record the TV station you are currently watching, you can optionally connect the AV output of this TV to the video input and audio input of your VCR.



Note

Your VCR can only record video if the main TV source is ANT-1 or ANT-2. If the main TV source is AV1, AV2 or AV3, only composite video is connected, and the video is not copy protected, then your VCR can also record it. Other higher quality video sources cannot output signals to this composite output for recording even if they are selected.

Connecting a DVD Player


The RD 50/65 is equipped with state-of-the-art deinterlacing circuitry that is superior to the technology provided in most DVD players. The recommended input for DVD players is the SD input with DVD player output mode set to 480i.

Furthermore, please make sure the TV-type or TV aspect ratio is selected as widescreen (16:9) on the DVD player. The TV will work fine even if the TV's aspect ratio is set to the DVD player's default 4:3 ratio. However, the DVD player itself will output video at 33% lower resolution in 4:3 mode when playing back a 16:9 enhanced movie.

If you have a good progressive scan DVD player, you can connect the component video to either HD1 or HD2.


If your DVD player only has an S-Video or composite video output, connect it to the AV1, AV2 or AV3 of the TV. For better quality, only use composite video when the other options are not available.

Connect the DVD player's analog audio output (left and right channel) to the TV's audio input for the video source intended for DVD player.




- If your DVD player has 5.1 channel output and you want to use the TV speakers as central speakers, you can connect only the central speaker output to either the left or right channel of the TV and then select mono mode on the onscreen display menu for audio. Refer to the "Adjust the Audio" section for more details.
- •Once the DVD player has been properly connected and you are ready to beginning viewing your DVD program, remember to use the remote control to select the video source connected.

Power On

Step 1

Attach the power cord to the RD50/65.

Step 2

Switch on the main power switch located at the left side of the display.

Press the power button on the front panel or remote control to turn on the display. The display will turn on after warm up in about 30 seconds.

Power Off

Press the power button on the front panel or remote control once to turn off the display. The screen will go blank immediately but it will take about 2 minute to cool down and then shutdown the whole system

Unless the display is not going to be used for an extended period of time, the main power switch can be left in the ON position without consuming a lot of power.

Except in case of emergency, it is not recommended to use the main power switch to power off the system. The lamp life may be severely reduced if the system is not allowed to cooled down properly by abruptly shutting down the system using the main power switch.


The power button toggles between power on and power off. Please refer to the Discrete IR code section for user who need the separate IR power on and power off IR code.

Note

• During the final phase of the cool down period the system will not respond to any power on or off commands. Wait until the LED stops blinking to power up the display again.

Getting Started: Automatic Channel Programming


Before you can begin watching regular television programs, you will need to run automatic channel programming. Channel programs cannot be performed when the main picture is not receiving a TV broadcast. The whole process may take a few minutes but normally only needs to be done once on initial set up.





- Press any key on the remote control unit (except for POWER) to stop the automated channel testing cycle.
- The whole process may take a few minutes but normally only needs to be done once.

Channel Add and Erase

Your RD50/65 allows you to manually add or remove channels from the lineup. When you press "CH up" or "CH down", it advances to the next channel broadcasting a signal. You can skip a channel, such as one you never watch, using the Erase feature. You can add a channel, such as one that wasn't initially detected or was previously erased, using the Add feature.











Setting the Clock_

The internal clock must be manually set by the user. (The internal clock must be reset whenever the display's main power source has been turned off or when the power cord has been disconnected from the power outlet.)







Setting the Sleep Timer

The sleep timer is used when you would like to have the display automatically turn itself off after a set period of time.


Set the sleep timer with the SLEEP button on your remote control. Press SLEEP until the desired length of time is displayed. You can select 10, , , , or 120 minute sleep sessions. The TV will turn off automatically after the preset time.

If you want to disable SLEEP before the TV turns itself off, press SLEEP until the Off message is displayed on the screen.




Setting Your Favorite Channels

If you routinely view the same set of channels, you can choose to save those channels in a list of favorite channels. You can then view these channels or scan through the programs on these channels directly by accessing the FAVORITE CH list. A total of 20 favorite channels can be selected.


To do so, simply use CH Up or CH Down to tune to your favorite channel, then press Favorite CH Add on your remote control.

Similarly you can delete channels you no longer watch frequently by pressing Favorite CH Erase.





Alternatively, Favorite Channels can be added or deleted using the OSD:


- Up to 20 Favorite Channels can be stored; ten in ANT 1 and ten in ANT 2.
- If both ANT 1 and ANT 2 are connected to the same RF source, you can have 20 Favorite Channels in two groups.
- To see the list of current Favorite Channels, press INFO and VOL ▼on the remote control simultaneously. If you attempt to add an 11th Favorite Channel to a list that already contains 10 Favorite Channels, the first channel in the list will be automatically replaced with the new favorite channel added.
- Once a channel has been successfully added to the Favorite Channels list, the message "Ch Added OK" will be
 displayed on the screen. Similarly, when a channel has been successfully deleted from the Favorite Channels
 list, the message "Ch Erased OK" will be displayed on the screen.



Adjusting the Picture_

You can adjust the picture to match different video sources you are watching. There are two preset options, Cinema and Normal. Select Cinema mode to optimize picture settings for a theater-like experience. Select Normal mode for everyday viewing.

You can also choose to manually define the picture settings to suit your personal preferences and then save those settings for future use under the setting names User1, User 2, or User3.





Step 1

Press MENU to launch the onscreen display.

Select PICTURE using the ▲▼ buttons, then press ENTER.

Step 2

Using the ▲▼ buttons, select Cinema, Normal, User1, User2, or User3, then press ENTER.

Step 3

(See Table 2 below for an explanation of each of the main picture components) Use the ▲▼ buttons to select various picture components, then use the ◀▶ buttons to adjust the value of a given component. Any adjustments you make will take immediate effect on the screen so that you can gauge how the onscreen image will look. When you have achieved the desired picture quality, simply press MENU to close the menu and to begin watching your program. All adjustments made will be automatically saved when you exit.

- User-defined adjustments can only be made to the User1, User2, and User3. You can view the picture settings for Cinema and Normal but cannot alter them.
- We recommend that the user save a picture quality setting that suits each type of program the user normally views. For example, define the User1 settings for DVD programs, the User2 settings for HDTV programs, and so on.





Displaying Different Picture Formats_

Your display supports nine different picture formats. You can choose the picture format that is most suitable for the type of image you are viewing.

For example, if you are viewing a program that contains subtitles, you may wish to select the SUBTITLES picture format. Or, if you are watching a 2.35:1 feature film, you may wish to choose one of the WIDE formats if the source is non-anamorphic. If the source is anamorphically enhanced, you can choose Full or Full-L instead.





Note

You can also use FORMAT on the remote control to choose available picture formats.

Table 3: Description of Format Options

Format	Description
4x3	Enlarges NTSC and PAL picture signals to 960 x 720 and displays images in the center of the screen. Unused portions of the screen are masked.
Full	Enlarges picture to the size of the entire screen area (1280 x 720) Suitable for HDTV programs and 16x9 enhanced DVD programs. Digitally overscanning by 6% masks any non-displaying signals.
Full-L	Enlarges the picture 15% beyond the FULL format of 1280 x 720. Enlarges 2.35:1 (16x9 anamorphically enhanced DVDs) or HDTV signals to the larger 2.0:1 format.
Stretch	Stretches the sides of a normal 4 x 3 picture signal to the full width of the screen. Unaffected areas are masked.
Subtitle	Enlarges NTSC and PAL picture formats to the size of the entire screen area (1280 x 720), but nudges the picture slightly upwards to accommodate the subtitles display area.
Wide1	Converts the 1.66:1 format often used in Europe to full screen height. Suitable for non-16x9 sources compressed to 1.66:1 letterbox format.
Wide2	Converts the 1.85:1 format often used in North America to full screen height. Suitable for all sources except 16x9 enhanced DVDs.
Wide3	Displays feature films with a normal screen ratio of 2.35:1.
Native	Displays the picture at the TV's native resolution (1280 x 720) without digitally overscanning.




- When viewing HD1, HD2, PC1 and PC2, signals, only Native, 4x3, Full, and Full-L picture formats are available.
- Native mode displays video image without any digital overscan. This mode can display the more video details. However, occasionally some non-displaying signals may appear near the edges of the image as white lines or green lines. To avoid seeing these unwanted lines user can either use the Full mode or refer to Advanced Picture Adjustments on page 32 to move the image position and hence the unwanted lines off the screen.

It is possible to view two programs simultaneously using either the Picture-In-Picture function or Picture-Outside-Picture function.

PIP

PIP allows the viewer to watch one program on the full screen, and another program on a smaller pop-up window, which can be placed in either of the four corners of the screen.







Step 1

Press MENU to launch the onscreen display

Step 2

Select PIP/POP using the ◀▶ buttons , then press ENTER.

Step 3

Select PIP using the $\blacktriangle \blacktriangledown$ buttons, then press ENTER.



Select PIP POSITION using the ▲▼ buttons to choose the corner of the screen that you would like the smaller pop-up window to appear (UL=Upper Left, UR=Upper Right, LL=Lower Left, LR=Lower Right). (Refer to Table 4 below for more information.)


- Use Source on the remote control to select the source for the PIP windows.
- Press SWAP on the remote to switch the program in the small window to the main screen, and the program on the main screen to the small window.
- SWAP only switches the PIP main and sub screens It does not exchange left and right screens in POP mode.
- The PIP/POP functions are not available when viewing programs signals from HD1, HD2, PC1, or PC2.





POP

The POP function divides the viewing area into two halves, allowing the simultaneous viewing of two programs in side-by-side windows.







Note:

· If the program block function is enabled, the source that is blocked will not have audio, video, or captions.

Channel Surfing in POP Mode

You can automatically channel surf when viewing a program from ANT-1 or ANT-2 in POP mode. Select the CH Surf function on the OSD to on will display consecutive channels for three seconds each. To stop the surfing and continue viewing a channel, press either PIP/POP CH Up or PIP/POP CH Down.








- The main program window is on the right side of the screen. The sub window is on the left side of the screen.





Viewing Closed Captions


Closed captions are data hidden within video signals that allow text information to be displayed on the screen for hearing impaired individuals and other reasons. RD50/65 can decode four standard closed captions and four text closed captions. Standard closed captions display text translations of the dialogue. Text closed captions displays scrolling text that is usually not related to the program.

To enable closed captions, press C.C. on your remote control, then select the mode you want.










Program Block

If you are concerned about children having access to coarse languages, violence or sexually explicit programs, you can block certain programs or channels from being viewed. You can accept or block programs with certain ratings, which are determined by the level of violent and/or sexual content. You only need to select the ratings you are willing to accept, and all programs will then be automatically filtered out according to the rating level you have selected. (Note: Please see Table 7 for a description of the various ratings)



To Select the Program Block Function








Adjusting the Audio Settings

You can adjust the audio settings to suit the particular program being viewed. You can choose to listen to the audio program in stereo, in mono, in surround sound, or with the sound muted. The bass, treble, and audio balance can also be individually adjusted to your preference.

Similarly, the headphone volume can also be adjusted independently. The speaker volume setting has no effect on headphone volume setting.





Fuzzy Picture	 Check that the device generating the picture signal is operating properly. Check that you have set the display to receive the proper signal source. 	
No Sound	 Check to see if the Mute function is activated. Check the Volume level. Check that the device generating the audio signal is properly connected to the display.
