

# INTRODUCTION

We at Rotel want to thank you for purchasing our audio product.

Rotel audio products are designed to use the latest electronic technology, and they incorporate our long experience as a specialist manufacturer of audio equipment. We are confident that you will find satisfaction in the high quality sound and top performance, and that you will find pleasure in the functional beauty achieved through human-engineering concept. Before starting operation, please read this instruction manual thoroughly and acquaint yourself with the proper mode of using the unit and all its connections. We hope you will enjoy top-notch performance for many years to come.

# INSTALLATION

Be sure to place the unit in a level and flat place where it is free from humidity, vibration, high temperature and not to place the unit in a highly enclosed place such as near a wall or on a bookshelf. A poor ventilation will cause undesirable effects to the unit.

# POWER SUPPLY CONNECTION

For power the unit requires the normal house electrical current (AC). You may simply plug the unit into a wall outlet, or into your amplifier's (or receiver's) convenience AC outlet. **CAUTION:** Do not apply power without first making sure the proper connections are completed. If you live in U.K. and your unit comes with 2-core cord without a plug, be sure to read the exclusive caution for U.K.

# **EXCLUSIVE NOTE FOR U.K.**

If your unit comes with a 2-core cable without a plug, make certain live and neutral leads are connected to the proper terminals. Check that the terminals are screwed down firmly and no loose strands of wire are present.

IMPORTANT: The wires in this mains lead are coloured in accordance with the following code:

BLUE: NEUTRAL BROWN: LIVE

As the colours of the wires in the mains lead of this apparatus may not correspond with the coloured markings identifying the terminals in your plug proceed as follows. The wire which is coloured BLUE must be connected to the terminal which is marked with he letter N or coloured BLUE or BLACK. The wire which is coloured BROWN must be connected to the terminal which is marked with the letter L or coloured BROWN or RED.

# **CAUTION:**

To prevent electric shock do not use this (polarized) outlet unless the blades can be fully inserted to prevent blade exposure.

# ANTENNA INSTALLATION AND CONNECTION


# FM Antenna

Proper installation of antenna is the key to smooth signal reception. To install the attached T-shape indoor antenna, stretch it taut and secure horizontally along a wall or the like in a location where signal reception is optimal. Securely connect the antenna to FM antenna terminals marked "300Ω" on the rear panel if outdoor type FM antenna is installed, the T-shape antenna is not necessary. For proper use of your outdoor FM antenna, follow the instructions below.

- 1. Be sure to select the most appropriate type of antenna for the signal reception conditions in your area.
- 2. A 75-ohm coaxial cable is recommended in connecting the antenna to the unit.
- Set the antenna in a position as high as possible if buildings. mountains or other obstructions nearby affect reception.
- 4. The 75-ohm coaxial antenna cable should be properly hooked up to the designated antenna terminals on the rear panel: Locate the terminals labeled " $75\Omega$ "

#### ■ AM Antenna

The loop antenna is provided for optimum AM reception. Attach the loop antenna onto the antenna holder on the rear panel, and connect the lead wires to the antenna screw terminals marked "G" and "AM". If an outdoor antenna is desired for better reception due to difficult reception area, connect such antenna to the same screw terminals as the loop antenna. Please note that the loop antenna should be left connected to the terminals even when the external antenna is connected.



# SWITCHES AND CONTROLS

### (1) Power Button

This button turns on the unit. The LED indicator above it will glow when the power is on. Press the button a second time to turn off the power.

#### CAUTION

As long as the power cord is plugged into an AC outlet, power is supplied to the unit regardless of the setting of the Power Button.

# (2) Headphone Jack

For monitoring plug your headphones into this jack. The volume of the headphone sound can be regulated with the volume control.

#### (3) Bass and Treble Controls

These knobs allow you to regulate frequency response. Use them to tailor your favorite sound. The knob labled BASS is used for low frequency range, and the knob labeled TREBLE is high frequency range. Rotate each knob clockwise to boost the response, and counterclockwise to reduce it.

# (4) Tone Selector

With the selector at OFF, the signals do not pass through the tone control circuit (in order to prevent deterioration of the tone quality). Therefore the tone controls do not function, but this unit provides superior tone quality. If the listening room acoustics are extremely lively or dead and no adjustment is possible by rearranging the furnitures or the speakers, set this selector to ON. You can then adjust the tone with the tone controls.

# (5) Balance Control

In the central position, sound is produced in equal level from both speakers, while turning it to the right decreases the sound from the left speaker, and turning it to left decreases the sound from the right speaker.

# (6) Tape Selector

Select the tape position 1 or 2 on the selector control, depending on the cassette tape deck you wish to play is connected on the TAPE1 or TAPE 2 terminals on the rear panel.

### (7) Function Selector

The buttons are used to select program sources you wish to listen to. Press PHONO button when playing the turnatable; CD button for sound from compact disc player; TUNER when listening to AM or FM broadcast (select by BAND button); TAPE when playing cassette deck (select TAPE 1 or 2 by the tape selector); AV/AUX button for signal from video cassette recorder or video disc player connected to the unit.

# (8) Audio Muting Button

Pressing this button will immediately cause a large reduction in volume level of the sound, and pressing it a second time will restore the previous volume. This button is most useful when you wish a temporary period of quieter sound. When the audio muting is in operation, the LED indicator above the button glows.

# (9) FM Mute Off/Mono Button

When this button is pressed to ON, any FM broadcast is received monaurally. Be sure to leave the button in the released (OFF) position during normal stereo FM reception. In the OFF position, interstation noise generated when tuning in an FM station will be reduced.

# (10) FM Auto Tuning Button

Depressing this button changes FM tuning mode from manual to automatic. This button has no effect on AM tuning, which can be done in manual mode only.

### (11) Volume Control

Used to regulate the volume level. Turn clockwise to increase the level, and counterclockwise to reduce it. The control has a built-in motor drive, which allows a remote control operation from the portable transmitter handunit. The LED indicator on the knob shows the position of the level set.

# (12) Memory Button

To enter a given station frequency into the unit's memory circuit, press this button first, and then tap the desired station button.

# (13) Tuning Up/Down Button

Used to tune in a desired broadcasting station. Press the left part of the button (marked <) to tune in lower frequencies than the reading on the frequency display, or press the right part (marked >) to tune in higher frequencies.

# (14) Station Buttons

These buttons are used to tune in to desired preset stations, or to preset given station frequencies in unit's memory. Each station selected will be indicated by LED.

# (15) Remote Sensor

Receives operating commands in the from of infrared beams emitted from the remote transmitter unit.

# (16) Signal Indicator


The 5 LEDs show incoming signal strength; the receiving condition is optimal when all LEDs are illuminated.

# (17) Frequency Display

Indicates frequency currently tuned in, along with not ation "FM" and "MHZ" in FM reception, or "AM" and "KHZ" in AM reception. The word "MEMO" will appear when Memory Program button is pressed.

# (18) Stereo Indicator

Glows when stereo broadcasting signal is tuned in. Note that when stereo signal is very weak, the unit will not give stereo reproduction, and the indicator will not light up.



# Remote Control Function

- (19) Power Button for on/off.
- (20) Function Selector Buttons (same as item 6, 7)
- (21) Casette Control Buttons

Permit you to remote control Rotel RD-865 or RD-855 casette deck connected to the REMOTE socket on the control.

Press < button to rewind tape.

Press button to play back tape.

Press ▶▶ button to advance tape rapidly forward.

Press II button for temporary suspension of tape motion during recording or playback. Pressing the button a second time will restart the tape, returning the tape deck section to mode before interruption.

Use ● button when you wish to record. However, please follow the proper recording procedure as below;

- 1. press Pause II button first for standby.
- 2. Then, press record button. Recording still will not be started and still in the standby mode.
- 3. Press Play ▶ button to start recording.
- 4. Press Pause III button to stop recording temporarily, yet still remain in recording ready mode. Press Play
- ▶ button to resume recording.
- 5. Press Stop button to end recording.

Press button to disengage any control mode, be it playback, record, fast forward, or rewind.

- (22) Present Station Buttons (same as item 14)
- (23) Band Selector Button (saem as item 7)
- (24) Tuning Buttons (same as item 13)
- (25) Audio Muting Button (same as item 8)
- (26) Volume Button (same as item 11)

The volume control (rotary) on the main unit will turn automatically by means of a built-in motor drive when the volume control buttons on the remote control are pressed.

# **OPERATION**

- The RTC-850 (RTC-850L) employs a quartz PLL synthesier for easy and accurate tuning. Tuning frequency is visible on the digital readout, and you can tune in to the desired station accurately. With the unit's memory circuit, you can preset memory tuning. This is a feature only a synthesized tuner can offer, letting you recall a stored station frequency instantly with a single tap of a button.
- One station button can store one AM or one FM station in its memory. The RTC-850 permits a total of 16 stations to be stored, be each station AM or an FM. For example, you could store 12 FM and 4 AM station randomly.
- The power source of the unit's memory citcuit is the capacitor back-up type. If power cord is unplugged, or if there is a power failure, the electrical energy accumulated in the capacitor while the unit was ON will retain the frequencies stored in the memory circuit for three days. (The memory is retained as long as the power cord is plugged into an AC outlet, regardless of the position of the POWER button.) If you leave the power cord unplugged for over three days, the stored frequencies will be lost.
- Fit two SUM-3 ("AA") dry batteries into the remote transmitter unit, correctly matching the polarity marking "+" and "—". The life expectancy of the batteries in the unit should be about two years.

# **Radio Listening**

1. Depress TUNER Function button ON. Select AM or FM by BAND button.

- 2. Tune in to the desired station by means of tuning or stations buttons. (See section on "TUNING".)
  - 3. Raise the volume to the desired level.

#### TUNING

The unit is designed to permit three modes of tuning: FM Auto tuning, manual tuning, and preset memory tuning.

# FM Auto Tuning (for FM Reception Only)

Set FM Auto Tuning button to the depressed position. Press DOWN or Up Tuning button. Automatic scanning of FM band begins. Scanning stops when it reaches a point where the input signal exceeds a certain acceptable level. The receiving frequency is held on the readout. To tune in to another station, press DOWN or UP button according to the frequency of the desired station.

### Manual Tuning

Set FM Auto tuning button to the released position. A touch of the tuning button, on DOWN or up, will shift the tuning frequency in specified increments. If you keep the button pressed down, the frequency will change continuously. Release the button to stop frequency change.

# · Preset Memory Tuning

Tune in to the desired station in either auto or manual tuning mode. Press the Memory Program button. The word "MEMO" will appear on the frequency display, then, press any station button, 1 through 16, to enter the frequency into the memory circuit. Thereafter, you may recall the same frequency any time simply by pressing the same button. Note that the word "MEMO" remains on the display panel for several seconds only; you should tap the appropriate station button to enter the station frequency during that time. If the word "MEMO" disppears before you press the station button, entry cannot be made. In that case start again, following the above procedures. The above procedures should also be following to change the station preset for a given station button.

Note: If you have turned off the unit, and turn it on again, the unit will tune in to the station frequency to which it was tuned immediately before turn-off.

# **Turntable Listening**

- 1. Depress PHONO function button ON.
- 2. Start the play, then raise the volume.

# Listening from Compact Disc Player

- 1. Depress CD function button ON.
- Put the compact disc player in the play mode according to instructions given for the equipment.
  - 3. Raise the volume to the desired level.

# Listening from Video Disc Player of Video Cassette: Recorder

- 1. Depress AV/AUX function button ON.
- Put the video cassette recorder or video disc player in the play mode according to instructions given for the equipment.
  - 3. Raise the volume to the desired level.

# Tape Deck Playback

- 1. Turn the Tape Selector to 1 or 2, according to the tape deck you wish to use.
  - 2. Start playback.
  - 3. Raise the volume.

# Remote Control Function

- (19) Power Button for on/off.
- (20) Function Selector Buttons (same as item 6, 7)
- (21) Casette Control Buttons

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  - 3. Raise the volume to the desired level.

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Note: If you have turned off the unit, and turn it on again, the unit will tune in to the station frequency to which it was tuned immediately before turn-off.

# **Turntable Listening**

- 1. Depress PHONO function button ON.
- 2. Start the play, then raise the volume.

# Listening from Compact Disc Player

- 1. Depress CD function button ON.
- Put the compact disc player in the play mode according to instructions given for the equipment.
  - 3. Raise the volume to the desired level.

# Listening from Video Disc Player of Video Cassette: Recorder

- 1. Depress AV/AUX function button ON.
- Put the video cassette recorder or video disc player in the play mode according to instructions given for the equipment.
  - 3. Raise the volume to the desired level.

# Tape Deck Playback

- 1. Turn the Tape Selector to 1 or 2, according to the tape deck you wish to use.
  - 2. Start playback.
  - 3. Raise the volume.

# Recording Program Source

Play the desired program source according to the procedures mentioned above (except TAPE). The signal from the source will be sent through the TAPE OUT terminals (both TAPE 1 and TAPE 2). Put the tape deck in the record mode to record the signal. During recording, operation of Volume Control. and Tone Control will have no effect on the signal being sent through TAPE OUT terminals.

# **Tape Dubbing**

Two tape decks are used to perform tape-to-tape (dubbing). The unit allows dubbing from TAPE 1 to TAPE 2, or TAPE 2 to TAPE 1.

- 1. Set TAPE button ON.
- 2. Set Tape Selector to TAPE 1 or 2, depending on the tape deck for playback.
- 3. Commence recording with the other tape deck (if the Tape Selector is set at 1, play TAPE 1 and record with TAPE 2, and vice versa).

# **HUM AND NOISE**

Hum often accompanies activation of power supply. If hum is generated, try replugging the power cord into the wall outlet, reversing the plug this time. Other possible cause of hum include improper routing of connecting cords (try changing cord position). or incorrect pin-plug insertion. Check all connections if hum persists.

If noise is introduced, it is usually caused by improper positioning of antenna cable or improper antenna installation. Use a 75-ohm cable for outdoor FM antenna and minimize multipath to obtain optimal signal reception. Note that during signal reception the unit may pick up noise from other household electric appliances (as when switching power on or off). In that case, check the relative location of the appliances and keep them away from the unit, or vice versa, as nocessary.

Note 1: In a location near a broadcasting station, very strong signals may cause noise or distortion, depending on the type of antenna used. In that case, install an attenuator between the antenna and the tuner.

Note 2: Inside a concrete building, FM signals are weakened and satisfactory reception may be difficult. An outdoor FM antenna will best remedy such a situation.

# **VOLTAGE SELECTION**

The unit is a variable voltage equipment that can run on 120V, 220V or 240V power supply. Your unit should already be preset at the proper voltage for use in your area. However, if your move to an area where the power supply voltage is different, consult your dealer.
