

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
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Step 1: Prepare the SD card and power

■ Install the SD card

Insert the SD card into the SD card slot, which is inside the battery compartment on the bottom of the unit.




Formatting is necessary if you insert a new SD card. (Formatting will erase all the data on the card.)

■ Preparing the power


Using AA batteries

Insert AA batteries into the battery compartment, which you opened when installing the SD card. This unit can use either alkaline or nickel-metal hydride (Ni-MH) batteries. It cannot recharge batteries.



Using USB bus power

Connect the unit with a computer using the included USB cable.




The USB SELECT screen appears, allowing you to set whether to use USB bus power or to connect the unit's storage to the computer. Select BUS POWER.



Using an AC adaptor (sold separately)

Connect a TASCAM PS-P520 AC adaptor (sold separately), which is designed for the specifications of this unit, to the **DC IN 5V** jack.



■ Turn the power on


Press and hold the 0/1 [\blacksquare] button until the startup screen opens.

Setting the date and time

Use the DATE/TIME item from the MENU to set the internal clock to the current time.



The unit uses its internal clock to include the date and time of the recording in its file.

The unit will function properly even if you do not make this setting. When you first put batteries into the unit, however, the clock will begin advancing from the default value of 2000-01-01/00:00:00 and this incorrect date and time will be added to recording files. (See "Setting the date and time" on page 45.)

Step 2: Copy audio files from a computer

■ Prepare the audio files

Create audio files using the functions of the computer operating system or other computer software applications.

Be sure to use file formats that this unit can play back. These formats include MP3 (32–320 kbps, 44.1 kHz) and WAV (44.1 kHz, 16/24-bit).

■ Connect the computer

Use the included USB cable to connect the unit to the computer.

■ Transfer files from the computer

Copy audio files to the MUSIC folder on the LR-10 drive that appears on the computer.

■ Disconnect from the computer

After using the correct procedures to dismount the LR-10 drive from your computer, disconnect the USB cable. The unit should automatically turn off.

Step 3: Select the input

Set INPUT to MIC to use the built-in microphone to practice singing or playing a wind instrument, for example.

Set INPUT to LINE to use the **LINE IN** jack to practice playing a synthesizer or electronic piano.

Step 4: Connect an instrument and headphones

■ Connect an instrument

Connect the headphones/stereo line output jack of the keyboard or other instrument to the **LINE IN** jack of this unit using a 3.5-mm miniplug cable.

CAUTION

To record the sound from the **LINE IN** jack or hear it through headphones, line input must be ON (■■■). If mic input is activated, set the INPUT item in the INPUT SETTING menu to LINE. If the line input is OFF (■■■), press the ▼/MIC button to turn it ON (■■■).

■ Connect headphones or speakers

Connect headphones or a monitoring system (such as powered speakers or an amplifier and speakers) to this unit's Ω /LINE OUT jack.


CAUTION

Before connecting headphones, use the **OUTPUT** (–) button to minimize the volume. Failure to do so could cause the sudden output of loud sounds, which might lead to hearing damage or other harm.

Step 5: Tune the instrument

Use the unit's tuning function to tune an instrument using the **LINE IN** jack or built-in microphones.

Press the **TUNER** button to open the TUNER screen.

Step 6: Use the effects

This unit has built-in effects. You can use these effects on the input signal and on the playback signal.

Press the **EFFECT** button briefly to enable the effects. The last effect setting used is activated and the FX icon appears highlighted (light letters on a dark background).



Press this button again to disable the effects. The FX icon appears as dark letters on a light background.

Press and hold the **EFFECT** button to open the EFFECT screen where you can make detailed settings.

Step 7: Adjust the input and output levels

■ Adjust the headphones volume

Use the **OUTPUT** (+/–) buttons to adjust the headphones volume.


When adjusting the volume, the current level appears in a pop-up at the bottom of the display.

■ Adjusting the microphone and line input level

Use the **INPUT** level dial on the right side panel to adjust the built-in microphones and **LINE IN** input level.

■ Adjusting the mix

Press the **BALANCE** button to adjust the volume of the file that is playing. Use this function to adjust the balance between the playback sound and the sound of the input from the built-in microphones or the **LINE IN** jack. Press the ▶ button to start playback of the song. Adjust the volume of the playback sound using the **VALUE** (+/−) buttons. While playing the instrument, adjust the balance between the playing song and the instruments.



NOTE

The BALANCE setting only affects the volume when **MIC** or **LINE** is ON (**DISC**). When **MIC** or **LINE** is OFF (**DISC**) or **LINE**), changing the BALANCE value has no effect on the volume.

Step 8: Play along with the music

This unit will output the sound input through the mic or the **LINE IN** jack even when recording is not enabled. This allows you to select a song and play along after pressing the **▶** button.

This unit also has the following functions, which you can use as you like to make practicing your instrument even easier.

■ Use repeat playback

You can use two types of repeat playback. You can either play a loop between two set points or play an entire song and the entire playback area repeatedly.

Use the **LOOP** button for loop playback, which is useful for practicing a phrase repeatedly.


During playback (or when paused), press the **LOOP** button briefly at the point where you want to start loop playback to set the IN point. Then, press the **LOOP** button briefly again at the point where you want to stop loop playback to set the OUT point and start loop playback of the interval between the points.



Press and hold the **LOOP** button to open the LOOP SET pop-up screen where you can make fine adjustments to the IN and OUT points. Other loop playback functions include, for example, the possibility of setting up to five loops for each file when the playback area is the playlist.

For repeat playback of a single file or the entire playback area, press the **MENU** button to open the MENU screen, select PLAY MODE and press the ► or ►►I button. Use the **VALUE** (+/-) buttons to select 1 REPEAT or ALL REPEAT.



After making the setting, press the **HOME** button to return to the Home Screen.

■ Change the key

You can change the playback pitch (key) in semitones. Press the **KEY** button to show the key setting at the bottom of the display.



Use the **VALUE** (+/–) buttons to change the setting value.

■ Changing the speed

You can also change the playback speed without changing the pitch.

You can, for example, reduce the speed to practice a song and gradually increase it as you become more proficient.

Press the **SPEED** button to show the speed setting at the bottom of the display.



Use the **VALUE** (+/–) buttons to change the setting value. For details, see "Changing the speed" on page 70.

Step 9: Record your performance

You can record the sound input through the built-in microphones or the **LINE IN** jack. Press the **RECORD** [●] button to start recording (except when the auto-record function is on and the input level is below the set value). Press and hold the **RECORD** [●] button to enable the pre-record function and put the unit into recording standby. Press the **RECORD** [●] button to start recording, capturing sound up to 2 seconds before pressing the button. Press the 也 / I ■] button to stop recording.

Step 10: Record over a song (overdub)

You can also record your performance together with the music that is playing back.

Use the I◄◀ and ►►I buttons to select the song. Press the ► button while pressing and holding the **RECORD** [●] button to begin overdubbing.

Press the $0/[\blacksquare]$ button to stop recording.


CAUTION

If you press and hold the record button, the unit will be put in recording standby with the pre-record function enabled, and overdubbing will not be possible.

Step 11: Use other functions

This unit has other functions, including a convenient playlist and the ability to divide files, which you can use as you like.

One such function is the metronome, which can be accessed easily by pressing the **METRONOME** button.

Step 12: Turn off the power

To turn the power off (put the unit in standby), press the ७/ [■] button and hold it until the shutdown screen appears.

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About SD cards

This unit uses SD cards for recording and playback.

You can use $64 \, MB-2 \, GB \, SD$ cards and $4 \, GB-32 \, GB \, SDHC$ cards with this unit.

A list of SD cards that have been tested with this unit can be found on the TASCAM web site (www.tascam.com/).

Use of cards that have not been verified for use with this unit could result in the unit not functioning properly.

Precautions for use

SD cards are delicate media. In order to avoid damaging a card or the card slot, please take the following precautions when handling them.

- . Do not leave in extremely hot or cold places.
- Do not leave them in extremely humid places.
- Do not let them get wet.
- Do not put things on top of them or twist them.
- Do not hit them.

Precautions for placement and use

- The operating temperature should be between 0°C and 40°C (32°F and 104°F).
- Do not install in the following types of places. Doing so could degrade the sound quality and/or cause malfunctions.
 - Places with significant vibrations or that are otherwise unstable
 - · Near windows or other places exposed to direct sunlight
 - Near heaters or other extremely hot places
 - Extremely cold places
 - Places with bad ventilation or high humidity
 - · Very dusty locations
- Avoid installing this unit on top of any heat-generating electrical device such as a power amplifier.


Beware of condensation

If the unit is moved from a cold to a warm place, or used after a sudden temperature change, there is a danger of condensation; vapor in the air could condense on the internal mechanism, making correct operation impossible. To prevent this, or if this occurs, let the unit sit for one or two hours at the new room temperature before using.

Cleaning the unit

Use a dry soft cloth to wipe the unit clean. Do not clean the unit with a chemically treated cloth or substances such as benzene, thinner and alcohol because they might cause damage to the surface of the unit.

Top panel



① Display

This shows a variety of information.

PEAK indicator

This lights if the input signal level is too high.

③ Cursor control

Press up to use the ▲/BROWSE button, down to use the ▼/MIC button, left to use the I◄◄ button and right to use the ▶►I button.

▲/BROWSE button (UP/BROWSE)

When the Home Screen is open, press this button to open the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{BROWSE}}$ screen.

When one of the setting screens is open, this moves the cursor up on the screen.

When the Home Screen is open, press and hold this button to open the QUICK DELETE pop-up menu.

▼/MIC button (DOWN/MIC INPUT)

When the Home Screen is open, press this button to turn input from the built-in microphone or **LINE IN** jack ON/OFF.

When one of the setting screens is open, this moves the cursor down on the screen.

I◀◀ button (PREVIOUS)

During playback or when stopped, press this button to return to skip to the beginning of the previous file.

When one of the setting screens is open, this moves the cursor to the left on the screen.

On the BROWSE screen, press this button to return to the higher folder level.

▶▶ button (NEXT)

During playback or when stopped, press this button to skip to the beginning of the next file.

When one of the setting screens is open, this moves the cursor to the right on the screen.

On the BROWSE screen, press this to enter the lower folder level.

Press during recording to start recording to a new file without interruption (track incrementation).

④ ◀◀ button (REW)

Press this button to search backward.

Press briefly to search backward to the beginning of the current file. Each time you press this button, the search speed increases.

Press and hold to search backward continuously for as long as the button is pressed. When the beginning of the current file is reached, searching stops there.

5 ►► button (F FWD)

Press this button to search forward.

Press briefly to search forward to the end of the current file. Each time you press this button, the search speed increases.

Press and hold to search forward continuously for as long as the button is pressed. When the end of the current file is reached, searching stops there.

⑥ Ů/ [■] button (POWER, STOP)

Use to stop recording and playback, as well as to end recording standby.

Press during playback to pause playback. Press again when paused to stop playback.

Use also to respond "NO" to a confirmation pop-up message that appears during the operation of a setting screen.

Use to return from the FILE INFORMATION pop-up message when using the browse function.

Press and hold to turn the power ON or put the unit into standby.

⑦ ► button (PLAY)

When the Home Screen is open, press when stopped to start playback.

Press during playback to return to a specific time and restart playback (flashback function). (See "Jump back a set amount and continue playback (flashback)" on page 71.)

When the METRONOME screen is open, press to start and stop the metronome.

9 VALUE (+/-) buttons


Powering the unit

This unit can be powered by two AA batteries, USB bus power or a TASCAM PS-P520 AC adaptor (sold separately).

This unit can use either alkaline or nickel-metal hydride (NiMH) batteries.

Using AA batteries

As described in the "Inserting and removing SD cards" section above, this unit has a battery compartment in the bottom. Insert 2 AA batteries into this compartment, aligning them correctly with the plus/minus indications inside, and then close the compartment cover.




When using AA batteries, set the type of battery in order to allow the unit to accurately show the amount of power remaining and determine whether enough power is available for proper operation. (See "Setting the battery type" on page 83.)

CAUTION

- Manganese batteries cannot be used with this unit.
- This unit cannot recharge Ni-MH batteries. Use a commercially-available recharger.
- The included alkaline batteries are provided for confirming the operation of the unit and might not last very long.

Using USB bus power

Connect the unit with a computer using the included USB cable as shown in the illustration below.



The USB SELECT screen appears if the power is ON when you make the USB connection or if you turn the power ON after making the USB connection. This screen allows you to set

whether to use USB bus power (BUS_POWER) or to connect the unit's storage to the computer (STORAGE).



Use the ▲/BROWSE button or ▼/MIC button to select BUS POWER and press the ▶ button to provide power from the computer USB port and open the Home Screen.

4-Connecting

This unit appears on the computer screen as an external drive named LR-10.



The LR-10 drive contains MUSIC and UTILITY folders.


Disconnecting from a computer

After using the correct procedures to dismount the LR-10 drive from your computer, disconnect the USB cable. The unit should automatically turn off.

Please refer to the operation manual for your computer system for instructions about the correct procedures for dismounting an external drive.

Connecting an instrument

In addition to the built-in microphone, this unit has a line in jack (stereo mini-jack) on its right side panel to which you can connect the outputs of keyboards and other instruments, as well as audio devices.



NOTE

- You can apply the built-in effects to sound input by the connected instrument and play along to a song playing back on the unit or its metronome.
- To use an electric guitar or bass with this unit, connect the instrument first to an effect pedal or other device that has a headphones/line level output.

5-Recording

This unit can record a performance through the built-in mic or from a keyboard or similar instrument that is connected to the **LINE IN** jack. The audio file format used for recording is always 44.1 kHz, 16-bit WAV.

In addition, this unit can also mix the input signal and an audio file that is playing back and record both together (overdubbing).

Setting the location where recorded files are saved

You can set the location where recorded files are saved. (See "Folder operations" on page 59.)

If you do not set a destination, files will be saved directly in the MUSIC folder.

Setting the input functions

The GAIN, TYPE, LOW CUT and LEVEL CTRL items only function when INPUT is set to MIC.

INPUT:

Set the input source to microphone (MIC) or line (LINE). The default setting is MIC.

When MIC is selected, sets the input source as the built-in microphones.

When LINE is selected, sets the source as the line level signal input to the right side panel **LINE IN** jack (stereo mini-jack).

GAIN:

Set the built-in microphones input sensitivity as HIGH, MID, or LOW.

The factory default setting is MID.

Change it to HIGH if the input level is too low and to LOW if the input level is too high.

TYPE:

Set the built-in microphones to STEREO or MONO. The factory setting is STEREO.

If you select MONO, the left and right channels are combined into the same signal.

LOW CUT:

The factory default setting of the low cut filter is OFF, but you can also select 40Hz, 80Hz or 120Hz as the cut-off frequency for a low cut filter.

LEVEL CTRL:

Use this to set the level control function.



- When recording live performances and in other situations where unexpected loud sounds might occur, set this function to LMT to prevent input clipping and allow recording without distortion.

2. Press the ₼/ [] button to stop recording.

To pause recording, press the **RECORD** [●] button. To resume recording to the same file, press the **RECORD** [●] button again.

Press the ७ / I[■] button after pausing to complete the creation of an audio file with the music recorded up to the moment that recording was paused.

Recording a few seconds before pushing the record button (pre-recording)

The unit can capture up to 2 seconds of input signal during recording standby, allowing recording to start before the **RECORD** [●] button is pushed.

- Press the RECORD [●] button again briefly to start recording. Input signal is recorded starting up to 2 seconds before the button was pushed.

The **RECORD** [●] button indicator lights when recording.

3. Press the ∪/ |[■] button to stop recording.

To pause recording, press the **RECORD** [●] button. To resume recording to the same file, press the **RECORD** [●] button again.

Press the ७/ I [■] button after pausing to complete the creation of an audio file with the music recorded up to the moment that recording was paused.

TIP

Use this function in combination with the auto-recording function to record without missing the beginning of a performance.

NOTE

If the unit was put into recording standby less than 2 seconds before this function is used, recording will start from the time when recording standby was enabled.

You can combine the input signal with the signal from an already recorded file being played back to record a new file. For example, you could record a new instrument part over an existing track.

NOTE

- When overdubbing, You cannot use the auto-record or manual file incrementation functions.
- You cannot pause during overdubbing. (The RECORD [●] button does not respond if pushed.)

5-Recording

TIP

Using the overdubbing function, you can record over the same file multiple times, allowing you to use this unit as a simple multitrack recorder.

Overdubbing

- 1. Use the I◀◀ button, ▶▶I button or the BROWSE screen to select the file that you want to overdub.
- 2. Press the ▶ button to start playback and begin playing the instrument. Check the balance between the levels of the playback and instrument sounds.
- 3. Use the INPUT volume to adjust the input volume level so that the PEAK indicator does not light. Press the BALANCE button to show the BALANCE item, and use the VALUE (+/-) buttons to adjust the level of the playback sound. The range is from "\(\textit{O}\)" (minimum) to "\(\textit{2}\textit{O}\)" (maximum), and the default value is "\(\textit{2}\textit{O}\)".

NOTE

 Press the ► button while pressing and holding the RECORD [●] button to begin overdubbing.

CAUTION

If you press and hold the **RECORD** [•] button long, the unit will be put in recording standby with the pre-record function enabled, and overdubbing will not be possible.

5. When overdubbing starts, the RECORD [●] button indicator lights, and the elapsed and remaining recording times are shown on the recording screen. In addition, the name of the file being played back is shown next to the play icon and above the name of the file being recorded.



If no file that can be played back has been selected, the following pop-up message appears.



6. Press the ७/ [■] button to stop recording.


Starting and pausing recording automatically (AUTO REC)

This unit can be set to automatically start and pause recording in response to the level of the input signal.

- 1. Press the MENU button to open the MENU screen.
- 2. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the AUTO REC menu item, and press the ► or ►►I button to open the AUTO REC screen.



- Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the MODE item.
- 4. Use the VALUE (+/-) buttons to set it to ○N.



- Press the ▲/BROWSE or ▼/MIC button to select the START LEVEL item.
- Use the VALUE (+/-) buttons to set the input signal detection level to -6dB, -12dB (default value), -24dB or -48dB.



- After completing the setting, press the HOME button to return to the Home Screen.
- 8. Press the RECORD [●] button to start recording standby and RECORD [●] button indicator blinks.

Press and hold the RECORD [●] button to enable the pre-record function and put the unit into recording standby.

5-Recording

Recording starts automatically when the input signal level exceeds the detection level set using the START LEVEL item.

Recording stops automatically and the unit returns to recording standby when the input signal level stays below the detection level set using the START LEVEL item for five or more seconds and **RECORD** [o] indicator blinks.

TIP

Use this function in combination with the pre-recording function to record without missing the beginning of a performance.

NOTE

When AUTO REC is ON, unlike usual, pressing the **RECORD** [●] button briefly does not start recording, but does put the unit into recording standby.

9. You can press the ७/ | ■] button if you want to stop a recording that has started automatically.

CAUTION

When overdubbing, the auto-recording function cannot be used.

Track incrementation

You can start recording to a new file without interruption manually. If a file reaches the maximum size (2GB), the unit will also automatically start recording to a new file. In both cases, the original file is saved and no gap occurs in the recording.

Manual track incrementation during recording

At any time during recording, you can manually start a new file and continue recording easily.

1. Press the ▶▶ button during recording.

CAUTION

- A new file cannot be created if the total number of files and folders would exceed 5000.
- Files shorter than two seconds cannot be created.
- If the name of a newly created file would be the same as that of an existing file, the number at the end of the name is increased to give the new file a unique name.
- When overdubbing, the track incrementation function cannot be used.

NOTE

When a new file is created, the number at the end of the name is increased.

Automatic track incrementation by file size

If a file reaches the maximum size (2 GB) during recording, the unit will automatically start recording to a new file. The original file is saved and no gap occurs in the recording.

CAUTION

A new file cannot be created if the total number of files and folders would exceed 5000.

NOTE


If the recording time is 24 hours or more, it will be displayed as 23:59:59.

Dividing files (DIVIDE)

You can split a recorded file into two files at any position you like.

- 1. Use the I◀◀ button, ▶►I button, or BROWSE screen to select the file that you want to divide.
- 2. Press the MENU button to open the MENU screen.

 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/ MIC buttons to select the DIVIDE menu item, and press the ► button or ►►I button to open the DIVIDE screen.



4. Use the ◀◀ and ▶▶ button to determine where the file will be divided, and press the RECORD [●] button.

The following pop-up message appears.



5. Press the ▶ button to divide the file.

Press the ७/ I ■ button to cancel division and return to the DIUIDE screen.

5-Recording

NOTE

- When the DIVIDE screen is open, you can press the ► button and set the divide position while playing the track.
- After dividing a file, two new files with "_a" and "_b" added to the end of the original file name are created. For example if the original filename is "LR0000_0000.wav" then the new files will be named "LR0000_0000_a.wav" (the recording before the division point) and "LR0000_0000_b.wav" (the recording after the division point).

CAUTION

- MP3 files cannot be divided.
- Division is not possible if the SD card has insufficient open space.
- Division is not possible if the file name would become more than 200 characters long.
- Division is not possible if a file that already exists has the same name as the name that would be given to a new file created by division.

Recording duration

The table below shows the approximate amount of recording time possible on SD/SDHC cards of different capacities.


- The recording times shown above are estimates. They might differ depending on the SD/SDHC card being used.
- The recording times shown above are not continuous recording times, but rather they are the total possible recording times for the SD/SDHC card.
- This unit only records in 44.1 kHz, 16-bit WAV format.

On the Browse Screen, you can view the contents of the MUSIC Folder, which contains the audio files on the SD card. On this screen, you can also play and erase selected audio files, create folders, add tracks to the playlist and so on. (See "Playlist" on page 67.)

TIP

If you connect this unit with a computer by USB or connect the SD card directly with a computer, you can change the folder structure within the MUSIC Folder and erase files in it using the computer. Furthermore, you can change file names from the computer.

To open the BROWSE screen, from the Home Screen, press the **A/BROWSE** button.



When you open the BROWSE screen, the contents of the folder that contains the file that was selected on the Home Screen are shown.

BROWSE screen navigation

On the BROWSE screen, folders and music files appear in a hierarchical structure much like they would appear on a computer. Folders can only be used to two levels.

- Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select files and folders.
- When a folder is selected, press the ►►I button to show the contents of that folder.
- When a file or folder is selected, press the I◄ key to exit the currently open folder and go to a higher level in the folder structure.
- When a file or folder is selected, press the ► key to open the pop-up window.

Icons on the BROWSE screen

The icons that appear on the BROWSE Screen have the following meanings.

MUSIC folder (B)

The MUSIC Folder is the highest (root) level folder in the hierarchy shown on the BROWSE Screen.

Audio file (17)

This icon appears before the names of audio files.

Folder (🕀)

This icon shows folders that contain subfolders.

Folder (\square)

This icon shows folders that do not contain subfolders.

Open folder (🖯)

The contents of the folder marked with this icon are currently shown on the screen.

File operations

Select the desired audio file on the BROWSE screen, and press the ► button to open the following pop-up menu.




Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the desired item, and press the ► button to execute one of the following operations.

PLAY

Play the file and reopen the Home Screen. If the playback area is set to "FOLDER", the playback area becomes the folder that contains that file.

INFO

Show information (date, time and size) about the selected file. Press the ▶ button again or press the ७/ I[■] button to return to the BROWSE screen.



ADD LIST

Add the selected file to the playlist. (See "Playlist" on page 67.)

DELETE

A message appears to confirm that you want to delete the selected file. Press the ▶ button to delete the file and the ७/ I[■] button to cancel deletion.



CANCEL

No operation is conducted on the selected file and the pop-up menu closes.

Folder operations

Select the desired folder on the BROWSE screen, and press the button to open the following pop-up menu.



Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the desired item, and press the ► button to execute one of the following operations.

SELECT

Return to the Home Screen and select the first file in the folder. This folder becomes the new playback area regardless of the previous playback area setting. When recording, files are created in the folder selected using this operation.

CREATE


A pop-up appears to confirm that you want to create a new folder.



Press the ▶ button to create a new folder, or press the ७/I

[■] button to cancel the operation.

However, if you try to create a new folder inside a second level subfolder the Layer too Deep message appears and the folder is not made.



ALL DEL

A pop-up message appears to confirm that you want to delete all the files in the selected folder at once.



Press the ► button to erase the files, or press the ७ / I 🔳 button to cancel the operation.

NOTE

You cannot erase read-only files or files that are not recognized by this unit.

CANCEL

No operation is conducted and the selected folder is left as is.

Delete the selected playback file (QUICK DELETE)

Use the following procedure to conveniently delete the currently selected playback file.

- On the Home Screen, press and hold the ▲/BROWSE button to open the QUICK DELETE screen.
- 2. Press the ▶ button again to confirm deletion, or press the ७/ | ■] button to cancel.



7-Playback

When the Home Screen is open, use \triangleright , \bowtie and other buttons to operate the unit in the same way you would use a CD player or other audio playback device.

When the Home Screen is not open, however, these buttons have different functions.

Before using the following procedures, insert an SD card that has been formatted by this unit and that contains audio files that the unit can playback.

NOTE

SD cards that have been formatted by a TASCAM DR series device can also be used with this unit.

Playback

When the unit is stopped, press the ▶ button to start playback.

NOTE

- Only files in the playback area can be played.
- You can also choose files for playback by name on the BROWSE screen.

Stopping playback

When the Home Screen is open and a track is playing back, press the ७/ I[■] button to stop playback at the current position (pause).

Press the ७/ I[■] button again to return to the beginning of the file.

Selecting a file

During playback or when stopped, use the I◀◀ and ▶►I buttons to select a file.

Press the I◀◀ button to skip to the previous file.

Press the ▶▶I button to skip to the next file.

Only files in the playback area can be played. (See "Using the PLAY MODE screen to set the playback area" on page 6.)

The song name, file number and other information for the currently playing file are shown on the display.

The ■ icon appears on the display when playback is stopped at the beginning of a track, and the II icon appears when playback is stopped in the middle of a track (paused).

7-Playback

Searching forward and backward

During playback or when stopped (or paused), press and hold the ◀◀/▶▶ button to search backward/forward. Release the button to return to the previous state.

Use the CUE/REU SPEED item on the SETUP screen to set the search speed. (See "System settings (SETUP)" on page 83.)

Press the ◀◀/▶▶ button briefly to search backward/ forward to the beginning/end of the file.

Press the same button again briefly to change the search speed. The speed options are: x2, x5, x10, x20, x40 and x120.

NOTE

Searching backward/forward continues only until the beginning/end of the current file. Searching will not continue into the previous or next file even if you continue to hold the button.

Adjusting the playback volume

Use the **OUTPUT** (+/–) buttons to adjust the volume level output from the built-in speaker or the Ω /**LINE OUT** jack. While being adjusted, the volume level is shown in a pop-up at the bottom of the display.



NOTE

If you turn the MIC/LINE input off, the playback level returns to its original level.

If the MIC/LINE input is on, and you have used the **BALANCE** button to lower the volume of the playback (BALANCE) to overdub an audio file, when you play back that file, the playback monitoring level will be lower than it was when recording. In this case, use the **BALANCE** button to set BALANCE to its maximum.

Adjusting the balance between playback and input signals

You can adjust the balance between the input sound of an instrument being played and the playback sound of a file.

Use the **INPUT** volume to adjust the level of the input signal, and press the **BALANCE** button to open the BALANCE item and adjust the level of the playback signal.



Adjust the volume of the playback sound using the **VALUE** (+/-) buttons. The range is from " \emptyset " (minimum) to " $2\emptyset$ " (maximum), and the default value is " $2\emptyset$ ".

NOTE

Disabling the MIC/LINE input

When you want to listen to just the playback signal, you can disable the MIC/LINE input to prevent any unwanted noise.

Press the V/MIC button again to enable the MIC/LINE input. The MIC/LINE icon appears as light letters on a dark background (or when input is enabled.

NOTE

If you turn the MIC/LINE input off (TIME) or TIME), OFF appears in the level meter area.



When the MIC/LINE input is off (TIME) or TIME), the BALANCE setting is canceled and the playback level returns to its original setting.

On the Home Screen, use the I◀◀ or ▶►I button to select a file from the current "playback area" to play. You can set the playback area that includes the files that can be selected. If the card contains a large number of files, for example, setting a limited playback area can make file selection easier. On the PLAY MODE screen, you can set the playback area to all files, the current folder or the playlist. You can also use the BROWSE screen to set the desired folder as the playback area.


NOTE

On the BROWSE screen, you can also choose any file on the card for playback regardless of the playback area setting.

Using the PLAY MODE screen to set the playback area

Follow these procedures to set the playback area on the PLAYMODE screen.

- 1. Press the MENU button to open the MENU screen.
- 2. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC button to select PLAY MODE and press the ► button or ►►I button to open the PLAY MODE screen.



- 3. Select the AREA item so that its setting value appears as light letters on a dark background.
- 4. Use the VALUE (+/-) buttons to select one of the following playback areas.

ALL FILES

Allow playback of all the files in the MUSIC folder on the SD card.

FOLDER

Allow playback of all the files in the folder that contains the currently selected file.

PLAYLIST

Allow playback of the files in the playlist. (See "Playlist" on page 67.)

If you select this, but there is no playlist defined, a No PLAYLIST pop-up appears.



Even if there is no playlist, you can still set the playback area to PLAYLIST. Doing so, however, will cause the № PLAYLIST pop-up to appear every time you press the I or I button because you cannot change to another file.



NOTE

The current playback area setting (ALL, FOLDER or P_{*}LIST) is shown at the bottom left of the Home Screen.




Playback area indication

Selecting a folder for the playback area (1)

Regardless of the current playback area, if you select a folder on the BROWSE Screen, the playback area changes to the selected folder.


 On the Home Screen, press the ▲/BROWSE button to open the BROWSE screen.



 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the desired folder (light on dark).

For instructions about using the BROWSE screen, see "BROWSE screen navigation" on page 57.

Press the ► button to open the pop-up menu shown below.




Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to choose the SELECT, and to press the ▶ button.

4. The Home Screen automatically reopens and the first file in that folder is selected. This folder becomes the playback area regardless of the previous playback area setting.


Selecting a folder for the playback area (2)

If the playback area is set to FOLDER and you select a file on the BROWSE screen, the folder that contains the selected file becomes the playback area.

 On the Home Screen, press the ▲/BROWSE button to open the BROWSE screen.



 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the desired folder (light on dark). Press the ►►I button to show the contents of that folder.



 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the desired file (light on dark).

For instructions about using the BROWSE screen, see "BROWSE screen navigation" on page 57.

Press the ► button to open the pop-up menu shown below.



6. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to choose the PLAY (light on dark), and to press the ▶ button.

The Home Screen automatically reopens and that file starts playing back. Moreover, the folder that contains that file becomes the playback area regardless of the previous playback area setting.

Playlist

You can make a playlist, which is a set of tracks for playback.

You can play just the tracks in your playlist by setting the AREA item to PLAYLIST on the PLAY MODE Screen.

In addition, when the playback area is set to PLAYLIST, loop playback has additional functions. (See "Using loop playback with the playlist" on page 73.)

Adding files to the playlist

 On the Home Screen, press the ▲/BROWSE button to open the BROWSE screen.



NOTE

For more information about the BROWSE screen, see Chapter 6 "Working with Files and Folders (BROWSE screen)" on page 57.

 Select the file that you want to add to the playlist and press the ► button to open the following pop-up menu.



For more information about selecting files, see "BROWSE screen navigation" on page 57.

- 3. Select ADD LIST, and press the ▶ button to add that file to the playlist. The pop-up menu closes.
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 as necessary.

Numbers are assigned to the files in the order that they are added to the list.

Editing the playlist

You can view the playlist you have made on the PLAYLIST Screen. On this screen, you can also play files and edit the playlist

- 1. Press the MENU button to open the MENU screen.
- 2. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the PLAYLIST menu item, and press the ► button to open the PLAYLIST screen.



 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the file that you want to edit, and press the ► button to open the pop-up menu.



 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the desired item, and press the ► button to execute the operation.

PLAY

Play the file and return to the Home Screen.

ALL CLR

A confirmation message appears to confirm that you want to remove all the files from the playlist. Press the \blacktriangleright button to remove all the files or the $0/1[\blacksquare]$ button to cancel this operation.

For this operation, it does not matter which track you select in step 3. All the files are removed from the playlist, but they are not erased from the SD card.



DFLFTF

Remove the selected track from the playlist.

The file is removed from the playlist, but it is not erased from the SD card.

CAUTION

No confirmation pop-up message appears before this operation.

MOVE

Select this to change the order of files in the playlist. In addition to the file name, the file number also appears light on dark.

 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to move the file to a different position in the playlist.



In the above example, the file in the 4th position has been moved to the 3rd position.

 Press the button to complete the movement and return to the ordinary PLAYLIST screen. (The file number no longer appears light on dark.)



CANCEL

No operation is conducted on the selected file, and the pop-up menu closes.

9-Special Playback (playback control function)

Using this unit's playback control functions, you can change the speed of playback without changing the pitch and vice versa. You can use these playback control functions for effective practice and learning new parts.

Changing the speed

You can use the SPEED function to set the playback speed. This unit has a Variable Speed Audition (VSA) function, so even when playback speed is changed the pitch stays the same.

Press the **SPEED** button to show the SPEED setting area at the bottom of the Home Screen.



Use the **VALUE** (+/-) buttons to set the playback speed.

The speed can be set in a range between 50% ($\times 0.5$) and 150% ($\times 1.5$) of the original speed in 10% increments (default value: $\times 1.0$).

When the SPEED is set from x0.5–x0.9, the step icon is shown, and when it is set from x1.1–x1.5, the step icon is shown.

Changing the key

You can use the KEY function to change the pitch of playback in semitone intervals (and the FINE TUNE function to change it in cents) without changing the speed.

Press the **KEY** button to show the KEY setting area at the bottom of the Home Screen on the display. Press the **KEY** button again to show the FINE TUNE setting area.



KEY can be set in a range of ± 6 semitones (6-4). (The default value is 3.)

9-Special Playback (playback control function)



Use the FINE TUNE function to adjust the pitch by small amounts.



Use this to adjust the pitch up or down in cents (100 cents = 1 semitone) in a range of ± 50 . (The default value is Θ .)

NOTE

Even if you use the FINE TUNE function to adjust the key, as long as the KEY item setting is 0, the setting is 0, the setting is 0, the setting is 0.

Jump back a set amount and continue playback (flashback)

During playback, press the ► button to use the flashback function. This jumps back a few seconds and continues playback.

Set the amount of time to go back using the FLASH item.

- 1. Press the MENU button to open the MENU screen.
- 2. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the PLAY MODE menu item.
- Press the ► button or ►►I button to open the PLAY MODE screen.
- 4. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select FLASH (setting value appears light on dark).



- 5. Use the VALUE (+/-) buttons to set the flashback time in a range from 1-10 seconds, in one-second intervals. (Default value: 2 seconds)
- 6. After completing the setting, press the HOME button to return to the Home Screen.

10-Loop Playback/Repeat Playback/Single Track Playback

In ordinary playback mode, unless you do something to stop it, once playback starts, it will stop only when the end of the last file in the current playback area is reached. By making the settings and conducting the operations described in this chapter, however, you can also make the unit loop a section of a file that you choose, repeat all the files in the current playback area, play a single track repeatedly or play a single track once and stop.

NOTE

Accurate assignment of IN (starting) and OUT (ending) points is not always possible for variable bit rate (VBR) MP3 files.

Using loop playback (standard mode)

Use this function to continuously repeat playback (loop) part of a file that you select.

 During playback (or when paused), press the LOOP button to set the point where you want to start loop playback.


The current position is set as the IN (starting) point.

2. Press the LOOP button at the point when you want loop playback to stop.

The current position is set as the OUT (ending) point, and loop playback between the IN (starting) and OUT (ending) points begins.



- The current positions of the IN (starting) and OUT (ending) points are shown by the a and a icons that appear below the playback position display bar on the Home Screen.
 - During loop playback the **1++0** icon also appears.
- To stop loop playback, press the LOOP button. This also clears the loop interval setting.
- Press and hold the LOOP button to open the LOOP SET pop-up.




4. Use the ▶, ◄◄, ▶▶ and ७/ [■] buttons to move the IN (starting) point to the desired position. Press the I◄◆ button to save the IN (starting) point.

10-Loop Playback/Repeat Playback/Single Track Playback

NOTE

- When the LOOP SET pop-up window is open, press the button to playback, press ७/ |[■]button to, and press the or button briefly to search the file.
- Press and hold the ◄◄ or ►► button to move the IN (starting) or OUT (ending) point. (This is not possible when there is no IN (starting) and OUT (ending) point.)
- Press the ⊕/|[■] button during playback to pause, and press the HOME button when paused to returned to the Home Screen.
- Next, use the same buttons to move the OUT (ending) point to the desired position, and press the ►►I button to save the OUT (ending) point.



NOTE

 Use the I◄ and ►►I buttons to switch between IN (starting) and OUT (ending) points. 6. Press the LOOP button briefly to start loop playback.



Using loop playback with the playlist

When the playback area is set to playlist, up to 5 loops with distinct IN (starting) and OUT (ending) points can be set per file.

Follow the procedures below to set and play back loops of desired intervals in a file.

Loop settings for a file are saved until it is removed from the playlist.

 Press the LOOP button to show the LOOP setting area at the bottom of the display. The word LOOP is followed by a number. Use the VALUE (+/-) buttons to set the number to 1-5.

10-Loop Playback/Repeat Playback/Single Track Playback



Press and hold the LOOP button to open the LOOP SET pop-up.




Use the ▶, ◄◄, ▶▶ and ७/ | ■] buttons to move the IN (starting) point to the desired position. Press the I◄ button to save the IN (starting) point.

NOTE

- When the LOOP SET pop-up window is open, press the button to playback, press of |[■]button to, and press the
 ✓ or ► button briefly to search the file.
- Press and hold the ◄◄ or ►► button to move the IN (starting) or OUT (ending) point. (This is not possible when there is no IN (starting) and OUT (ending) point.)

- Press the ტ/ [■] button during playback to pause, and press the HOME button when paused to returned to the Home Screen.
- 4. Next, use the same buttons to move the OUT (ending) point to the desired position, and press the ►► button to save the OUT (ending) point.



NOTE

Use the I◄ and ►►I buttons to switch between IN (starting) and OUT (ending) points.

5. Press the LOOP button briefly to start loop playback.



Turning loop playback on and off

Press the **LOOP** button briefly to turn loop playback ON or OFF.

10-Loop Playback/Repeat Playback/Single Track Playback


When you want to restart loop playback, press the **LOOP** button briefly to start loop playback of the last used loop.

In the LOOP setting area shown at the bottom of the display, the word LOOP is followed by a number, which shows the current loop. Use the **VALUE** (+/-) buttons to change the loop number. During loop playback, you can change this number to start loop playback of a different loop if the loop assigned to that number has IN (starting) and OUT (ending) points set.

Repeat and single track playback

You can repeatedly play back the current file (one file) or multiple files within the designated playback area. You can also play just one file.

- 1. Press the MENU button to open the MENU screen.
- 2. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select PLAY MODE and press the ▶ button or ▶►I button.



 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the REPEAT item, and use the VALUE (+/-) buttons to set the playback mode.

OFF (default)

Play all tracks in the playback area in sequence. (This is the ordinary playback mode.)

SINGLE

Play one file without repeating.

The icon appears on the Home Screen.

1 REPEAT

Play the currently playing file repeatedly.

The 🗘 icon appears on the Home Screen.

ALL REPEAT

Play all the files in the selected playback area repeatedly. The Chall icon appears on the Home Screen.

NOTE

If you start loop playback, the REPEAT item automatically switches to ΩFF if it is in a different mode.

11-Transferring songs to and from a computer

You can transfer audio files from a computer by USB, and play them back for practice, to learn new parts and to overdub. Moreover, this unit can play back MP3 (32–320 kbps, 44.1 kHz) and WAV (44.1 kHz, 16/24-bit) audio file formats.

NOTE

Instead of using USB to connect this unit and a computer, you can also conduct the same operations by removing the SD card from this unit and connecting it directly to a computer that has a built-in SD card slot or by using a card reader.


Preparing audio files on a computer

Use the abilities of your computer OS or a software application to copy music files from a CD or other source to your computer.

When copying files to your computer, choose file types that this unit can handle (the MP3 and WAV files types listed above).

Copying audio files from a computer

- Connect the unit to the computer. (See "Connecting with a computer" on page 46.)
- 2. Click the LR-10 drive that appears on the computer to open it, revealing UTILITY and MUSIC folders.
- Drag-and-drop the desired audio files from the computer to the MUSIC folder to copy those files to the SD card.



11-Transferring songs to and from a computer

4. After you finish copying files and closing the connection with the unit SD card from the computer, disconnect the USB cable. (Please refer to the operation manual for your computer system for instructions about the correct procedures for dismounting an external drive.) The unit will automatically turns off.

TIP

You can also manage the contents of the \mbox{MUSIC} folder on an SD Card from a computer.

You can create up two levels of sub-folders inside the MUSIC folder. Since you can set the unit to only play the contents of a specific folder, you can conveniently organize tracks into musical categories and artists. (See "Folder operations" on page 59.)

Name the sub-folders and music files as you like, and these names will appear on the unit's display.

Transferring audio files to a computer

- 1. Click the LR-10 drive that appears on the computer to open it, revealing UTILITY and MUSIC folders.
- Open the MUSIC folder, and drag and drop the files that you want to copy to the desired location on the computer.

12-Using the built-in effects

This unit has built-in effects that can be applied to the input signal during both practice and recording.


Turning the effects ON and OFF

Press the **EFFECT** button briefly to turn the effects ON or OFF. When ON, the effect last set on the EFFECT Screen becomes active, and the FX icon (PX) appears as light letters on a dark background.



Setting the effect

Press and hold the **EFFECT** button to open the EFFECT screen.



Use the I◄◄/▶►I buttons to select the desired item. (When selected, the setting value appears as light letters on a dark background.) Use the **VALUE** (+/-) buttons to change the setting value.

REVERB

Select the type of reverb to use.

LEVEL knob

Use the REVERB item to adjust the output level of the selected reverb type.

TIME knob

Use the PRESET item to adjust the reverb time of the selected reverb type. The reverb time range is set optimally for each type of reverb. For this reason, the length of the reverb might differ between reverb types even with the same setting value.

SOURCE

Use this to set whether the effect is applied to the input signal (INPUT) or the playback signal (PLAV).

The default setting is PLAY.



13-Using the tuner

This unit has a built-in tuner. By inputting the sound of an instrument, you can use the tuning meter on the display to tune that instrument accurately. In addition, you can output a tone for tuning from the built-in speaker or the Ω /LINE OUT jack, which is convenient for tuning multiple instruments simultaneously, for example.

Preparation


1. Press the TUNER button to open the TUNER screen.



The MODE item is shown. Use the ⊕/|[■] button and
 button to select the tuner mode. The options are AUTO (⊕/|[■]: chromatic tuner mode) and OSC. (►: oscillator mode).

After selecting the mode, press the **TUNER** button again to make settings for that mode.

3. The first item shown for each mode is CALIB. Use this to set the frequency of A between 435 Hz and 445 Hz.



The setting value is shown on the right side of the screen.

This setting is the same for both tuner modes.

Use of each tuner mode is explained below.

NOTE


The signal input through the left MIC/LINE input channel is used for tuning. When using the built-in microphones to tune acoustic guitars and other instruments that have rapid sound decay, in particular, tune the instrument as close to the left built-in microphone as possible.

Chromatic tuner mode (AUTO)

This is the default mode. Watch the tuning meter on the unit's screen as you tune your instrument. AUTO appears in the upper right. The tuning meter and input signal pitch name appear on the screen. (—— appears when there is no input).


- Input the signal of the instrument that you want to tune. The name of the closest pitch appears in the upper part of the meter.
- 2. Tune the instrument until the desired pitch is shown and the center of the meter is highlighted.

A bar appears to the left if the tuning is too low and a bar appears to the right if it is too high. The longer the bar is the more out of tune the instrument is.



Oscillator mode

The built-in oscillator can output a tone for tuning through the built-in speaker or the Ω /LINE OUT jack. The tuning pitch can be set in a three-octave range (C3–B5). 0.90% appears in the upper right.



In addition to the CALIB item described above, the oscillator mode has the three other setting items that follow. Press the **TUNER** button to cycle through the setting items.

OSC NOTE

Set the pitch of the tuning tone (C3–B5).

OSC LEVEL


Set the output level of the tone between 0 and 10 (default value 7).

14–Using the Metronome

This unit has a metronome function that is convenient for practicing an instrument.

Setting the metronome

 Press the METRONOME button to open the METRONOME screen.



Set the following items on this screen.

Press the **METRONOME** button again to change the item.

Use the **VALUE** (+/-) buttons to change the setting value.

TEMPO

Set the speed to a value between 20 and 250 beats per minute (BPM). The default value is 120.

BEAT

Set the accent frequency between Θ and Θ . There is no accent when set to Θ . The default value is Φ .

LEVEL

Set the metronome volume between @ and 1@. The default value is 5.

Starting and stopping the metronome

When the METRONOME screen is open, press the ▶ button to start or stop the metronome.


NOTE

When the METRONOME screen is open, press the **HOME** button to stop the metronome and return to the Home Screen.

System settings (SETUP)

On the SETUP Screen, you can change various settings according to your use environment and other requirements. You can also initialize and format the SD card.

To access the SETUP screen, press the **MENU** button to open the menu list, select the SETUP item using the **△/BROWSE** and **▼/MIC** buttons and press the **▶** button or **▶►**I button.



You can make the following settings on the SETUP screen.

Use the ▲/ BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the desired item. (When selected, the ":" becomes "→" and the setting value appears as light letters on a dark background.) Use the VALUE (+/–) buttons to change the setting value.

Setting the forward/backward search speed

Options: $\times 2$, $\times 4$, $\times 8$ (Default value), $\times 10$

Setting the automatic power off time

Use the AUTO OFF item to set the time before the unit power automatically turns OFF after the last activity or operation when powered by the internal battery.

Options: OFF (Default value), 3min, 5min, 10min, 30min

Adjusting the display contrast

Use the CONTRAST item to adjust the display contrast.

Range: 1-20 (Default value: 5)

Setting the battery type

Use the BATTERY TYPE item to set the kind of batteries used in the unit. This setting is used to show the amount of remaining battery charge and to determine if the unit has enough power for normal operation.

Options: ALKAL (alkaline batteries, default value), Ni-MH (nickel-metal hydride batteries)

Restoring the default values (factory settings)

Use the INITIALIZE item to restore the various settings of this unit to their factory default values.

- Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select INITIALIZE (Exec appears light on dark).
- Press the ► button to open a confirmation pop-up window.



3. Press the ▶ button to initialize the settings.

Press the ७/ I[■] button to cancel initialization.

Using QUICK FORMAT

Use the QUICK FORMAT item to format an SD card quickly. Using the QUICK FORMAT item deletes all music files on the card, and automatically creates MUSIC and UTILITY folders and a dr-1.sys file.

 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the QUICK FORMAT item (Exec appears light on dark). Press the ► button to open a confirmation pop-up window.



3. Press the ▶ button to execute quick formatting.

Press the ७/ I[■] button to cancel quick formatting.

Using FULL FORMAT

Use the FULL FORMAT item to completely format an SD card. Using the FULL FORMAT item deletes all music files on the card, and automatically creates MUSIC and UTILITY folders and a dr-1.sys file.

If you use the FULL FORMAT item, the unit checks the memory for errors before formatting the card. For this reason it takes a long time compared to the QUICK FORMAT option.

 Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select FULL FORMAT (Exec appears light on dark).

Press the ► button to open a confirmation pop-up window.



3. Press the ▶ button to execute full formatting.

Press the ७/ I[■] button to cancel full formatting.

CAUTION

When formatting a card, use a TASCAM PS-P520 AC adapter (sold separately), USB bus power or confirm that the batteries are sufficiently charged. If the power fails during formatting, the formatting might not occur correctly.

Setting the file name format

You can set the format of the names given to files recorded by the unit.

- 1. Press the MENU button to open the MENU screen.
- 2. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the FILE NAME menu item, and press the ▶ button or ▶►I button to open the FILE NAME screen.



Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select each item, (when selected, the "" becomes an "→" and the setting value is highlighted or the cursor is shown.

You can make the following settings for the items on the screen.

File name format

Use the **VALUE (+/–)** buttons to set the TYPE item to WORD or DATE.

Options: WORD (default value), DATE

WORD: The six characters set in the WORD item are used to name files.

Setting the characters in the WORD item

When the ₩ORD item is selected, use the I◀◀ and ▶►I buttons to move the cursor, and use the VALUE(+/−) buttons to change each character.

16-Using the footswitch

This unit has a **REMOTE** jack to which you can connect a TASCAM RC-3F footswitch-type remote control (sold separately) that can be used to operate the unit.

Setting footswitch operation

Use the FOOT SW setting screen to make footswitch settings.

- 1. Press the MENU button to open the MENU screen.
- 2. Use the ▲/BROWSE and ▼/MIC buttons to select the FOOT SW menu item, and press the ▶ button or ▶►I button to open the FOOT SW screen.

To open the INFORMATION screen, press the **MENU** button to open the MENU screen, select the INFORMATION item and press the ▶ button or ▶►I button.






