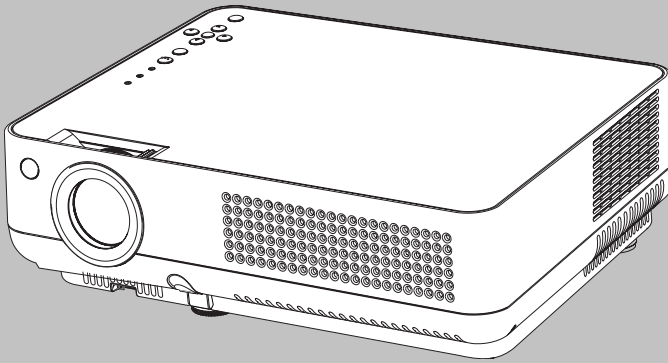

# Features and Design

This Multimedia Projector is designed with the most advanced technology for portability, durability, and ease of use. This projector utilizes built-in multimedia features, a palette of 16.77 million colors, and matrix liquid crystal display (LCD) technology.

## ◆ **Compact Design**

This projector is designed compact in size and weight. It is easy to carry and work anywhere you wish to use.

## ◆ **Compatibility**

The projector widely accepts various video and computer input signals including: Computers, 6 Color systems (PAL, SECAM, NTSC, NTSC4.43, PAL-M, and PAL-N), Component video, S-Video and RGB scart.

## ◆ **Simple Computer System Setting**

The projector has the Multi-scan system to conform to almost all computer output signals quickly. (p.26)

## ◆ **Digital Zoom (for Computer)**

The digital zoom function expands (to approx. 16 times of the screen size) the image size, allowing you to focus on crucial information during the presentation. (p.33)

## ◆ **Noise Reduction function**

The Noise reduction function helps you to reduce the contained noise on the screen to get smoother images. (p.39)

## ◆ **Blackboard Function**

Blackboard\* can be used as a projection screen.

\*The board color is limited to Green. (p.30, 37)

## ◆ **Multilanguage Menu Display**

Operation menu is available in 16 languages: English, German, French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, Swedish, Finnish, Polish, Hungarian, Romanian, Russian, Chinese, Korean, and Japanese. (p.41)

## ◆ **Logo Function**

The Logo function allows you to customize the screen logo with the Logo functions. (p.42-44) You can capture an image for the screen logo, choose a logo between provided and captured.

## ◆ **Power Management**

The Power management function reduces power consumption and maintains the lamp life. (p.46)

## ◆ **Lamp Control**

Brightness of the projection lamp can be selected. (p.47)

## ◆ **Security Function**

The Security function helps you to ensure the security with the Key lock (p.48) and the PIN code lock (p.18, 48, 49) functions. You can lock the operation on the projector and the remote control. Also you can prevent unauthorized persons from using the projector.

## ◆ **Input Search Function**

Input signal can be searched automatically. (p.45)

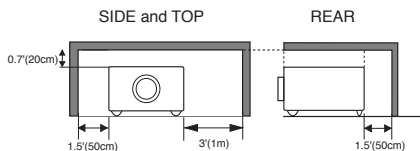

## Safety Precaution

- This projector produces intense light from the projection lens. Do not stare directly into the lens as much as possible. Eye damage could result. Be especially careful that children do not stare directly into the beam.
- Install the projector in a proper position. If not, it may result in a fire hazard.
- Allowing the proper amount of space on the top, sides, and rear of the projector is critical for proper air circulation and cooling of the unit. The dimensions shown here indicate the minimum space required. If the projector is to be built into a compartment or similarly enclosed, these minimum distances must be maintained.
- Do not cover the ventilation slot on the projector. Heat build-up can reduce the service life of your projector, and can also be dangerous.



- If the projector is not to be used for an extended time, unplug the projector from the power outlet.

## CAUTION ON HANGING FROM THE CEILING



When hanging the projector from the ceiling, clean air intake vents, air filters, or top of the projector periodically with a vacuum cleaner. If you leave the projector unclean for a long time, the dust will block the operation of the cooling function, and it may cause a breakdown or a disaster.

# Safety Instructions

All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the product is operated.

Read all of the instructions given here and retain them for later use. Unplug this projector from AC power supply before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.

Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the projector.

For added protection to the projector during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet. This will prevent damage due to lightning and power line surges.

Do not expose this unit to rain or use near water... for example, in a wet basement, near a swimming pool, etc...

Do not use attachments not recommended by the manufacturer as they may cause hazards.

Do not place this projector on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The projector may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the projector. Use only with a cart or stand recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the projector. Wall or shelf mounting should follow the manufacturer's instructions, and should use a mounting kit approved by the manufacturers.

An appliance and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the appliance and cart combination to overturn.



Slots and openings in the back and bottom of the cabinet are provided for ventilation, to ensure reliable operation of the equipment and to protect it from overheating.

The openings should never be covered with cloth or other materials, and the bottom opening should not be blocked by placing the projector on a bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. This projector should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register.

This projector should not be placed in a built-in installation such as a book case unless proper ventilation is provided.

Never push objects of any kind into this projector through cabinet slots as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the projector.

Do not install the projector near the ventilation duct of air-conditioning equipment.

This projector should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supplied, consult your authorized dealer or local power company.

Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in fire or electric shock. Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not locate this projector where the cord may be damaged by persons walking on it.

Do not attempt to service this projector yourself as opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltage or other hazards. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

Unplug this projector from wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:

- When the power cord or plug is damaged or frayed.
- If liquid has been spilled into the projector.
- If the projector has been exposed to rain or water.
- If the projector does not operate normally by following the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the operating instructions as improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and will often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the projector to normal operation.
- If the projector has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged.
- When the projector exhibits a distinct change in performance-this indicates a need for service.

When replacement parts are required, be sure the service technician has used replacement parts specified by the manufacturer that have the same characteristics as the original part. Unauthorized substitutions may result in fire, electric shock, or injury to persons.

Upon completion of any service or repairs to this projector, ask the service technician to perform routine safety checks to determine that the projector is in safe operating condition.

## Air Circulation

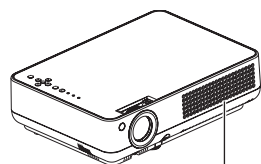
Openings in the cabinet are provided for ventilation and to ensure reliable operation of the product and to protect it from overheating, and these openings must not be blocked or covered.

### CAUTION

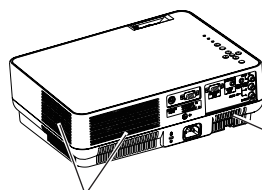
Hot air is exhausted from the exhaust vent. When using or installing the projector, the following precautions should be taken.

- Do not put any flammable object or spray can near the projector, hot air is exhausted from the ventilation holes.
- Keep the exhaust vent at least 3' (1 m) away from any objects.
- Do not touch a peripheral part of the exhaust vent, especially screws and metallic part. This area will become hot while the projector is being used.
- Do not put anything on the cabinet. Objects put on the cabinet will not only get damaged but also cause fire hazard by heat.

Cooling fans are provided to cool down the projector. The fans' running speed is changed according to the temperature inside the projector.

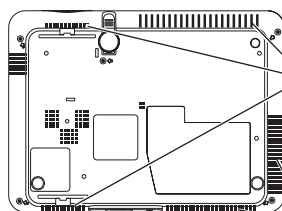


Air Intake Vent

(Hot air exhaust)

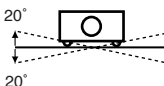

## Installing the Projector in Proper Position

Install the projector properly. Improper Installation may reduce the lamp life and cause a fire hazard.



Do not tilt the projector more than 20 degrees from side to side.



Do not point the projector up to project an image.



Do not point the projector down to project an image.



Do not put the projector on either side to project an image.

## Moving the Projector

When moving the projector, close the lens shutter and retract the adjustable foot to prevent damage to the lens and cabinet. When the projector is not in use for an extended period, put it into a suitable case to protect the projector.

When handling the projector, do not drop, bump, subject it to strong forces, or put other things on the cabinet.



### USE CAUTION IN CARRYING OR TRANSPORTING THE PROJECTOR

- Do not drop or bump the projector, otherwise damages or malfunctions may result.
- When carrying the projector, use a suitable carrying case.
- Do not transport the projector by using a courier or transport service in an unsuitable transport case. This may cause damage to the projector. To transport the projector through a courier or transport service, consult your dealer for their information.
- Do not put the projector in a case before the projector is cooled enough.

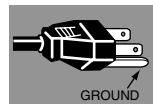
## AC Power Cord Requirement

The AC Power Cord supplied with this projector meets the requirement for use in the country you purchased it.

### AC Power Cord for the United States and Canada:

AC Power Cord used in the United States and Canada is listed by the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) and certified by the Canadian Standard Association (CSA).

AC Power Cord has a grounding-type AC line plug. This is a safety feature to be sure that the plug will fit into the power outlet. Do not try to defeat this safety feature. Should you be unable to insert the plug into the outlet, contact your electrician.



### AC Power Cord for the United Kingdom:

This cord is already fitted with a moulded plug incorporating a fuse, the value of which is indicated on the pin face of the plug. Should the fuse need to be replaced, an ASTA approved BS 1362 fuse must be used of the same rating, marked thus  $\diamond$ . If the fuse cover is detachable, never use the plug with the cover omitted. If a replacement fuse cover is required, ensure it is of the same colour as that visible on the pin face of the plug (i.e. red or orange). Fuse covers are available from the Parts Department indicated in your User Instructions. If the plug supplied is not suitable for your socket outlet, it should be cut off and destroyed.

The end of the flexible cord should be suitably prepared and the correct plug fitted. (See Over)

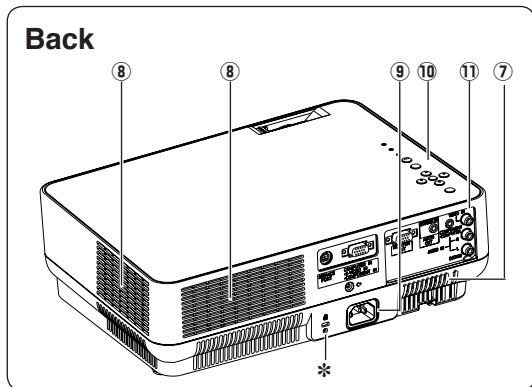

## ① SERVICE PORT

This jack is used to service the projector.

## ② COMPUTER IN /S-VIDEO IN /COMPONENT IN

Connect output signal from a computer, RGB scart 21-pin video output, S-VIDEO output, or component video output to this terminal. (p.15-17)

## ③ MONITOR OUT

This terminal can be used to output the incoming signal from COMPUTER IN/ S-VIDEO IN/COMPONENT IN terminal to the other monitor. (p.15, 17)

## ④ AUDIO OUT (VARIABLE)

Connect an external audio amplifier to this jack. (p.15 - 17)

This terminal outputs sound from AUDIO IN terminal (⑤ or ⑦).

## ⑤ COMPONENT/ COMPUTER AUDIO IN

Connect the audio output (stereo) from a computer or video equipment connected to ② to this jack. (p.15, 17)

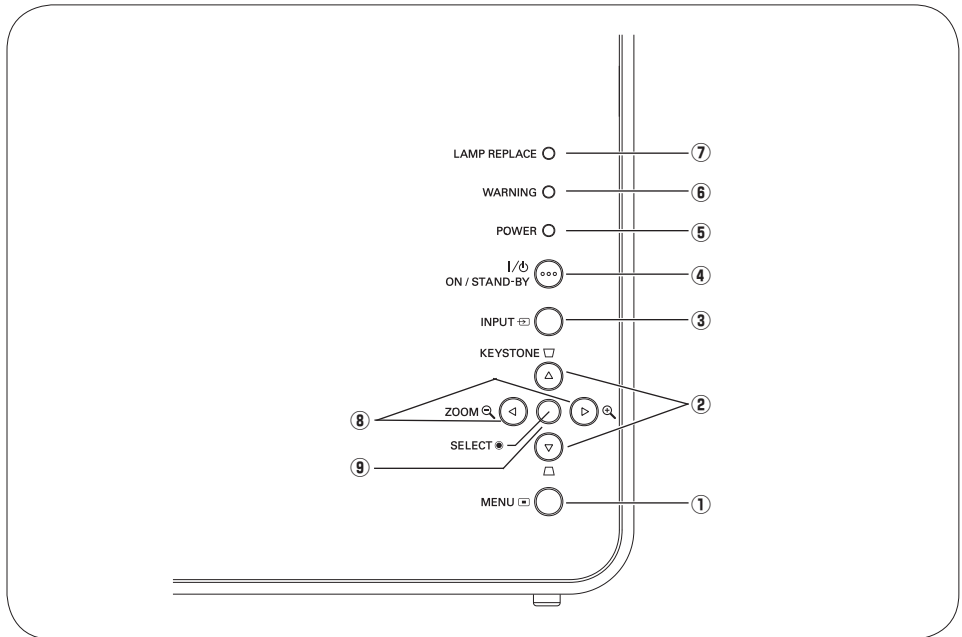
## ⑥ VIDEO IN

Connect the composite video output from video equipment to VIDEO jack. (p.16)

## ⑦ AUDIO IN

Connect the audio output from video equipment connected to ② or ⑥ to this jack. (When the audio output is monaural, connect it to L (MONO) jack.) (p.16)

**① MENU button**

Open or close the On-Screen Menu. (p.20)

**② KEystone ▲▼ buttons \***

Correct the keystone distortion. (p.22, 41)

**③ INPUT button**

Select input source. (p.25, 34, 35)

**④ POWER ON/STAND-BY button**

Turn the projector on or off. (p.18, 19)

**⑤ POWER indicator**

Emit a red light until the projector gets ready to be turned on. It turns red when the projector is in the stand-by mode. It remains green while the projector is under operation. (p.18, 19, 60)

**⑥ WARNING indicator**

Emit a red light when the projector detects an abnormal condition. This also blinks red when the internal temperature of the projector exceeds the operating range. (p.51, 60)

**⑦ LAMP REPLACE indicator**

Turn yellow when the life of the projection lamp draws to an end. (p.54, 60)

**⑧ ZOOM +/- (◀▶) buttons \***

Adjust the screen size. (p.22, 41)

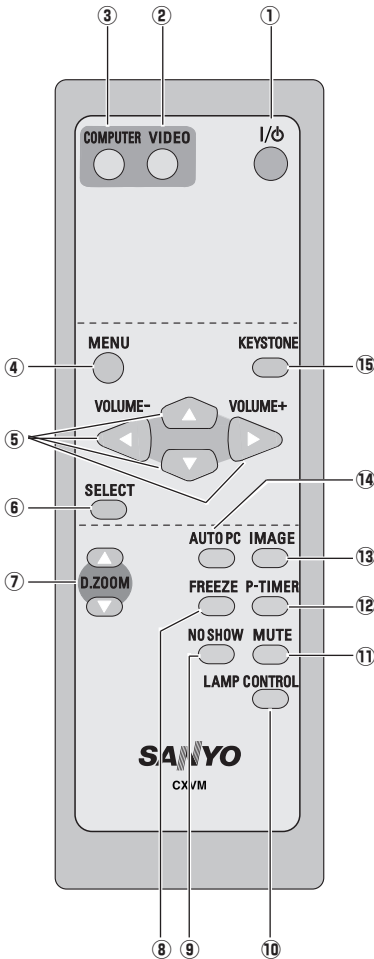
**⑨ SELECT button**

- Execute the selected item. (p.20)
- Expand or compress the image in Digital zoom mode. (p.33)

**\* POINT (▲▼◀▶) buttons**

- ② and ⑧ can be used as the point (▲▼◀▶) buttons.
- Select an item or adjust the value in the On-Screen Menu. (p.20)

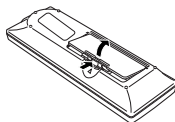

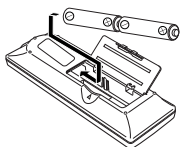

### Remote Control Battery Installation

- 1** Open the battery compartment lid.

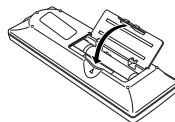


- 2** Install new batteries into the compartment.



**Two AA size batteries**  
For correct polarity (+ and -), be sure battery terminals are in contact with pins in the compartment.

- 3** Replace the compartment lid.

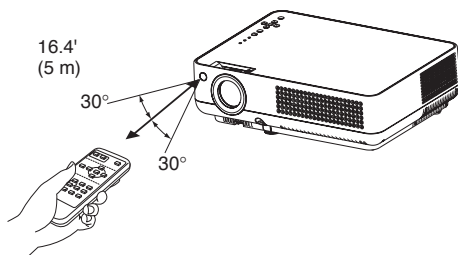


To insure safe operation, please observe the following precautions:

- Use two (2) AA or LR6 type alkaline batteries.
- Always replace batteries in sets.
- Do not use a new battery with a used battery.
- Avoid contact with water or liquid.
- Do not expose the remote control to moisture or heat.
- Do not drop the remote control.
- If the battery has leaked on the remote control, carefully wipe the case clean and install new batteries.
- Risk of explosion if a battery is replaced by an incorrect type.
- Dispose of used batteries according to the instructions.

### Operating Range

Point the remote control toward the projector (Infrared Remote Receiver) when pressing any button. Maximum operating range for the remote control is about 16.4' (5 m) and 60° in front of the projector.



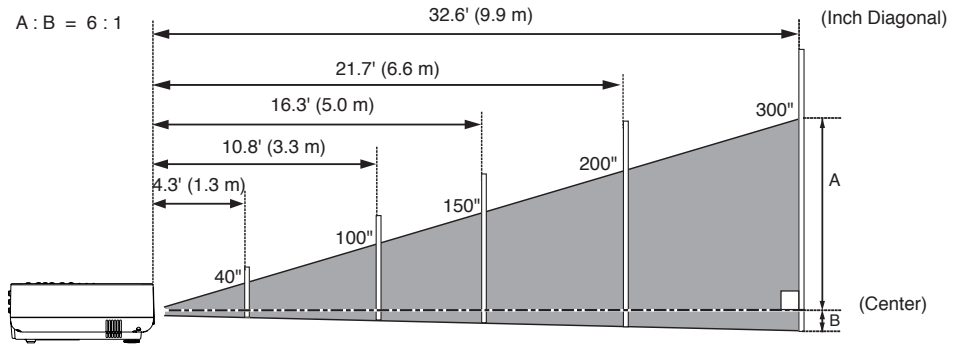
# Installation

## Positioning the Projector

For projector positioning, see the figures below. The projector should be set horizontally to the flat screen.

✓ **Note:**

- The brightness in the room has a great influence on picture quality. It is recommended to limit ambient lighting in order to obtain the best image.
- The values shown below are approximate and may vary from the actual sizes.



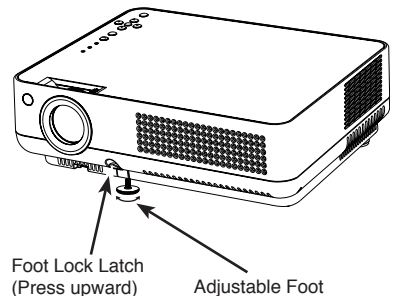

## Adjustable Foot

Projection angle can be adjusted up to 10.0 degrees with the adjustable foot.

Press the Foot Lock Latch upward to release the adjustable foot. At the desirable angle, release the latch to lock the adjustable foot. Rotate the adjustable foot from side to side for fine adjust.

Keystone distortion of the projected image can be corrected by menu operation. (p.22, 41)

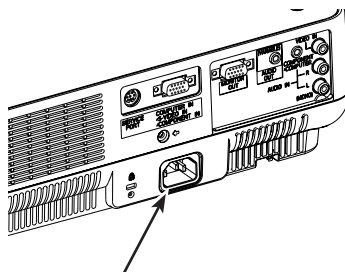


## Connecting the AC Power Cord

This projector uses nominal input voltages of 100-120 V or 200-240 V AC and it automatically selects the correct input voltage. It is designed to work with single-phase power systems having a grounded neutral conductor. To reduce the risk of electrical shock, do not plug into any other type of power system.

If you are not sure of the type of power being supplied, consult your authorized dealer or service station.

Connect the projector with all peripheral equipment before turning the projector on. (See pages 15-17 for connection.)



Connect the AC power cord (supplied) to the projector.





The AC outlet must be near this equipment and must be easily accessible.

### CAUTION

For safety, unplug the AC power cord when the projector is not in use. When this projector is connected to an outlet with the AC power cord, it is in Stand-by mode and consumes a little electric power.

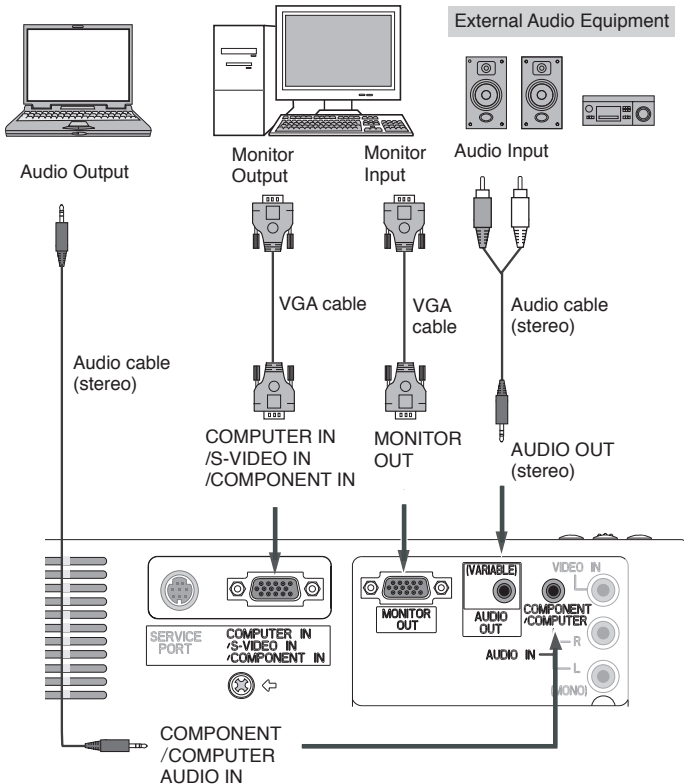

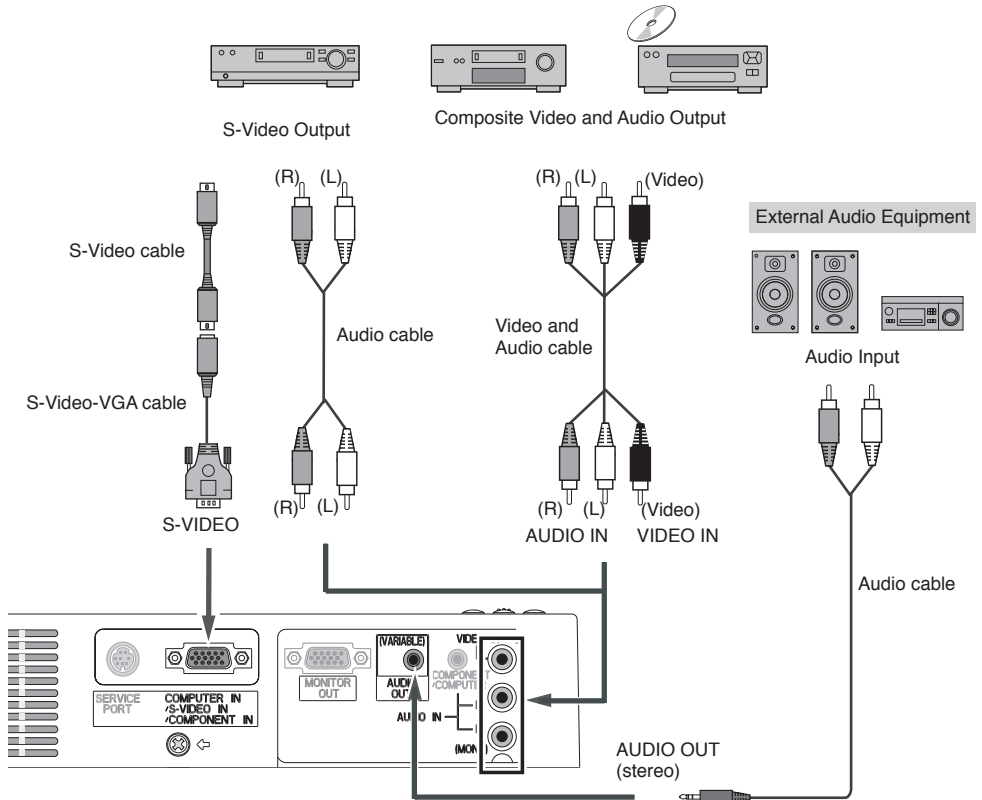

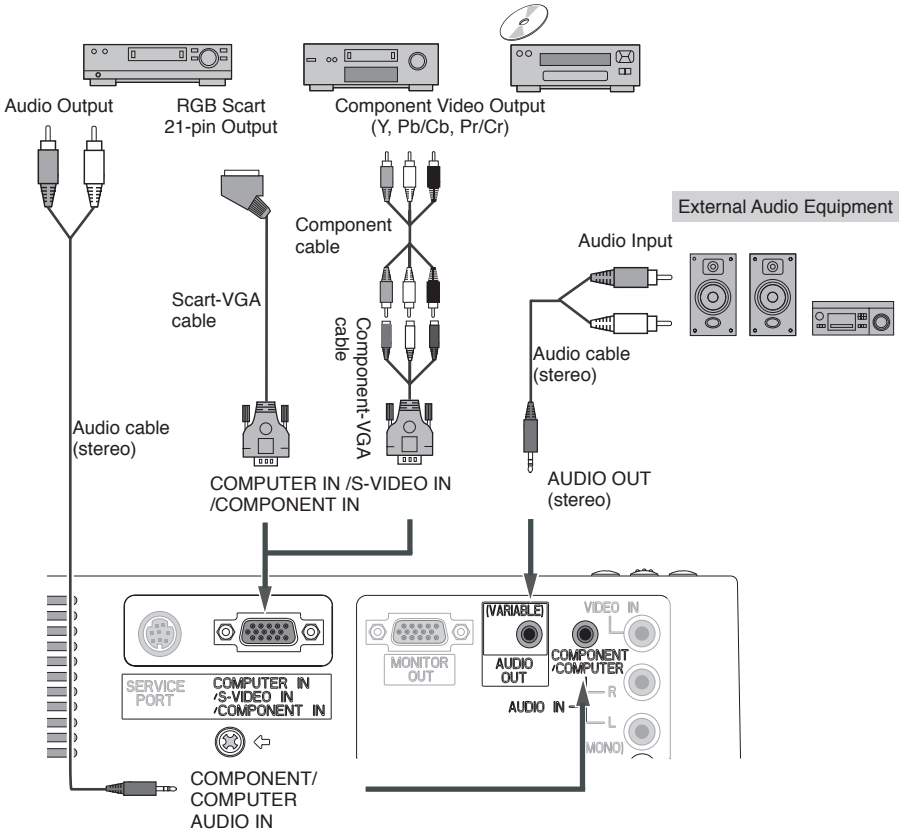

# Basic Operation

## Turning On the Projector

- 1 Complete peripheral connections (with a computer, VCR, etc.) before turning on the projector.
- 2 Connect the projector's AC power cord into an AC outlet. The POWER indicator becomes red. Open the Lens Shutter by sliding the Lens Shutter Lever.(see page 8)
- 3 Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button on the top control or on the remote control. The POWER indicator becomes green and the cooling fans start to operate. The preparation display appears on the screen and the count down starts.
- 4 After the countdown, the input source that was selected the last time and the Lamp mode status icon (see page 47) appears on the screen.

If the projector is locked with a PIN code, PIN code Input Dialog Box appears. Enter the PIN code as instructed below.

### To Enter a PIN code

Select a number by pressing the Point ▲▼ buttons, and then press the Point ► button to fix the number and move the pointer. The number changes to "\*". If you fixed an incorrect number, move the pointer to the number you want to correct by pressing the Point ◀ button, and then select the correct number by pressing the Point ▲▼ buttons.

Repeat this step to complete entering a four-digit number.

"1234" is set as the initial PIN code at the factory.

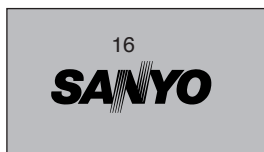
After entering the four-digit number, move the pointer to "Set" by pressing the Point ► button. Press the SELECT button so that you can start to operate the projector.

If you entered an incorrect PIN code, "PIN code" and the number (\*\*\*\*) turns red. Enter the PIN code all over again.

### What is PIN code?

PIN (Personal Identification Number) code that allows the person who knows it to operate the projector. Setting a PIN code prevents unauthorized use of the projector.

A PIN code consists of a four-digit number. Refer to the PIN code lock function in the Setting on pages 48 and 49 for locking operation of the projector with your PIN code.



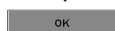
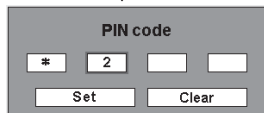
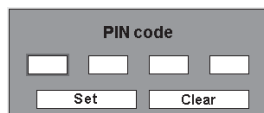

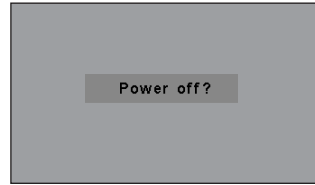


### CAUTION ON HANDLING PIN CODE

If you forget your PIN code, the projector can no longer be started. Set a new PIN code with special care, write it down in column on page 65 of this manual, and keep it at hand. Should the PIN code be missing or forgotten, consult your dealer or service center.

## Turning Off the Projector

- 1 Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button on the top control or on the remote control, and a message "Power off?" appears on the screen.
- 2 Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button again to turn off the projector. The POWER indicator starts to blink red, and it continues while the cooling fans are operating for about 90 seconds. (You can select the level of fan quietness and rotation speed. See page 50.)  
At this time you can disconnect the AC power cord even if the fans are still running.
- 3 When the projector has cooled down enough to be turned on again, the POWER indicator lights red.



The message disappears after 4 seconds.



TO MAINTAIN THE LIFE OF THE LAMP, ONCE YOU TURN THE PROJECTOR ON, WAIT AT LEAST FIVE MINUTES BEFORE TURNING IT OFF.

### ✓ Note:

- When the On start function is on, this projector is turned on automatically by connecting the AC power cord to an AC outlet. (p.47)
- Do not operate the projector continuously without rest. Continuous use may result in shortening the lamp life. Turn off the projector and give it a rest about an hour in every 24 hours.
- The running speed of cooling fans is changed according to the temperature inside the projector.
- Do not put the projector in a case before the projector is cooled enough.
- If the WARNING indicator blinks or emits a red light, see "Warning Indicator" on page 51.
- While the POWER indicator is blinking, lamp is being cooled down and the projector cannot be turned on. Wait until the POWER indicator becomes red to be turned on again.

If Computer is selected as a signal source, this projector automatically detects the signal format and tunes to project a proper image without any additional setting. (Signal formats provided in this projector is shown on page 61.)

One of the following messages may appear when:

**Auto** The projector cannot recognize the connected signal conforming to the provided PC Systems. The message "Auto" is displayed on the PC System Menu icon and the Auto PC Adjustment function works to display proper images. If the image is not projected properly, a manual adjustment is required. (p.28, 29)

**----** There is no signal input from computer. Check the connection between your computer and the projector. (See "Troubleshooting" on page 56.)

**Mode 1** The preset system is manually adjusted in the PC Adjust Menu. The adjusted data can be stored in Mode 1 ~ 5. (p.28, 29)

**SVGA 1** PC Systems provided in this projector is chosen. The projector chooses a proper system provided in the projector and displays it.

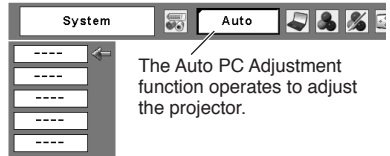

To capture the image, select [Yes]. To cancel the Capture function, select [No].

✓ **Note:**

- Before capturing an image, select Standard in the Image Select Menu to capture a proper image. (p.30, 37.)

## Power management

For reducing power consumption as well as maintaining the lamp life, the Power management function turns off the projection lamp when the projector is not used for a certain period.



When the input signal is interrupted and no button is pressed for more than 30 seconds, the timer display with "No signal" appears. The countdown starts to turn off the lamp.

Select one of the operations:

**Ready . . . . .** When the lamp has been fully cooled down, the POWER indicator changes to green blinking. In this condition, the projection lamp is turned on if the input signal is reconnected or any button on the top control or remote control is pressed.

**Shut down . . . .** When the lamp has been fully cooled down, the power is turned off.

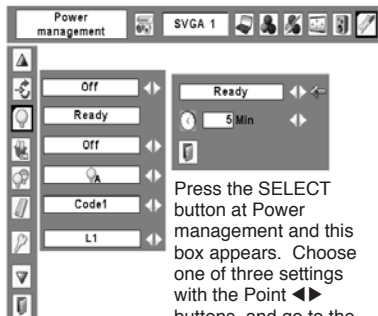

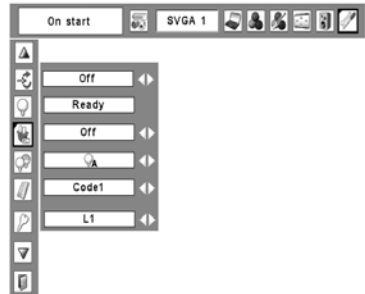
This projector provides two different remote control codes: the factory-set initial code (Code 1) and the secondary code (Code 2). This switching function prevents remote control interference when operating several projectors or video equipment at the same time.

When operating the projector in "Code 2", both the projector and the remote control must be switched to "Code 2".

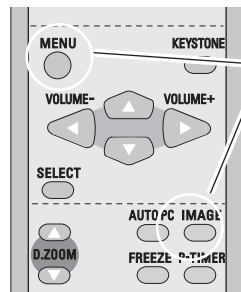

-  . . . . . lock the operation of the top control. To unlock, use the remote control.
-  . . . . . lock the operation of the remote control. To unlock, use the top control.

If the top control accidentally becomes locked and you do not have the remote control or there is something wrong with your remote control, contact the dealer where you purchased the projector or the service center.

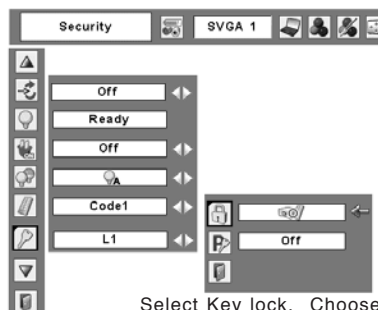
### PIN code lock

This function prevents the projector from being operated by an unauthorized person and provides the following settings for security options.

- Off . . . . . the projector is not locked with a PIN code.
- On1 . . . . . require to enter a PIN code every time turning on the projector.
- On2 . . . . . require to enter a PIN code to operate the projector once the power cord is disconnected; as long as the AC power cord is connected, the projector can be operated without a PIN code.

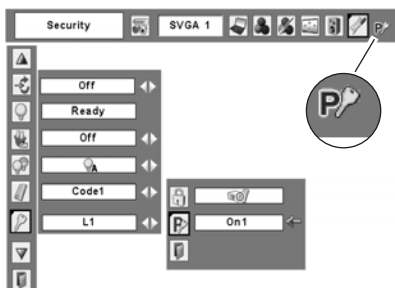

# Maintenance and Cleaning

## Warning Indicator

The WARNING indicator shows the state of the function which protects the projector. Check the state of the WARNING indicator and the POWER indicator to take proper maintenance.

### The projector is shut down and the WARNING indicator is blinking red.

When the temperature inside the projector reaches a certain level, the projector is automatically shut down to protect the inside of the projector. The POWER indicator is blinking while the projector is being cooled down. When the projector has cooled down sufficiently (to its normal operating temperature), it can be turned on again by pressing the POWER ON/STAND-BY button on the top control or on the remote control.

✓ **Note:**

The WARNING indicator continues to blink even after the temperature inside the projector returns to normal. When the projector is turned on again, the WARNING indicator stops blinking.

### Then check the matters below:

- Did you provide appropriate space for the projector to be ventilated? Check the installing condition to see if ventilation slots are not blocked.
- Has the projector been installed near the Air-Conditioning/Heating Duct or Vent? Move the installation of the projector away from the duct or vent.
- Are the air filters clean? Clean the air filters periodically. (p.52)

### The projector is shut down and the WARNING indicator emits a red light.

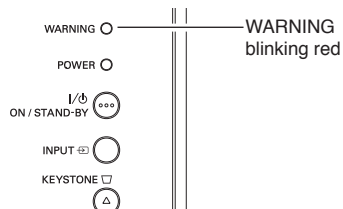
When the projector detects an abnormal condition, it is automatically shut down to protect the inside of the projector and the WARNING indicator becomes red. In this case, disconnect the AC power cord and reconnect it, and then turn the projector on once again to verify operation. If the projector cannot be turned on and the WARNING indicator emits a red light, disconnect the AC power cord and contact the service station.



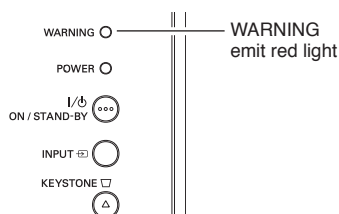
### **CAUTION**

DO NOT LEAVE THE PROJECTOR WITH THE AC POWER CORD CONNECTED UNDER THE ABNORMAL CONDITION. IT MAY RESULT IN FIRE OR ELECTRIC SHOCK.

### Cleaning the Air Filters

Air filters prevent dust from accumulating on the optical elements inside the projector. Should the air filters become clogged with dust particles, it will reduce cooling fans' effectiveness and may result in internal heat build up and adversely affect the life of the projector. Clean the air filters following the steps below.

- 1 Turn off the projector, and disconnect the AC power cord from the AC outlet.
- 2 Turn over the projector and remove the air filters by pulling the latches upward.
- 3 Clean the air filters with a brush or rinse them softly.
- 4 When cleaning the air filters by rinsing, dry them well. Replace the air filters properly. Make sure that the air filters are fully inserted.



#### CAUTION

Do not operate the projector with the air filters removed. Dust may accumulate on the optical elements degrading picture quality. Do not put small parts into the air intake vents. It may result in malfunction of the projector.

#### RECOMMENDATION

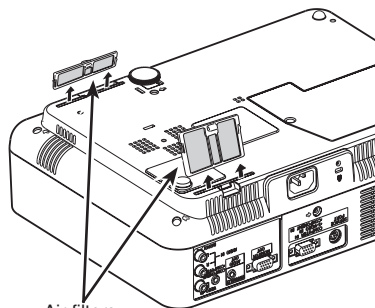
We recommend avoiding dusty/smoky environments when operating the projector. Usage in these environments may cause a poor image quality. When using the projector under dusty or smoky conditions, dust may accumulate on a lens, LCD panels, or optical elements inside the projector. This condition may degrade the quality of a projected image. When the symptoms above are noticed, contact your authorized dealer or service station for proper cleaning.

### Slide Shutter

Slide Shutter is provided to protect the surface of the lens against scratches and dirt. When you are not using the projector, close the Slide Shutter.

To open or close, use the Slide Shutter Lever on the top of the cabinet.

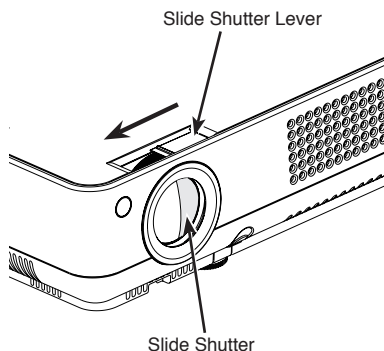
Do not close the shutter when the projection lamp is lighting.

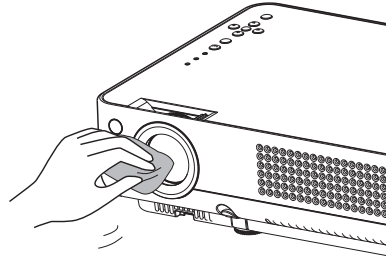

## Cleaning the Projection Lens

Disconnect the AC power cord before cleaning.

Gently wipe the projection lens with a cleaning cloth that contains a small amount of non-abrasive camera lens cleaner, or use lens cleaning paper or a commercially available air blower to clean the lens. Avoid using an excessive amount of cleaner. Abrasive cleaners, solvents, or other harsh chemicals might scratch the surface.

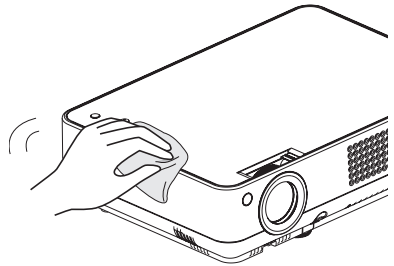


## Cleaning the Projector Cabinet

Disconnect the AC power cord before cleaning.

Gently wipe the projector body with a soft, dry cleaning cloth. When it is heavily soiled, use a small amount of mild detergent and finish with a soft, dry cleaning cloth. Avoid using an excessive amount of cleaner. Abrasive cleaners, solvents, or other harsh chemicals might scratch the surface.

When the projector is not in use, put the projector in an appropriate carrying case to protect it from dust and scratches.



## Lamp Replacement

When the life of the projection lamp of this projector draws to an end, the LAMP REPLACE indicator emits a yellow light. If this indicator lights yellow, replace the lamp with a new one promptly.

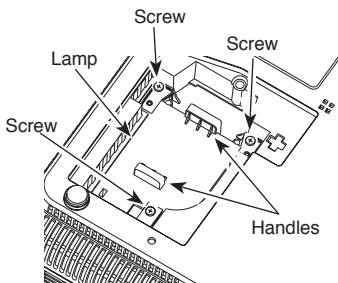
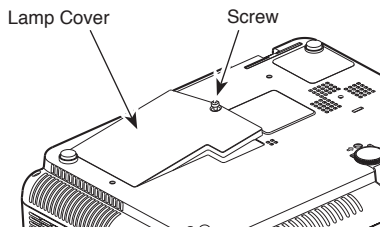

For continued safety, replace with a lamp of the same type. Do not drop a lamp or touch a glass bulb! The glass can shatter and may cause injury.

Follow these steps to replace the lamp.

- 1 Turn off the projector and disconnect the AC power cord. Allow the projector to cool for at least 45 minutes.
- 2 Loosen the screw with a screwdriver, and remove the lamp cover.
- 3 Loosen the 3 screws of the lamp with a screwdriver and lift the lamp out of the projector by using the built in handles.
- 4 Replace the lamp with a new one and secure it with the 3 screws. Make sure that the lamp is set properly. Replace the lamp cover and tighten the screw.
- 5 Connect the AC power cord to the projector and turn on the projector.
- 6 **Reset the lamp replacement counter.** See "Lamp Replacement Counter" on the next page .

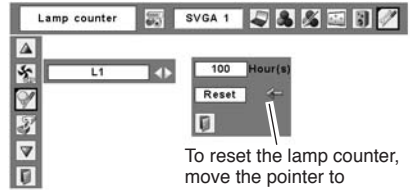
## Lamp Replacement Counter

Be sure to reset the Lamp replacement counter after the lamp is replaced. When the Lamp replacement counter is reset, the LAMP REPLACE indicator stops lighting.

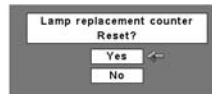
- 1 Turn the projector on, press the MENU button to display the On-Screen Menu. Press the Point ◀ ▶ buttons to move the red framed pointer to the Setting Menu icon.
- 2 Press the Point ▲▼ buttons to move the red framed pointer to the Lamp counter function and then press the SELECT button. A dialog box appears showing the total accumulated lamp hours and reset option. If you select "Reset", a "Lamp replacement counter Reset?" message appears. Select [Yes] to continue.
- 3 Another confirmation dialog box appears, select [Yes] to reset the Lamp replacement counter.

✓ **Note:**

Do not reset the Lamp replacement counter without implementing lamp replacement. Be sure to reset the Lamp replacement counter only after replacing the lamp.



To reset the lamp counter, move the pointer to Reset and then press the SELECT button. "Lamp replacement counter Reset?" dialog box is displayed.



Select [Yes], then another confirmation box appears.



Select [Yes] again to reset the lamp counter.



## LAMP HANDLING PRECAUTIONS

This projector uses a high-pressure lamp which must be handled carefully and properly. Improper handling may result in accidents, injury, or create a fire hazard.

- Lamp life may differ from lamp to lamp and according to the environment of use. There is no guarantee of the same life for each lamp. Some lamps may fail or terminate their life in a shorter period of time than other similar lamps.
- If the projector indicates that the lamp should be replaced, i.e., if the LAMP REPLACE indicator lights up, replace the lamp with a new one IMMEDIATELY after the projector has cooled down. (Follow carefully the instructions in the Lamp Replacement section of this manual.) Continuous use of the lamp with the LAMP REPLACE indicator lighted may increase the risk of lamp explosion.
- A Lamp may explode as a result of vibration, shock or degradation as a result of hours of use as its lifetime draws to an end. Risk of explosion may differ according to the environment or conditions in which the projector and lamp are being used.

### IF A LAMP EXPLODES, THE FOLLOWING SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE TAKEN.

If a lamp explodes, disconnect the projector's AC plug from the AC outlet immediately. Contact an authorized service station for a checkup of the unit and replacement of the lamp. Additionally, check carefully to ensure that there are no broken shards or pieces of glass around the projector or coming out from the cooling air circulation holes. Any broken shards found should be cleaned up carefully. No one should check the inside of the projector except those who are authorized trained technicians and who are familiar with projector service. Inappropriate attempts to service the unit by anyone, especially those who are not appropriately trained to do so, may result in an accident or injury caused by pieces of broken glass.

## Troubleshooting

Before calling your dealer or service center for assistance, check the items below once again.

- Make sure you have properly connected the projector to peripheral equipment as described on pages 15-17.
- Make sure all equipment is connected to AC outlet and the power is turned on.
- When you operate the projector with a computer and it does not project an image, restart the computer.
