Important notes for users in the U.K.

Mains plug

This apparatus is fitted with an approved 13-Amp plug. To change a fuse in this type of plug, proceed as follows:

- 1 Remove fuse cover and fuse.
- 2 Fix the new fuse which should be a BS1362 5-Amp, A.S.T.A. or BSI approved type.
- 3 Refit the fuse cover.

If the fitted plug is not suitable for your socket outlets, it should be cut off and an appropriate plug should be fitted in its place.

If the mains plug contains a fuse, it should have a value of 5 Amp. If a plug without a fuse is used, the fuse at the distribution board should not be greater than 5 Amp.

Note: The severed plug must be disposed, so as to avoid a possible shock hazard due to it being inserted into another 13-Amp socket.

How to connect a plug

The wires in the mains lead are colored using the following codes: blue = neutral (N), brown = live (L).

- As these colors may not correspond with the color markings identifying the terminals in your plug, proceed as follows:
 - Connect the blue wire to the terminal marked N or colored black.
 - Connect the brown wire to the terminal marked L or colored red.
 - Do not connect either wire to the earth terminal in the plug, marked E (or e) or colored green (or green and yellow).

Before replacing the plug cover, make sure that the cord grip is clamped over the sheath of the lead and not simply over the two wires.

3 Installation



3.1 Install Center (C) and Station (S)

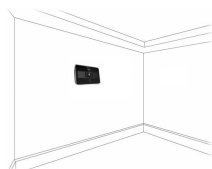
Note

Before you decide where and how to install the set, test the Wi-Fi connection and rear cable connections to find a suitable location.

You can install **S** in two ways, free standing (using the supplied stands) or wall mounted (without the stands). Use the **C** free standing. For the **S** we have enclosed a wall mounting kit.




(free standing)



(wall mounted)

To learn more about wall mounting, see **18 Appendix** on How to mount Station to a wall.

3.2 Connect AC power

Important! Always press & hold  to switch the set to power-saving mode before removing its power plug.

Ensure that all rear connections are established before you power up the set.

Connect the AC power cord to the mains outlet. The set is now powered up (switched on).






When in Standby or Eco Standby mode,  and  still consume some power.

To disconnect the system from the power supply completely, remove the power plug from the mains outlet.



For users in the U.K., please follow the instructions on page iii.





3.3 Set up Wi-Fi connection between Center () and Station ()

Note



- Always press & hold  to switch the set to Eco standby (power-saving mode) before removing its power plug.
- Always power up the  first, and then power up the .
- Never block  from  by thick walls or more than one wall.
- Avoid installation near large metal objects.

The Wi-Fi connection starts automatically when you power up both  and .

The first time you set up a Wi-Fi connection place  and  side by side on a level and sturdy surface.



- 1 Using the supplied power cables, connect first  and then  to the power supply.
>  and  are ready for use.

Tip

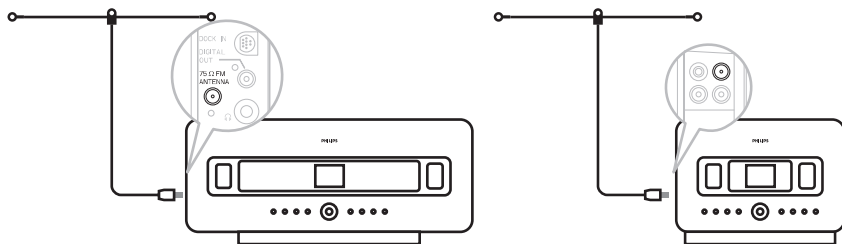
For better Wi-Fi reception, rotate the Wi-Fi antenna or adjust the location of  and .

3.4 Rear connections

Note

- Never connect or disconnect power cables when the mains supply is switched on.
- Install  and  within easy reach of suitable AC power outlets.

3.4.1 Connect antennas



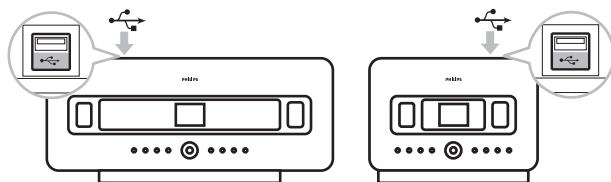
- 1 Extend wire antenna.
- 2 Connect wire antenna to **FM antenna** jack:
- 3 Optional: To improve FM reception you can install an extension line (sold separately) between the wire antenna and the antenna jack.
- 4 Unwind the antenna extension line completely.
- 5 Move it in different directions to find the optimal reception (if possible, keep it away from the TV, VCR or other radiation sources).
- 6 For best results elevate or ceiling-mount the antenna.

3.4.2 Connect a portable (USB) device


On **C** or **S**, you can play back music from a portable device.

You can also transfer music from the library on **C** to the portable device.

- 1 Insert the USB plug of the portable device into the socket  on **C** or **S**.



For portable devices with USB cable:

- 1 Insert one end of the USB cable (not supplied) into the socket  on **C** or **S**.
- 2 Insert the other end of the USB cable into the USB output terminal of the portable device.

To play back music from the portable device:

- 1 Press **HOME**.
- 2 Select **PORTABLE** .
- 3 Select **USB**.
> *Your portable device is displayed.*
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select your music.

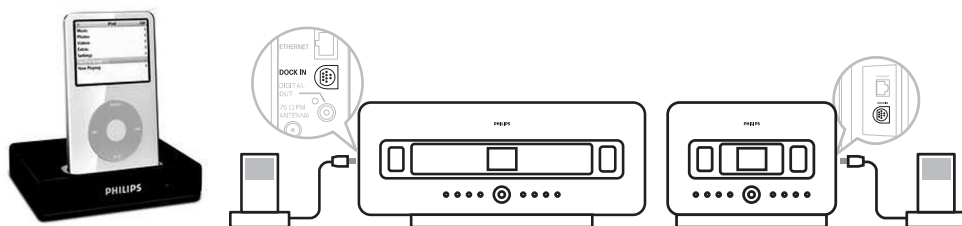
For more details and instructions on how to record music to the portable device: See **10 External sources**.

Tip


- **C** and **S** only support portable (USB) devices that adhere to the following standards:
 - USB MSC (Type '0')
 - USB MTP
 - File system in FAT12 / FAT16 / FAT32
 - Operations based on simple folder type navigation (also known as a normal FAT file system), and not based on proprietary track database.
- The following USB devices will not be supported by **C** or **S**:
Products with database UI (Artists, Albums and Genre based navigation) as these products normally store music files in a specific hidden folder and use embedded proprietary track database that **C** and **S** are unable to read properly.

3.4.3 Connect your iPod (optional)

You can connect your iPod (not supplied) to **C** or **S** using Philips docking cradle and data/audio cable (Philips docking cradle for iPod, model DC1050 sold separately). Now you can enjoy the music library in your iPod via the sophisticated speaker system of the set. You can even charge your iPod at the same time.



To play back music from your iPod:

- 1 Press **HOME** and select **Portable (iPod)** .
Your iPod is displayed.

- Use ▲ or ▼ and ► on the remote control (or use the navigation control of your iPod) to select the music in your iPod menu system.
(See also **10 External sources**).

3.4.4 Connect additional appliances

It is possible to play audio output from an external source, e.g. TV, VCR, Laser Disc player, DVD player on **C** or **S**. You can also record the audio output to the music library in the HD of **C**.

On the additional appliance

Connect one end of the audio cable (not supplied) to the AUDIO OUT terminals on the additional appliance.

On **C** or **S**

Connect the other end of the audio cables to the **AUX IN** terminals on **C** or **S**.

To play back audio output from the additional appliance:

- On **C** or **S**, press **HOME** and select **AUX** **E**.
Your additional appliance (external source) is displayed.
- On your additional appliance, use the controls as you normally would.
(See also **10 External sources**).

To record audio output to the library (HD) of **C**, see section **HD: Building music library on Center**.

✳ Tip

- If the connected device has only one single audio out terminal, connect it to the AUX IN left terminal. (Alternatively, you can use a 'single to double' cinch cable, but the sound output is still mono).
- Always refer to the user manual of your other equipment for complete connection.

3.4.5 Connect an additional device with external speakers

To enjoy the good sound quality of the product's speakers with an additional device, e.g. a mini Hi-Fi system, use red/white audio cables (not supplied) to connect **C** to the external device.

On **C**

- Connect the red plug of the red/white audio cable (not supplied) to the red socket **LINE OUT R** and the white plug to the white socket **LINE OUT L**.

On the additional device

- Connect the other end of the audio cable to the AUX IN terminals.
- Select **AUX** mode on the connected additional device.

4 Prepare

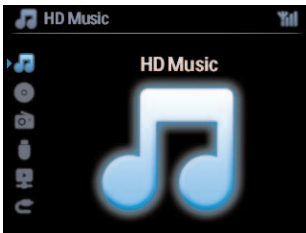
4.1 Set the clock

The time can be displayed in 24-hour or 12-hour format. You can set up your clock on **C** or **S**. There are two methods to set the clock, RDS automatic time synchronization and manual time set-up.

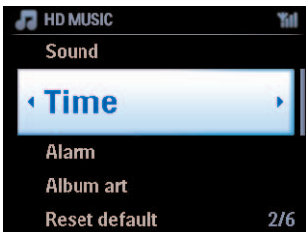
RDS auto time sync:

If you have preset RDS radio stations, you can synchronize the clock with one of the RDS stations.

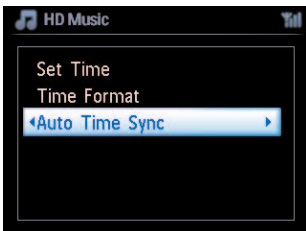
- 1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.



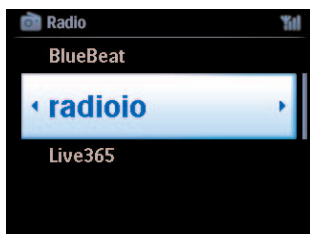
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Settings** followed by **Time**.



- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Auto Time Sync**.

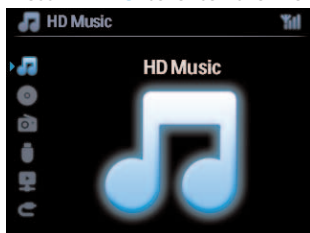


- 4 Use ▲ or ▼ and ► to select the RDS radio station you wish to synchronize the clock with.
 > The screen shows a confirmation screen:

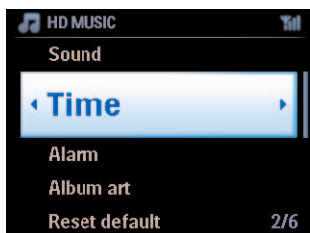


Manual time set:

- 1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.

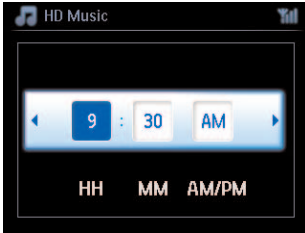


- 2 Use ▲ or ▼ and ► to select **Settings** followed by **Time**.



- 3 Use ▲, ▼, or the numeric keypad (0-9), and ► to select **Set Time**.
 > The display shows current clock setting (00:00 by default)

- 4 Use ▲, ▼, or the numeric keypad (0-9) repeatedly to set the hours followed by the minutes.



- 5 Confirm with **OK**.

*** Tip**

- Change to 12-hour or 24-hour format:
 - 1 In the Time menu, select **Time Format**.
 - 2 Use ▲ or ▼ and ► to select your option.
- If you disconnect the power supply (pull the mains plug), the clock will be reset (settings will not be saved).

4.1.1 View the clock

- 1 Press & hold **VIEW** button for about 5 seconds.
The clock will appear briefly in the display.

*** Tip**

- In Standby mode, you can briefly press **VIEW** to turn on the LCD backlights and view clock more clearly.
- If you disconnect the power supply (pull the mains plug), the clock will be reset (settings will not be saved).

4.2 Remote control

The set is supplied with a 2-way remote control and a 1-way remote control. You can use these to control functions on **C** or **S**.

Note

Use the 1-way remote control for Station management, Network configuration, and to Edit track information. The 2-way remote control cannot be used for these tasks.

Important!

- Always point the remote control directly towards the IR sensor on **C** or **S** you wish to operate.
- First, select the source you wish to control by pressing one of the source select keys on the remote control (for example CD/MP3-CD, HD, FM TUNER, AUX).
- Then select the desired function (for example **▶/|| / ◀◀ / ▶▶**).

4.2.1 Remote control battery installation

Caution!

To avoid the risk of explosion:

- Do not puncture, cut, or manipulate batteries in any way and do not throw them into the fire.
- Do not short-circuit the battery terminals.

To avoid burn injuries:

- Wear protective gloves when you handle leaking batteries.

To avoid leakage of corrosive battery fluid and damage to the product:

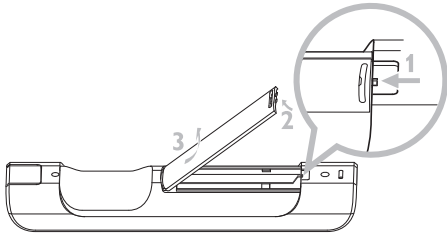
- Always replace all batteries at the same time
- Do not mix old and new batteries or batteries of different types.
- Replace batteries immediately if they are exhausted.
- Always remove the batteries, if the remote control will not be used for a longer period of time.

To avoid batteries being accidentally swallowed:

- Always keep them out of reach of children and pets. (Consult a physician immediately, if a battery has been swallowed!)

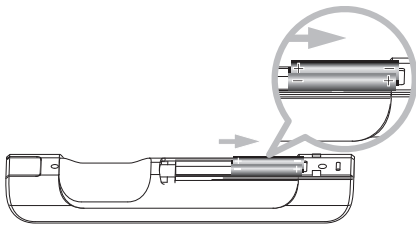

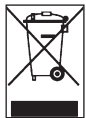

Observe correct polarity (refer to '+' / '-' symbols inside the battery compartment).

IMPORTANT BATTERY INFORMATION!

4.2.2 Remote control, 2-way

You can choose to use the 2-way remote control to operate either **C** or **S**. Depending on the level of interference, you can also select your preferred operational mode: Enhanced Mode or Normal Mode.

Important! To save battery power, if no buttons are pressed for approx. 15 seconds, the 2-way remote control enters idle mode. Press any button to reengage the control.

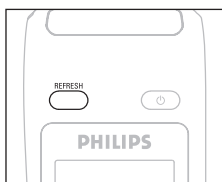
Center (default): to operate **C**

Station: to operate **S**

Enhanced Mode (default): This mode offers a better range (distance and angle). Use this mode if there is no interference from a plasma TV nearby.

Normal Mode: Choose this mode if there is interference from a plasma TV nearby that is distorting the display of the 2-way remote control.

- 1 Press & hold **REFRESH** until the Select Device screen appears in the display of the 2-way remote control.



- 2 Use ▲ or ▼ to highlight and ► to select **Center** or **Station**.
- 3 Use ▲ or ▼ to highlight and ► to select **Normal Mode** or **Enhanced Mode**.
- 4 Confirm with **OK**.

✳ Tip

- Avoid placing **C** or **S** near a plasma TV. The interference may distort the display on your 2-way remote control.
- The status of **C** or **S** is synchronized into the display of the 2-way remote control, so it is easier to operate the remote control.
- To synchronize the remote control display after activating the ⏻ button on the set, press **REFRESH** on the remote control of Center.

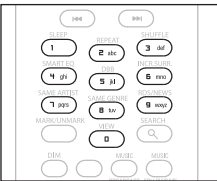
4.3 Navigation controls

- 1 Use the navigation controls ◀ / ▶ / ▲ / ▼ when navigating through options.
- 2 Highlight options with ▲ / ▼.
- 3 Enter submenus with ▶.
- 4 Confirm selections with **OK** or ▶.



4.4 Alphanumeric keys

- 1 Use the alphanumeric keys to enter letters or numbers.
- 2 When the text box appears, press the alphanumeric keys repeatedly until the desired letter/number appears.




- 3 Use ◀ / ▶ to move the cursor back / forward.
- 4 Press ⏪ to delete the entry before the cursor.
- 5 Press **OK** to close the text box and move to the next option list.



Note

You will enter the previous / next option list if the cursor reaches the beginning or the end of the text box.

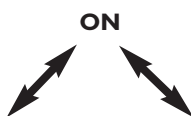
5 Basic functions

5.1 Power modes and functions


When you plug the product into your mains supply, it powers up and is in power mode **ON**. The  button allows you to change the power mode. A colored light in the button indicates the current power mode:

- 1 When the set is ON (green button light), press :



 /  switches to Standby mode.

The button light changes from green to red.

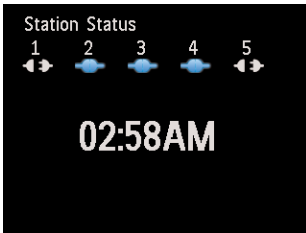
: The screen dims.

The display shows connected (or last connected) 


: The screen dims.

The display shows the connected  (or screen will remain blank if no is found )

During Standby the display shows the time (or display shows —:— if you have not set the clock).

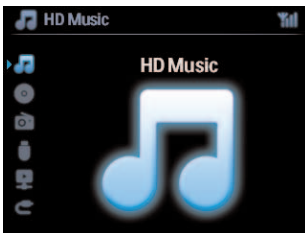


To switch the **C** / **S** back ON again,

- a press .
C / **S** switches ON and remembers the last source selected:
The button light changes from red to green.

OR

- b press one of the source buttons on the remote control, **CD/MP3-CD** (only **C**), **HD**, **FM TUNER**, **AUX**, or **HOME**.
- 2 To select functions, press **HOME** once or more times (**CD/MP3-CD** (only **C**), **HD**, or **HOME** on remote control).



*** Tip**

- CD/MP3-CD source is only available on **C**.
- FM TUNER and AUX source buttons are only available on the 1-way remote control.

5.2 Eco Standby (power-saving mode)

In the power-saving mode Eco Standby, the display and Wi-Fi connections of the product are turned off. The HD (Hard Disk) of **[C]** also becomes inactive. When **[C]** is switched to Eco Standby, you cannot stream music between **[C]** and **[S]** or import music from the PC to **[C]**. During Eco Standby the remote controls are inactive.

- 1 With the set switched ON, press & hold **[P]**:
[C] / **[S]** changes to Eco Standby.
 The button lights up red.
 The display is switched off.
- 2 To switch the **[C]** / **[S]** ON, press **[P]** on the set. (The remote controls are still inactive.)
[C] / **[S]** switches to the last source selected.

* Tip

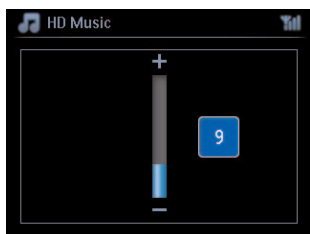
- In the power-saving mode Eco Standby, the settings for networking, sound, display, language and CD recording, as well as the tuner presets, and the volume level (maximum: moderate level) will be retained in the memory of the set.
- To protect the HD, always switch **[C]** to Eco Standby before removing its power plug from the mains outlet.
- Remember that the remote controls are inactive during Eco Standby.

5.3 Auto-Standby

If at the end of playback / recording (ripping) the set remains in the stop mode for longer than 20 minutes, the set will automatically switch to Standby mode in order to save power.

5.4 Volume control

- 1 Check that playback has started.
- 2 Adjust the volume with **VOL +/-** buttons.
 > Display shows a horizontal bar indicating the volume level.



5.5 MUTE

During playback, you can deactivate the sound without switching off the set.

1 To deactivate the sound, press **MUTE**.

>  appears.

Playback continues without sound.

2 To reactivate the sound, press **MUTE** again or adjust the volume with **VOL +**.


> The icon  disappears.

5.6 Sound control

5.6.1 Smart equalizer

This function enables you to play music of the current genre with the matching sound settings.

1 During playback, press **SMART EQUALIZER**

>  appears if Smart Equalizer is activated.

2 To deactivate the Smart Equalizer, press **SMART EQUALIZER**

>  disappears.

5.6.2 Equalizer

Equalizer enables you to select predefined sound settings.

Set Equalizer:

1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.

2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Equalizer**.

3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Rock, Pop** (default), **Jazz, Neutral, Techno, Classical, Treble/Bass**.

4 Confirm with **OK**.

Set Treble or Bass:

1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.

2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Settings**, followed by **Treble** or **Bass**.

3 Navigate **◀ / ▶ / ▲ / ▼** to highlight your option:
Treble (+3 to -3), Bass (+3 to -3)

5.6.3 DBB (Dynamic Bass Boost)

Press **DBB** (Dynamic Bass Boost) once or more times to change the bass settings. Select your option: **DBB OFF** (default), **DBB 1**, **DBB 2**, or **DBB 3**.

Tip

Some discs might be recorded in high modulation, which causes a distortion at high volume. If this occurs, switch off DBB or reduce the volume.

5.6.4 Incredible surround

Press **INCR. SURROUND** (**INCR. SURR.** on the 1-way remote control) once or more times to toggle the surround sound effect **On** and **Off**.

Display shows: **IS ON** or **IS OFF**.

5.7 Display adjustment

With the controls on **C** or **S** (or on the 1-way remote control) you can adjust the backlight and contrast settings of the display.

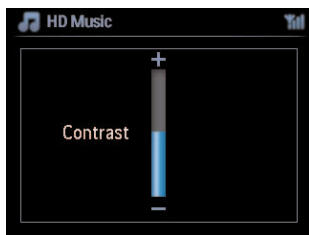
- 1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Settings**, followed by **Display**.
- 3 Press **▲ / ▼** and **▶** to select **Backlight** or **Contrast**:

Backlight

- 1 Press **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **On** or **Off**.

Contrast:

- 1 Press **▲** or **▼** to increase or reduce the contrast.



Note


You can also toggle the Backlight On and Off by pressing DIM on the 1-way remote control.

5.8 Selecting languages


- 1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Settings**, followed by **Language**.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to choose **English, Français, Español, Nederlands, Italiano** or **Deutsch**.

5.9 Sleep

You can preset a certain period of time after which **C** or **S** will switch to Standby mode.

- 1 On the remote control, press **SLEEP** repeatedly to select the desired time period (in minutes):
 - > *Display shows in sequence: Sleep 15, 30, 45, 60, 90, 120, OFF.*
- 2 Select the desired time period.
 - > *Display shows the selected option briefly and returns to its previous status.  appears when a time is selected.*
- 3 To view the countdown time to Standby mode, briefly press **SLEEP** again.


When the selected sleep time expires, **C** or **S** automatically switches to Standby mode.

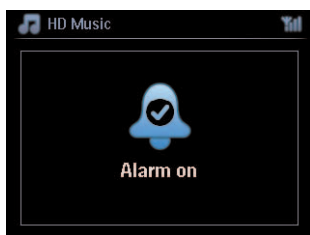
- 4 To deactivate the sleep timer before the sleep time expires, press **SLEEP** repeatedly until **SLEEP OFF** is selected.
 - > *The icon  disappears.*

5.10 Alarm

Important! The clock must be set correctly before the alarm is set.

5.10.1 Set alarm / alarm time / repeat mode

- 1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 2 Use ▲ or ▼ and ▶ to select **Settings**.
- 3 Use ▲ or ▼ and ▶ to select **Alarm**, followed by **Alarm On** or **Off**.
> *The Alarm Time screen appears.*
- 4 In the Alarm Time screen, use ▲ or ▼ and ▶ to enter the hours and minutes.
- 5 Confirm the alarm time with **OK** or ▶.
- 6 Use ▲ or ▼ and ▶ to select repeat mode **Once** or **Daily**.
> *The screen briefly shows **Alarm On** and  appears in the display.*

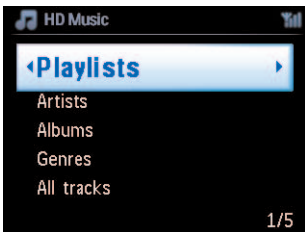


6 HD (Hard Disk)

6.1 Play HD Music

Music is centrally stored in the 80GB HD (Hard Disk) on the **C**. All the stored music can be streamed and played on **S** via Wi-Fi.

- 1 Check that **C** or **S** is switched ON or in Standby mode (see **5 Basic functions**).
- 2 Press **HOME** and select **HD Music** (or press **HD** on remote control).
> Display shows **HD Music** and the categories of your music library: **Playlists, Artists, Albums, Genres, All tracks**.



Playlists: customizable collection of your favorite tracks sorted by playlist name in alphanumeric order.

Artists: collection of albums sorted by artist name in alphanumeric order.

Albums: collection of albums sorted by album name in alphanumeric order.

Genres: collection of albums sorted by music style (only if album information available).

All tracks: All tracks sorted by track name in alphabetical order.

- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select your option.

6.2 Search

6.2.1 Search by keywords

The keyword should be the first letter or word in the title of the track you wish to search for: By entering a keyword, you can quickly find all the items beginning with the keyword you entered (note that this feature is case sensitive).

- 1 Navigate **◀ / ▶ / ▲ / ▼** to enter desired option list of tracks, albums or playlists.
- 2 On remote control, press **SEARCH**
> Display: text box appears



- 3 Use alphanumeric keys to enter keyword (maximum 8 characters) (see **4.4 Prepare: Alphanumeric keys**)
- 4 Press **OK** to start searching
 - > Display: **Searching...**
*Searching starts from the beginning of current option list.
 The matched items appear at the top of the list.
 The option list automatically shows the closest match in the alphabet if no match is found.
 Display: **Searching...** disappears.*
- 5 Press **STOP** ■ to stop searching.

Tip

Searching will also stop when:

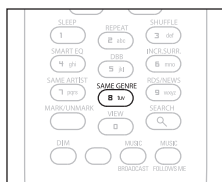
- you select another source
- you switch off the set

6.2.2 Select track of same artist

- 1 During playback, press **SAME ARTIST**
 - > Playback of found tracks by the current artist continues after current track.

6.2.3 Select track of same genre

- 1 During playback, press **SAME GENRE**
 - > Playback of found tracks of same genre as current track continues after current track.



Tip

Not all tracks have an automatic genre tag, so you may have to manually assign a genre for your tracks when loading them to the HD of **CD**.

6.2.4 Find track in current album (during playback)

In playback screen, navigate with ▲ / ▼ to select track in current album during playback.

6.2.5 Find passage in current track (during playback)

- 1 In playback screen, press & hold ▲ / ▼ or ⏮ / ⏭
 - > Track gets scanned at high speed.
- 2 When you found the passage you want, release ▲ / ▼ or ⏮ / ⏭
 - > Normal play resumes.

6.3 Play modes REPEAT, SHUFFLE



plays the current track continuously



repeats all the tracks (under current selection of playlist, artist, genre, album, or All tracks)






repeats all the tracks (under current selection of playlist, artist, genre, album, or All tracks) in random order



plays tracks (under current selection of playlist, artist, genre, album, or All tracks) in random order

- 1 During playback press **REPEAT** or / and **SHUFFLE** once or more times to select desired play mode. The play mode icons appear in the display.
- 2 To return to normal playback, press **REPEAT** or / and **SHUFFLE** repeatedly until the various mode icons disappear from the display.

Note

If  is active, it will be deactivated when pressing **SHUFFLE**. To activate  /  press first **SHUFFLE**, then **REPEAT 1**.

6.4 Build music library on Center (LC)

Important!

- Recording is permitted only if there is no infringement of copyrights or any other rights of third parties.
- For CDs encoded with copyright protection technologies used by some record companies, recording will be restricted.
- The making of unauthorized duplicates of copy-protected material, including computer programs, files, broadcasts and sound recordings, may be an infringement of copyrights and constitute a criminal offence. This equipment should not be used for such purposes.

You can build a music library in the HD of LC by ripping from CDs, importing from PC and recording from external sources.

6.4.1 Rip music from CDs

Important!

Ripped files are first stored in a temporary memory:

Do not switch the Center to standby - wait until Center has fully processed the files and automatically switches to standby. While the Center is processing the files, you can continue to listen to your music.

With the LC, you can rip audio CD tracks from your CDs and store them as MP3 files in the HD of LC. The Gracenote MusicID® enables your set to look up CD information (including album, artist, genre, track information) from its database. It allows the recorded CD tracks to be properly categorized (for example, under artist, albums, genres or all tracks) and also to be merged with the existing tracks in the HD. To update your Gracenote® Media Database, see the section **12 Connect to your PC** in this manual.

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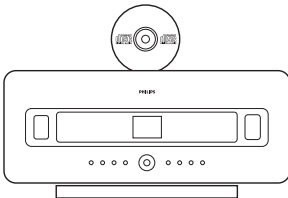

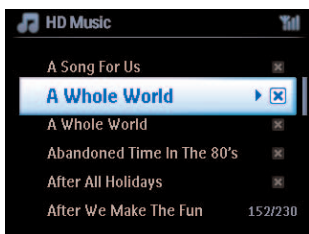

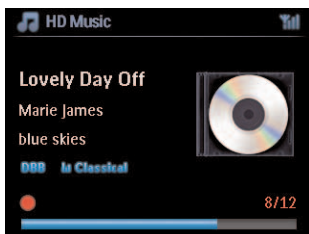
For MP3/WMA CD, press  on a highlighted file folder to enter the track list.



- 2 In the track list screen, press **RECORD ●** (remote control **REC**).
- > List of tracks with check boxes appears:



- 3 Press **MARK/UNMARK** to select/deselect tracks (hold **MARK/UNMARK** to select/deselect all tracks).
- 4 Press **RECORD ●** (**REC**) to start ripping.
- > Display shows **CD-Rip** and the current track name.



(A default album name, e.g. Album_001 is assigned if the CD track information cannot be found in the Gracenote® database.)

> Center returns to CD mode when ripping is complete.

- 5 To rip another CD repeat steps 1 to 4 again.
- 6 To stop ripping, press **STOP ■**.

6.4.2 Import from your PC

The Wireless Audio Device Manager (WADM) in the supplied PC installer helps you organize music files on your PC and import them into **CD**. For details, see the section **12 Connect to your PC** in this manual.

6.4.3 Record from radio or external source

A maximum recording time of 3-hours can be made from the radio or an external source.

1

- a In Radio mode, tune the desired radio station (see **8.1 FM radio: Tuning radio stations**),
or
- b In AUX mode, start playback from the external source.


2 Press **RECORD**

> *The recoding starts.*

3 Press **STOP** ■ to stop recording.

The recording will be saved as a file under RADIO or AUX in Albums. A file name is assigned, e.g. Radio_01, or Aux_01.

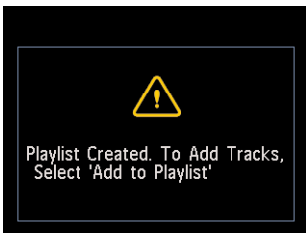
6.5 Create a playlist

A playlist is a custom collection of your favorite music. You can create up to 99 playlists in the HD of .

1 In **HD Music** mode, press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.

2 Use ▲ or ▼ and ► to select **Create Playlist**

> *A new playlist is created (a default album name, e.g. Playlist_001, is assigned).
Display shows: Playlist created. To add tracks, select Add to Playlist.*



1 Navigate with ◀ / ▶ / ▲ / ▼ to highlight the desired Track or All tracks.

2 Select **Add to Playlist**.

3 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.

4 Use ▲ or ▼ and ► to display the selection of playlists.












5 Use ▲ or ▼ and ► to select the desired playlist.

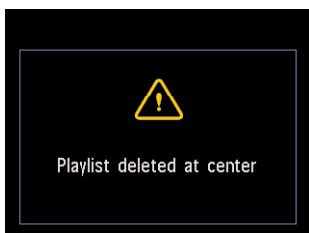
> *Display shows all added tracks in playlist.*

6 Repeat steps to select and store all desired tracks.

6.6 Delete a playlist, album or track

This feature works only on .

- 1 Navigate with  /  /  /  to enter a category (Playlist, Artists, Albums, Genres, All tracks).
- 2 If necessary, press  or  and  once or more times to highlight the playlist album or track you wish to delete.
- 3 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 4 Use  or  and  to select **Delete Playlist**, **Delete Album** or **Delete Track**
- 5 Press  to select **Yes**.

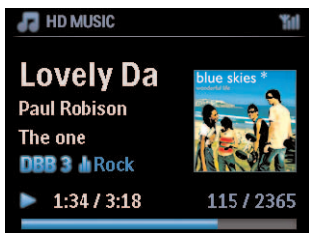


6.7 View track information

Note

The feature View track information is only available in mode HD Music.

- 1 Use the **VIEW** button on the remote control to toggle the display between the HD playback screen and the track list screen.



To view more track information:

- 1 In HD playback screen, press ▶ to display the full view album art screen.



- 2 In full view album art screen, press ◀ to return to the HD playback screen

6.8 Backup to PC

The **Wireless Audio Device Manager** (WADM) in the supplied PC Suite CD allows you to backup contents on the HD to your PC. The backup files on your PC can be subsequently restored to **Ⓢ** if the files on the HD are lost or corrupted. For details, see the section **12 Connect to your PC** in this manual.


6.9 Move music playback between Center (**Ⓢ**) and Station (**Ⓢ**)

You can connect up to 5 Stations **Ⓢ** to Center **Ⓢ** via Wi-Fi, so your music playback can be moved between Center **Ⓢ** and Stations **Ⓢ**. You and your family will be able to enjoy and share music with ease wherever you are in your home.


6.9.1 MUSIC FOLLOWS ME



As you move around at home, let the music move with you between **Ⓢ** and **Ⓢ** or between **Ⓢ** and **Ⓢ**.

On the source unit (Ⓢ**) where music is playing:**

- 1 Press **MUSIC FOLLOWS ME** to stop playback from that unit and activate the function.
- > The icon  appears on the displays of Center and Station.

On the destination unit (Ⓢ** or **Ⓢ**) where you want to listen:**

- 2 Press **MUSIC FOLLOWS ME** to activate the playback.
- > The icon  disappears from the displays of **Ⓢ** and **Ⓢ**, and the music will start to play. Simultaneously, the music (audio output) of the source unit is stopped.

Any selected play modes (e.g.  ) will be retained on the destination unit (see **6.3 Play modes REPEAT, SHUFFLE**).

3 To stop **MUSIC FOLLOWS ME**, press **STOP ■** on the destination unit.

⚙️ Tip

- **MUSIC FOLLOWS ME** will be automatically deactivated if you do not activate **MUSIC FOLLOWS ME** on the destination unit within 5 minutes
- To deactivate **MUSIC FOLLOWS ME**, press **MUSIC FOLLOWS ME** again.

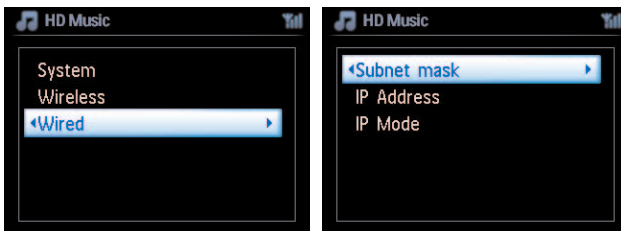

6.11 Edit track information

Note




Use the 1-way remote control to **Edit track information**. The 2-way remote control cannot be used for this task.

You can edit track title, album name, etc. on :

- 1 Press **HOME** to select **HD**.
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select the track to be edited.
- 3 Press **MENU**.
 - > 'Edit' is shown on the LCD display

7 CD (Center only)

7.1 Supported discs

You can play the following discs on the system:

- Pre-recorded audio CDs (CDDA)
- Finalized audio CD-Rs and CD-RWs (12cm CD / 8cm CD, 185 MB / 200 MB)
- MP3/WMA-CDs (CD-R/CD-RWs with MP3/WMA files)
- AAC-CDs (MPEG4 AAC LC raw format, .m4a/.m4b files)

Important! This system is designed for regular discs. Therefore, do not use any accessories such as disc stabilizer rings or disc treatment sheets, etc.

About MP3/WMA

The music compression technology MP3 (MPEG1 Audio Layer 3) and WMA (Windows Media Audio) significantly reduces the digital data of an audio CD, while maintaining the sound quality.

Windows Media Audio® is a registered trademark of Microsoft Corporation.

Supported formats:

- Disc format ISO9660, Joliet, UDF (created on Adaptec Direct CD v5.0 and Nero Burning ROM UDF v5.5) and multi-session CDs
- MP3 bit rate (data rate): 32-320 Kbps and variable bit rate.
- 8-cm and 12-cm CD-R/CD-RW up to 730MB
- Directory nesting up to a maximum of 8 levels
- Directory nesting up to a maximum of 8 levels
- MP3 VBR, WMA VBR
- AAC (MPEG4 AAC LC raw format, .m4a/.m4b files)

The system does not play or support the following:

- Empty albums that do not contain any MP3/WMA files and hence will not be displayed.
- Unsupported formats are skipped (e.g. files with .doc extension are ignored).
- DRM protected WMA files
- WAV, PCM audio files
- WMA files in lossless format

Tip

- Make sure that MP3 files end on extension .mp3, WMA files end on extension .wma, and AAC files end on extension .m4a or .m4b.
- To burn/convert DRM protected WMA files use Windows Media Player 10 (or later. Visit www.microsoft.com for details about Windows Media Player and WM DRM (Windows Media Digital Rights Management).

7.2 Play discs

- 1 Insert CD into CD loader slot on **C** with printed (label) side facing you.
> *Display shows: Reading CD.*

Audio CD: list of tracks appears (Track information may not appear, if it is not found in the HD database and if there is no Internet connection to update the missing information from the Gracenote® service site.)

MP3/WMA CD: list of albums appears.

Display shows:

- 2 Press the navigation controls ▲ or ▼ and ► to select your option.
- 3 Press ►II to start playback
 - On a highlighted album, to start playback of album.
 - On All tracks, to start playback of all tracks on disc.
- 4
 - a To temporarily pause playback, press ►II.
 - b To resume playback, press button again.
- 5 To stop playback, press **STOP ■**.
- 6 To remove disc, press **EJECT** on Center.

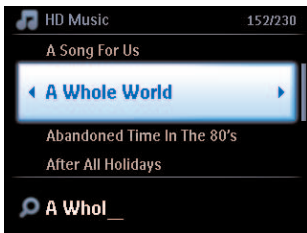
7.2.1 Search by keywords

The keyword should be the first letter or word of the album title, artist name, track title, genre name, or playlist name you wish to search for: By entering a keyword, you can quickly find the item that most closely matches to your search criteria. The search cursor will stop at the closest alphabetical match in the list.

Note

The keyword search is supported in modes HD Music and USB only.

- 1 Navigate ◀ / ▶ / ▲ / ▼ to enter desired option list of albums, artists, tracks, genres or playlists.
- 2 On remote control, press **SEARCH**
Display: text box appears



- 3 Use alphanumeric keys to enter keyword (maximum 8 characters) (see 4.4 Prepare: **Alphanumeric keys**)
- 4 Press **OK** to start searching
> Display: **Searching...**
Searching starts from the beginning of current option list.
The matched items appear at the top of the list.
The option list automatically shows the closest match in the alphabet if no match is found.
Display: **Searching...** disappears.

Tip

The search will also stop when:

- you select another source
- you switch off the set

7.2.2 Find track in current album (during playback)

In playback screen, press ▲ / ▼ (or ⏮ / ⏭) to select previous or next track in current album during playback.

7.2.3 Find passage in current track (during playback)

- 1 In playback screen, press & hold ▲ / ▼ (or ⏮ / ⏭) to scan currently playing track at high speed.
- 2 When you found the passage you want, release ▲ / ▼ (or ⏮ / ⏭) to resume normal playback.

7.3 Play modes REPEAT, SHUFFLE



plays the current track continuously



repeats all the tracks (under current artist, genre, or album)



repeats all the tracks (under current artist, genre, or album) in random order



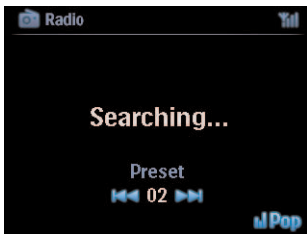
plays tracks (under current artist, genre, or album) in random order

- 1 During playback press **REPEAT** or / and **SHUFFLE** once or more times to select play mode.
- 2 To return to normal playback, press **REPEAT** or / and **SHUFFLE** repeatedly until the various modes are no longer displayed.

8 FM radio

8.1 Tune radio stations

- 1 Connect the supplied FM wire antenna to **C** and **S** (see **3 Installation**).
- 2 Ensure that the set is switched on or in Standby mode (see **5 Basic functions**).
- 3 Press **HOME** once or more times to select Radio.
> *Playback screen appears.*
Display: Radio, radio station frequency and preset number (if programmed).
- 4 Press & hold **▲** or **▼** until frequency in display starts running.



- > *The radio automatically tunes to a station of sufficient reception.*
*Display during automatic tuning: **Searching...***
*When you are receiving an RDS station, **FM** is shown.*
- 5 Repeat tuning process until you find the desired radio station.
 - 6 To tune to a weak station, press **▲** or **▼** briefly and repeatedly until you have established optimum reception.



8.2 Store preset radio stations

You can store up to 60 radio stations in the preset memory.

8.2.1 Autostore: Automatic preset program

Autostore automatically starts programming radio stations into the preset memory, beginning with Preset 1. Available stations are programmed in the order of their radio frequency, RDS stations are followed by FM stations. A maximum of 10 RDS stations will be stored (Preset 01 to Preset 10).

- 1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select autostore radio.
> *Display: **Autostore, please wait...** Press 'Stop' to exit.*

When all stations are stored, the first preset station automatically starts playing.

8.2.2 Manual store: Manual preset program

- 1 In FM radio mode, use **▲** or **▼** to select / tune your desired radio station.
- 2 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Save to Preset**.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select the desired preset number (PR01, PR02,...PR60).
> *Current radio station is stored under selected preset number.*

8.2.3 Listen to preset station

- 1 In FM radio mode, press **▶** to access the list of preset stations.
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select the preset station.



8.3 RDS

RDS (Radio Data System) is a service that allows FM stations to send additional information along with the FM radio signal.

Tune to RDS radio station (see **8.2.1 Autostore: Automatic preset program**)

Display shows (if available):

- Name of radio station
- Radio frequency
- Program type (e.g. News, Pop, Music)
- RDS radio text




8.4 NEWS


You can activate radio **NEWS** while listening to another source on WACS7500. The set will tune to a RDS radio station stored in the preset memory under one of the 10 first numbers.

1 During playback (any source except radio) press **RDS/NEWS** on remote control.

Icon  appears and **NEWS ON** is briefly displayed.

(If no RDS station is found or no news transmission is detected during the scan, the icon  disappears and **NEWS OFF** is briefly displayed.)

Playback continues while the set scans the first 10 preset stations.

When a news transmission is detected, the set will switch to the RDS station broadcasting the news transmission and the icon  starts flashing.

After the news transmission is over, the set will stay tuned to the news station.

2 To deactivate **NEWS**, press **RDS/NEWS** again.

> Icon  disappears and **NEWS OFF** is briefly displayed.

Tip

Ensure that you have stored RDS stations in the first 10 preset locations (see **8.2.1 Autostore: Automatic preset program**).

8.5 Internet radio*

You can also listen to all the most popular Internet Radio stations by connecting through the **Philips** web service, where automated links to active stations are maintained and updated at regular intervals.

The Internet Radio feature requires registration with **Philips**. The registration process only has to be completed once, when you are using the **Internet Radio** for the first time. You can register more than one user. Each user will have to register separately, following these instructions:

8.5.1 First time use

Important!

Ensure you are connected to the Internet when you use the Internet Radio feature. See 11. Network Settings for information on how to get your system connected to the home network and the Internet.

Use the 1-way remote control for the registration process.

For first time use of the Internet radio you must register with Philips.
To register you need a valid email address.

Note

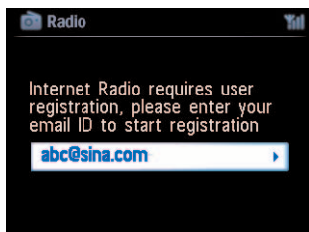
If you enter an email address that is already registered with Philips, the display asks for your password. Enter your password and enjoy Internet radio!

- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **User**.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Services**.
- 5 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to make your selection from the **Service List (RadioIO, or Live360)**.
- 6 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select the desired station.

8.5.3 Add internet radio stations and bookmark your favorites

On **C** or **S**

In Internet radio mode press **▶** to bookmark the current radio station as a favorite.

OR

On your PC

- 1 Log in with your registered email address at www.philips.com/welcome.
- 2 Select **Streamium Management** on the left hand side of the window.
- 3 Choose radio stations from the list.
- 4 Mark them as favorites.

The marked stations will appear as **My Media** and **Favorite Stations** the next time you connect.

8.5.3.1 My Media

8.5.3.2 Favorite stations

- 1 Press **HOME** one or more times to select **Radio**.
- 2 From the radio menu, select **Internet Radio**.
If multiple users are registered:
 - a Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Favorite Stations**.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to make your selection from the **List of Favorite Stations**.


Note



Ensure you are connected to your home network when you use the UPnP feature. See **11 Network Settings** for information on how to get your system connected to the home network and the Internet.


9.1 UPnP (Universal Plug and Play)

UPnP is a standard which connects multiple devices (wirelessly or wired) with each other and enables them to work seamlessly. If you are familiar with UPnP enabled devices, WACS7500 brings you additional benefits to enrich your wireless music streaming experience. If you are not familiar with UPnP-enabled devices, please visit www.upnp.org for details.

9.1.1 About UPnP*

In addition to the music library of , an UPnP-enabled device can also serve as a music library.








The music collection on the UPnP enabled device can be played on  or , wirelessly or through the supplied Ethernet cable.

You can also play the music library of  on the UPnP enabled device, thus expanding your home music network.

* *Universal Plug and Play (UPnP™) builds on standard networking technologies and provides standardized protocols for a wide variety of home and small business devices. It allows easy interoperability of all the devices supporting the networking technologies.*

9.1.2 About UPnP* enabled devices

The UPnP device can be a PC or other device running UPnP software.

- 1 To use the UPnP device with  or , connect  or  to the UPnP network of the device (see **9.2 Connect to UPnP device**).
- 2 To play the music library of your UPnP device on  or , check that UPnP server software is properly installed and enabled on the device (e.g. Windows Media Player supplied PC Suite CD, Windows Media Player 11 or Philips Multimedia Manager). For more help refer to Windows Media Player.
- 3 To play the music library of  on the UPnP device, check with the user manual of your UPnP device to make sure it is able to receive music from other UPnP enabled devices.

9.2 Connect to the UPnP device

When connecting to the network of the UPnP device, you have the following options:

- Connect wirelessly or through an Ethernet cable.
- Connect **C** or **S**, **C** only, or **S** only.

For more information on the connection, see **11.2 Network settings: Connect to Wi-Fi enabled or wired home network**.

Tip

Connecting other UPnP clients to Philips Wireless Music Center may take longer than connecting a Philips Wireless Music Station to Center.

9.3 UPnP playback

Note

- You can only stream unprotected music files in MP3, WMA, or AAC (.m4a) format when WACS7500 is in UPnP mode.
- You cannot stream video or picture contents.

During UPnP playback, some playback features in the Wi-Fi network on Center will be unavailable, including Music Broadcast, Music Follows Me, Same Artist, Same Genre, Creating / Deleting Playlist, and Recording.

9.3.1 Play music from UPnP device

Tip

If you cannot find the UPnP server on the network, refresh the UPnP mode of Center by changing the mode (press **HOME** key).

- 1 Check that the UPnP device is switched on.
- 2 Consult the user manual of the Windows Firewall on your UPnP enabled PC, to ensure that 'UPnP Framework' is allowed in the 'Exceptions' list of the Windows Firewall.
- 3 Check that **C** or **S** is connected to the network of the UPnP device (see **11.5 Network settings:View connection status**).

C or **S**:

- 4 Press **HOME** on remote control to select UPnP mode.
 - > The display on the set shows a list of connected UPnP devices (up to 4 UPnP devices).
(Server not found appears if there is no UPnP device found in the network.)



- 5 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select your desired UPnP device.
 - > The music library of the UPnP device appears on **C** or **S** as well as on the UPnP device.

On **C** or **S**:

- 6 Play the music library of the UPnP device in the same way as you play Hard Disk (HD) (see **6 HD**).

9.3.2 Play music from Center (**C**)

- 1 Check that **C** is switched on or already in standby mode.
- 2 Check that the UPnP device is connected to **C** (see **11.5 Network settings :View connection status**)
 - > The music library of **C** appears on the UPnP enabled device as it does on **C**
- 3 Use the function keys on the UPnP device to play the music library of **C**.

10 External sources

10.1 Play or record to USB mass storage device

You can playback music from a USB device on **C** or **S**. You can also transfer the music library of **C** to a USB mass storage device, so that you can carry your favorite music with you wherever you go.

10.1.1 About USB device

Note

- In some USB flash (or memory) devices, the stored contents is recorded using copyright protection technology. Such protected contents cannot be played on any other devices (such as **C** / **S**).
- MTP (Media Transfer Protocol) USB devices are not supported.
- Protected (DRM) WMA files cannot be played due to copyright issues.

Compatible USB mass storage devices:

The following devices can be used on **C** or **S**:

- USB flash devices (USB 2.0 or USB1.1)
- USB flash memory devices (USB 2.0 or USB1.1)

Supported formats:

- USB or memory file format FAT12, FAT16, FAT32 (sector size: 512 - 65,536 bytes)
- MP3 bit rate (data rate): 32-320 Kbps and variable bit rate
- WMA v9 or earlier versions
- Directory nesting up to a maximum of 8 levels
- Number of albums/folders: maximum 99
- Number of tracks/titles: maximum 999
- File name in Unicode UTF8 (maximum length: 256 bytes)
- MP3 VBR, WMA VBR, AAC VBR format

****C** or **S** will not play or support the following:**

- Empty albums that do not contain any MP3/WMA files and hence will not be displayed.
- Unsupported formats are skipped (e.g. files with .doc extension are ignored).
- WAV, PCM audio files
- DRM protected WMA files
- WMA files in Lossless

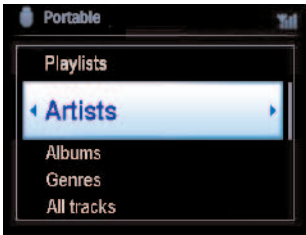
How to transfer music files from your PC to a USB mass storage device

You can easily transfer your favorite music from your PC to a USB mass storage device by drag & drop.

You can use the music management software of your flash device for the music transfer.

How to organize your MP3/WMA files on a USB mass storage device

C or **S** browses MP3/WMA files in the same way as **C** reads the HD.



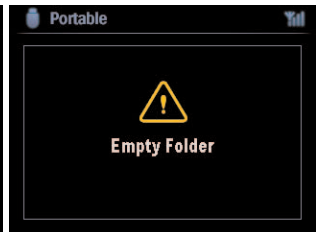
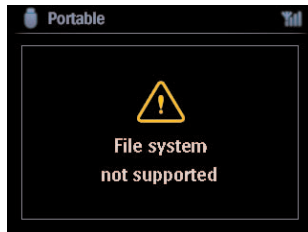
Organize your MP3/WMA files in different folders or sub-folders as needed.

✳ Tip

- Make sure that MP3 files end on extension .mp3 and WMA files end on extension .wma.
- For DRM protected WMA files, use Windows Media Player 10 (or later) for CD burning / conversion. Visit www.microsoft.com for details about Windows Media Player and WM DRM (Windows Media Digital Rights Management)

10.1.2 Play music from USB device

- 1 Check that USB device is properly connected to **C** or **S** (see **3.4.2 Installation: Connect a portable (USB mass storage) device**)
- 2 Press **HOME** once or more times to select **USB**.
> *The screen shows 'USB direct'.*



No USB Device Present appears if the USB device is not supported by **C** or **S**.
File system not supported appears if unsupported file formats are used on the USB device.
Empty Folder appears if no supported audio format file is found on the USB device.

- 3 Play audio files on the USB as you do with the albums/tracks on a HD (see **6 HD**).

✳ Tip

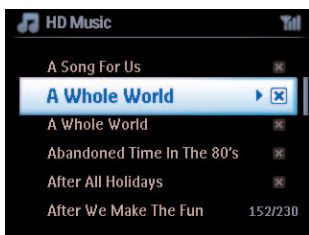
Due to compatibility reasons, the album/track information may differ from what is displayed through the music management software of the flash device.

10.1.3 Transfer music to USB device

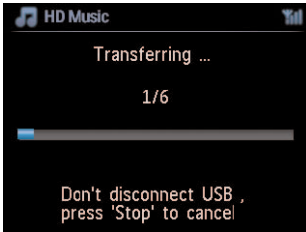
Important!

- There is no support for transfer of music to MTP devices.
- Recording is permitted only if there is no infringement of copyrights or any other rights of third parties.
- For CDs encoded with copyright protection technologies used by some record companies, recording will be restricted.
- Making unauthorized duplicates of copy-protected material, including computer programs, files, broadcasts and sound recordings, may be an infringement of copyrights and constitute a criminal offence. This equipment should not be used for such purposes.
- Transfer to USB device is only supported by **C**.
- DRM protected files might not play if they are transferred to the USB device.

- 1 Check that the USB device is properly connected to **C**.
- 2 On **C**, press **HOME** and use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** as necessary to select **HD**.
> If it is in **HD playing mode**, press **STOP** to stop playing.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select an option (Playlists, Artists, etc...) and enter the corresponding list of tracks.
- 4 In the track list screen, press **RECORD (REC)** on remote control)
> The list of tracks appears.
- 5 Press **MARK/UNMARK** to select or deselect the tracks to be recorded.
> To select/deselect all tracks, Press & hold **MARK/UNMARK**.



- 6 Press **RECORD** to start recording.
- > Display shows: **Transferring...**
The number of tracks transferred / to be transferred appears.
Selected tracks are transferred to the USB device.



Tip

- Press ◀ to stop selecting tracks and return to the list of tracks. To continue, repeat steps 3 to 5.
- Recording will also stop when:
 - the USB device is unplugged and the display shows: Connection interrupt, Cancel transfer...
 - the USB device has more than 99 folders and 999 titles and the display shows: Device is full, Cancel transferring...

Find the transferred tracks on your USB device

All the transferred tracks are saved in the USB device under the folder structure Music\Genre\Artist\Album, and are named as XX-trackname.mp3.

Play the transferred tracks on another music player

You can play the transferred tracks on music players supporting USB playback. On different players, the files/folders may be browsed in different ways.

10.2 Play your iPod music

You can enjoy the music library on your iPod player through the speaker system of the WACS7500. This feature requires a Dock. The designated Philips Docking Cradle, Model DC1050 is sold separately.

- 1 Check that **C** or **S** is switched on or in standby mode.
- 2 Connect your Dock to **C** or **S**:
 - a Connect the 9-pin docking cable to the **DOCK IN** of **C** or **S**.
 - b Connect the audio cable to the **AUX IN*** on **C** or **S** (red & white plugs must match color coding of **AUX IN**).
- 3 Insert your iPod into the Dock.
- 4 Press **HOME** to enter the main menu and use the navigation controls **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Portable ▶ iPod**.
- 5 The iPod can now be controlled via the remote control of the **C** or **S**.

✳ Tip

All features except for the volume can still be controlled on the iPod itself too.

10.3 Play external sources

You can play files from external sources on **C** or **S** by connecting the audio output (e.g. TV, VCR, Laser Disc player, DVD player). You can also record up to 3 hours of audio output to the music library in the HD of **C**.

- 1 Check that the external device is properly connected (see **3.4.4 Installation: Connect additional appliances**).
- 2 Ensure that **C** or **S** is switched on or in standby mode (see **5 Basic functions**).

On **C** or **S**:

- 3 Press **HOME** once or more times to select **AUX** **e**.

On external source:

- 4 Turn down the volume to avoid noise distortion.
Press **▶II** to start playback.
- 5 To adjust sound and volume, use the sound controls on WACS7500 or on your external source.

11 Network settings

Note

Use the 1-way remote control for Station management and Network configuration. The 2-way remote control cannot be used for these tasks.

You can add **[C]** and/or **[S]** to your existing home network. Set your network according to your needs as follows:

You can connect up to five **[S]** to **[C]**. When adding a **[S]** to the Wi-Fi network of **[C]**, you can play the music library of **[C]** on **[S]**, or move music playback between **[C]** and **[S]** (see **6 HD**).

On **[C]**:

- 1 Check that **[C]** is in HD source.
- 2 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Station Management (Mgnt)** menu.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Add New Station**.
 - > You will enter Installation Mode. Search for the new station starts.
Playback stops on the previously associated **[S]** if you are playing the HD source.

Tip

If five **[S]** are already connected, the option Add New Station is not available. In this case, please delete another **[S]** first and then add the new **[S]**.

On **[S]**:

- 1 To enter Installation Mode
 - On a new Station that is still unassociated with the Center:
 - a Power up new Station.
 - b Select language.
 - > Station enters automatic installation mode.

- On a Station that was already paired with another Center:
 - a Press **MENU**
 - b Select Installation mode
 - > Station enters automatic installation mode.

The Wi-Fi enable network is a Wi-Fi infrastructure network or a Wi-Fi enable home network with a router.

Important! Connections that include a Wi-Fi router require that the router is switched on at all times.

- 1 To connect **C** or **S** to a Wi-Fi enabled home network, start the **Add Network** procedure on **C** or **S** respectively.
- 2 For music playback within the home network, see **9.3 UPnP Playback**.

11.2.1 Network settings on Center (**C**)

For WEP (Wired Equivalent Privacy) / WPA (Wi-Fi Protected Access) key setting to secure your network, always refer to the user manual of the Router. WPA is the newest and strongest encryption method. If this is not available (generally for older devices) choose WEP.

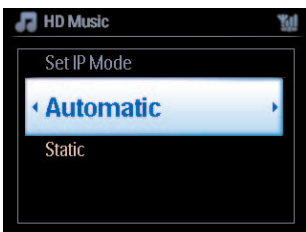

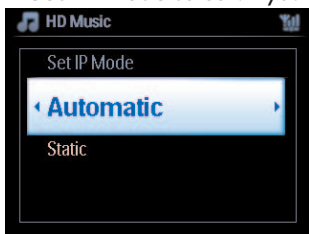
C and **S** can both access the wired and wireless home network at the same time. Using the supplied Ethernet cable, you can connect **C** or a **S** separately to a wired network while maintaining its Wi-Fi connection (e.g. the Wi-Fi connection between **C** and on or more **S**, or the Wi-Fi connection with a home network). In this way, you can opt to play the music library of the wired network only on **C** or a single **S** (UPnP playback).

At the same time, you can still enjoy all the music playback features on the Wi-Fi network.

11.4 Connect to two different home networks

WACS7500 can be added into two different home networks via wired and wireless network ports. Note that the IP addresses of the two different network ports cannot be in one subnet: WACS7500 has no router function and cannot determine which port to use.

Note

Once **C** is added to the Wi-Fi network, all Wi-Fi ad-hoc connections with the WAC7500 will be shut down.



Applicable if you have two home networks.

Once a **S** is added to the Wi-Fi (wireless) home network, the Wi-Fi wireless connection of this particular **S** to the **C** will be shut down. However **C** may still maintain its Wi-Fi ad-hoc connection with one or more other **S**.

WACS7500 cannot shadow the IP of a network device that is not activated. Please be careful of the IP address settings to avoid IP address conflict between the wired and Wi-Fi ports.

11.5 View connection status

11.5.1 View Station (**S**) status in Wi-Fi network of Center (**C**)

- 1 Check that **C** is in **HD** source.
- 2 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Station Management (Mgnt)** menu.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Station Status**.
> A list of connected **S** or previously connected **S** is displayed on the **C**.
- 5 Press **▶** to view the connection information.

11.5.2 Viewing the connection with home network

- 1 Check that **C** or **S** is in HD source.
- 2 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Information** menu.
> The display shows: **System, Wireless and Wired**.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Wireless** or **Wired**.
 - Wi-Fi: information about the Wi-Fi settings.
 - Ethernet: information about the Ethernet settings.

11.6 Connect to Internet

Important! Make sure that no dial-up, user name or password is required for the Internet access.

Check that you have connected **C** to an Access Point or Router with Internet access or connect **C** to an ADSL modem with internet access directly.

Set DNS and Gateway

If you are using a **DHCP*** enabled Access Point, Router or ADSL modem, the DNS and Gateway can be obtained automatically, so you need only to set **C** to **Automatic (DHCP)**:

- 1 Press **MENU**.
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Settings** followed by **Network**.
- 3 Select **Wired** or **Wireless**.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Automatic (DHCP)**.

* **DHCP** stands for **Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol**. It is a protocol for assigning dynamic IP addresses to devices on a network.

The following steps show how to get DNS and Gateway settings of the current network from the PC connected to the same network:

- 1 On your PC, click **Start** > **Run**
- 2 Type **cmd** and click **OK**
- 3 Type **ipconfig/all**
- 4 Write down the DNS and Gateway of the current connection.

On **C**

- 1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Settings** followed by **Network**, then **Wired**.
- 3 Press **▶** to continue.

Set DNS

- 1 Enter the DNS server you wrote down.
- 2 Press **OK** to confirm.
- 3 Press **OK** to skip **Set DNS2**.

✳ Tip

If necessary, follow Steps 1 and 2 above to set a secondary DNS server in Set DNS2.

Set Gateway

- 1 Enter the Gateway you wrote down.
- 2 Press **OK** to confirm.

Set proxy

- 1 If you are using a proxy server to visit websites, enable Proxy and proceed with the proxy setting as prompted, then press **OK** to confirm. Otherwise, press **OK** to skip.
- 2 Choose to apply the settings as prompted.
> *Settings will change.*
Connection to station could be lost appears.

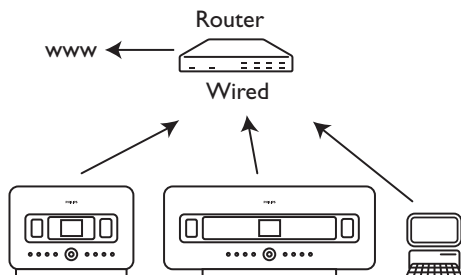

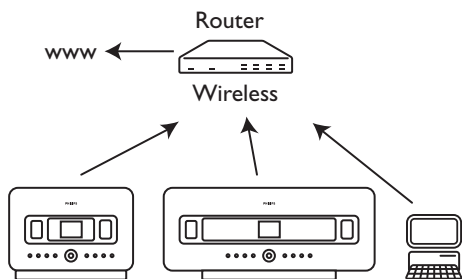

13 Gracernote® CD Information



The Gracernote® music recognition service provides the set with CD track information (including album, artist, genre, track information) from its built-in database. It allows the recorded CD tracks to be properly categorized (for example, under Artists, Albums, Genres or All tracks) and be merged with the existing tracks in the hard disk.

13.1 Gracernote® music recognition database

A 800 MB CD database (contains 800,000 most popular CDs) is embedded in every  for quick look-up on track information. An update file that contains newly released CDs is available quarterly on www.club.philips.com for download.

13.1.1 Update Gracernote® music recognition database

Use your PC to register your product on www.club.philips.com and go to 'Show Upgrades & Support' page to download Gracernote® Music recognition database update. Note that the updates are posted quarterly and new updates are independent from old updates, i.e. a new update can be installed, even without the previous update.


After storing the file on your PC, you can either burn a CD with the update file using your favorite CD burning software and drop the CD into  for automatic update, or you can use the Gracernote® update option of WADM if you have connected your PC to .

13.2 Gracernote® Internet Queries

If the CD track information of your new CD disc cannot be displayed on the WACS7500, the quickest and surest solution is to ensure you have followed the steps in **11.6 Connect to Internet** and follow **13.2.1 Look up track information**.

13.2.1 Look up CD track information

When an internet connection present (see **11.6 Connect to Internet**), insert the CD of which you require the information (insert disc into loader slot of  with graphics facing you).

Searching start immediately. The system will search the local Gracernote® CD database first. If the CD track information cannot be found, the online search will start. The search results are shown on the display of .

Tip

If the internet query failed due to a disruption in the internet connection, the error message 'Check the internet setup for CD Database on-line' will appear.

Check if your internet connection is correct (see **11.6 Connect to Internet**).

14 Firmware Upgrade

14.1 Upgrade firmware

The supplied PC Installer CD Wireless Audio Device Manager (WADM) helps you get the upgrades for WACS7500 Center and Station.

Important!

On Philips Wireless Music **C** / **S**:

- Never interrupt the firmware upgrading before its completion.
- Never operate other functions before finishing the installation.

- 6 Install and launch WADM (see section **12 Connect to your PC**).
- 7 Click to enter the Firmware upgrade submenu.
- 8 As prompted, click **Browse** and indicate the location where you kept the firmware upgrade files on PC.
- 9 Click **Apply** to start upgrading firmware.

On Philips Wireless Music Center (**C**):

The display shows '**Updating firmware, please wait...**'.

C will reboot itself during the installation process.

When **C** returns to HD screen, the installation is completed...

On Philips Wireless Music Station (**S**):

Installation starts automatically

When **S** returns to HD screen, the installation is completed.

14.2 Restore previous firmware

After the firmware of **C** is upgraded, you can restore it to its previous version as desired.

On **C**:

- 1 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Settings** followed by **Firmware**, then **Restore firmware**.
- 3 Press **▶** to select **Yes**.

After upgrading or restoring the firmware of **C**, you need to reestablish the Wi-Fi connection between **C** and **S**.

14.3 Re-establish Wi-Fi network of Center (**C**) and Stations (**S**)

On **C**:

- 2 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Station Mgmt** menu.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Add New Station**.
> *Searching for Stations starts.*

On **S**:

- 1 Disconnect the power plug of **S** and then connect them to the power supply again.
> *Connecting to Center appears.*
- 2 Press **MENU** on the remote control to enter the selection screen of **Installation Mode** and **Select Server**.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Installation Mode**.
> *Stations start to connect to C.*
- 4 Press **STOP** on **C** when all **S** are found.

15 Reset

You can restore **C** or **S** to the default settings (including network settings).

When to reset **C** or **S**:

- Reset **C** or **S** to reestablish Wi-Fi connection between **C** and **S**.
- Reset **C** or **S** to change the way **C** or **S** connects to a Wi-Fi enabled / wired home network.

Language selection screen appears.

> *The set enters Installation Mode.*
*The search for **C** or **S** starts.*
The Wi-Fi connection is being reestablished.

If the **C** is reset and **S** are not reset:

- 1 On the **S**, disconnect the power plug and connect them to the power supply again.
- 2 **Connecting to Center** appears.
- 3 On the remote control, press **MENU** to enter menu screen.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Installation Mode**.
- 5 **S** start to connect to **C**.

If a **S** is reset and **C** is not reset:

- 1 On **C**, select **HD** mode.
- 2 Press **MENU** to enter the menu screen.
- 3 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to enter **Station Management (Mgnt)** menu.
- 4 Use **▲** or **▼** and **▶** to select **Add New Station**.
> *Searching for Stations* starts.

If **C** and **S** are reset:

- 1 Select language and then enter **Installation Mode**.
- 2 Press **STOP ■** on **C** when all **S** are found.

✳ Tip

- Restoring to default settings does not delete any stored music tracks.
- After restoration to default settings, the network mode will return to ad-hoc mode.

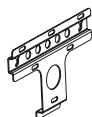
18.1 How to mount Station (**S**) to a wall

Important!

- The wall mounting instructions are intended for qualified installation personnel only!
- Request for qualified installation personnel to carry out the wall mounting which includes drilling the holes, fixing the bracket, and mounting **S** to the bracket.

Mount **S** and use **C** free standing.

18.1.1 What's in the supplied mounting kit



1 x mounting bracket for **S**



2 x screws

18.1.2 What else you'll need

- Suitable screws and wall anchors for each of the holes in the provided mounting bracket.
- Electric drill
- Screwdriver

18.1.3 Preparation

Try the necessary rear connections and the Wi-Fi connections between **C** AND **S** in order to find a suitable location for installation/mounting (see **3 Installation**).

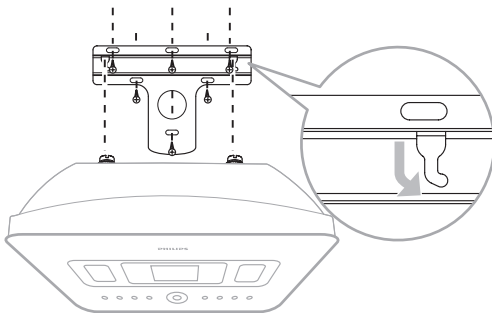
Important!

To avoid the risk of injury and damage to property as well as to the product:

- Check for supply lines (gas, water, electricity, etc.) before drilling holes.
- Assess the type of screws necessary to bear Station.
- Choose the right drill and bit for the type of wall to drill the holes.

18.1.4 Mounting Station

You can mount Station to the wall using the provided bracket.



- 1 Align the bracket in the chosen location on a wall. Use a pencil to mark the drilling positions.
- 2 Drill the holes as marked.
- 3 Fix the bracket to the wall using suitable screws (not provided) and wall anchors (not provided) for all the holes provided in the wall mounting bracket.
- 4 Use a screwdriver and fasten the supplied screws to **S** as shown.
- 5 Hook / mount **S** in place as shown.
