Electrical energy can perform many useful functions. This TV set has been engineered and manufactured to assure your personal safety. However, improper use can result in potential electrical shock or fire hazards. In order not to defeat the safeguards incorporated in this TV set, observe the following basic rules for antenna/TV installation, use and servicing.

Do not remove the cabinet cover. This may expose you to dangerous voltages. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

La energía eléctrica puede realizar funciones muy útiles. Este televisor ha sido diseñado y fabricado para asegurar su seguridad personal. Sin embargo, la utilización inadecuada del mismo puede resultar en descargas eléctricas o en el riesgo de incendios. Para no anular las protecciones incorporadas en este televisor, tenga en cuenta las reglas básicas de instalación de la antena/televisor, y en caso de proplemas póngase en contacto con un centro de reparaciones.

No extraiga de la cubierta de la caja. Esto podría dejarle expuesto a tensiones peligrosas. En caso de averia, consulte los servicios de personal cualificado.

INSTALLATION / INSTALACIÓN

Power Sources — The TV set should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the TV set or as indicated in the Owner's Manual. If you are not sure of the type of power supply in your home, consult your sales person or your local power company. For TV sets designed to operate from battery power, refer to the operating instructions.

Fuentes de alimentación — Este televisor solamente deberá alimentarse con la fuente de alimentación indicada en la etiqueta de características. Si no está seguro del tipo de fuente de alimentación de su hogar, consulte al proveedor de su televisor o a la compañia eléctrica local. Para productos destinados a alimentarse con pilas, u otras fuentes, consulte las instrucciones de operación.

Grounding or Polarization — The TV set is equipped with one of the following type plugs. If the plug should fail to fit the power outlet, contact your electrician to replace your obsolete outlet. DO NOT defeat the safety purpose of the type plug on the TV set.

Puesta a tierra o polarización — Este televisor puede poseer un enchufe de los tipos siguinetes. Si el enchufe no entra en la toma de la red, póngase en contacto con un electricista para que le cambie la toma anticuada. NO anule el fin de seguirdad de sete tipo de enchufe del televisor.

A polarized alternating current line plug — having one blade wider than the other. This plug will fit into the power outlet only one way. If you are unable to insert the plug into the outlet, try reversing the plug.

Un enchufe de línea de corriente alterna polarizado — posee una cuchilla más ancha que la otra. Este enchufe entrará en la toma de la red de una sola forma. Si no puede inertar el enchufe en la toma de la red, trate de invertirlo.

Alternate Warnings — A three-wire grounding-type plug — a plug having a third (grounding) pin. This plug will only fit into grounding-type power outlet.

Advertencias alternativas — Enchufe de tippo puesta a tierra de tres conductores — enchufe que posee un tercer terminal (de puesta a tierra). Este enchufe solamente encajará en una toma de la red de tipo puesta a tierra.

Water and Moisture — Do not use the TV set near water — for example, near a bath tub, wash bowl, kitchen sink, or laundry tub; in a wet basement; or near a swimming pool; and the like.

Agua y humedad — No utilice el televisor cerca del agua — por ejemplo, cerca de una bañera, un lavabo, un fregadero, una lavadora, en un sótano húmedo, cerca de una piscina, ni lugares por el estilo.

Ventilation — The slots and openings in the cabinet and in the back or bottom are provided for necessary ventilation. Never block or cover these slots and openings to ensure reliable operation of the TV set and to protect it from overheating.

Ventilación — Las ranuras y aberturas de la caja y de la parte posterior o de la base son para proporcionar la ventilación necesaria. Para asegurar la operación fiable del televisor para protegerlo contra el recalentamiento. No bloquee ni cubra nunca estas ranuras y aberturas.

- a. Never cover the slots and openings with a cloth or other materials.
- a. No cubra nunca las ranuras ni las aberturas con paños ni otros materiales.
- b. Never block the slots and openings by placing the TV set on a bed, sofa, rug or other similar surface.
- No bloquee nunca las ranuras ni las aberturas colocando el televisor sobre una cama, un sofá, una alfombra, ni demás superficies similares.
- c. Never place the TV set in a confined space such as a bookcase, builtin cabinet, or any other place of poor ventilation.
- No coloque nunca el televisor en un espacio cubierto, como una librería o un estante empotrados, nien un lugar de mala ventilación.

Heat — Do not place the TV set near or over a radiator or heat register, or where it is exposed to direct sunlight.

Calor — No coloque el televisor cerca ni sobre un radiador ni un registro de calor, ni expuesto a la luz solar directa.

Power-Cord Protection — Do not allow anything to rest on or roll over the power cord, and do not place the TV set where the power cord is subject to wear or abuse.

Protección del cable de alimentación — No coloque ni pase sobre el cable de alimentación, ni coloque el telivisor donde su cable de alimentación pueda sufir cualquier tipo de daños.

Accessories — Do not place the TV set on an unstable cart, stand, tripod, bracket, or table. The TV set may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the TV set. Use only with a cart, stand, tripod, bracket, or table recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the TV set, and should use a mounting accessory recommended by the manufacturer.

Accesorios — No coloque el televisor sobre un carrito, una base, un trípode, un soporte ni una mesea inestable. El televisor podría caerse, causando serios daños a niños o adultos, o al propio televisor. Utilice solamente el carrito, la base, el trípode, el soporte, o la mesa que recomiende el fabricante, o que se venda con el televisor, y utilice un accesorio de montaje recomendado por el fabricante.

A product and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the product and cart combination to overturn.

La combinación de un producto y un carrito deberá moverse con cuidado. Las paradas repentinas, la fuerza excesiva, y las superficies desiguales pondrían hacer que volcase la combinación del carrito y del producto.



USE / UTILIZACIÓN

Overloading — Do not overload wall outlets, extension cords or convenience receptacles beyond their capacity, since this can result in fire or electric shock.

Sobrecarga — No sobrecargue las tomas de la red, los cables prolongadores, ni los adaptadores para múltiples tomas, ya que esto supondría el riesgo de incendios o de descargas eléctricas.

During lightning storms, or when the TV set will be left unattended and unused for a long period of time, unplug the power cord from the wall outlet and disconnect the antenna or cable system. This will prevent damage to the TV set due to lightning and power-line surges.

Durante tormentas eléctricas, o cuando no vaya a utilizar el televisor durante mucho tiempo, desenchufe el cable de alimentación de la toma de la red y desconecte la antena o el sistema de cablevisión. Esto evitará que se dañe el televisor debido a rayos y a sobretensiones repentinas en la red.

Object and Liquid Entry — Never push objects of any kind into the TV set through the cabinet slots as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the TV set.

Entrada de objetos y líquidos — No introduzca nunca objetos de ningún tipo en este televisor a través de las aberturas, ya que podrían tocar puntos de tensión peligrosa o cortocircuitar piezas, lo que podría resultar en incendio o descarga eléctrica. No vierta nunca liquidos de ningún tipo sobre este televisor.

Cleaning — Unplug the TV set from the wall outlet before cleaning or polishing it. Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners. Use a cloth lightly dampened with water for cleaning the exterior of the TV set.

Limpieza — Desenchufe el televisor de la toma de la red antes de limpiarlo. No utilice limpiadores líquidos ni aerosoles. Para limpiar el exterior del televisor, utilice un paño ligeramente humedecido en agua.

Attachments — Never add accessories that have not been specifically designed for the TV set. Never remodel the TV set by yourself as this can result in a fire hazard or electric shock.

Aditamentos — No utilice aditamentos no recomendados por el fabricante del televisor, ya que podrían suponer un peligro. No remodele nunca el televisor usted mismo, ya que esto podría causar el riesgo de incendios o descargas eléctricas.

If a snapping or popping sound from a TV set is heard continuously or frequently while the TV set is operated, unplug the TV set and consult your dealer or service technician. It is normal for some TV sets to make occasional snapping or popping sounds, particularly when being turned on or off.

Si se oye un sonido seco de un televisor continuo o frecuente mientras el televisor esté funcionando, desenchúfelo y consulte a su proveedor o a un técnico de servicio. Es normal que algunos televisores produzcan sonidos secos, particularmente cuando conecte o desconecte su alimentación.

SERVICE / SERVICIO DE REPARACIÓN

Damage Requiring Service — Unplug the TV set from the wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:

Daños que requieren el servicio de reparación — En los casos siguientes, desenchufe el televisor de la toma de la red y solicite los servicios de personal de reparación especializado:

- a. When the power cord or plug is damaged or frayed.
- a. Cuando se haya dañado el cable de alimentación o el enchufe.
- b. When liquid has been spilled into the TV set.
- b. Cuando se haya vertido líquido dentro del televisor.
- c. When the TV set has been exposed to rain or water.
- c. Cuando el televisor haya estado expuesto a la lluvia o al agua.
- d. When the TV set has been subject to excessive shock by being dropped, or the cabinet has been damaged.
- d. Cuando el televisor haya estado expuesto a golpes excesivos o haya caído, o su caja se haya dañado.
- e. When the TV set does not operate normally even though you follow the operating instructions. Adjust only those controls that are specified in the operating instructions. Improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and will often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the TV set to normal operation.

When the TV set exhibits a distinct change in performance. This indicates a need for service.

e. Cuando el televisor no funcione normalmente incluso al seguir las instrucciones de operación. Ajuste solamente los controles indicados en las instrucciones de operación, ya que un ajuste inadecuado de otros controles podría resultar en daños y a menudo requerirán un trabajo difícil por un técnico cualificado para devolver el televisor a su funcionamiento normal.

Cuando el funcionamiento del televisor haya cambiado notablemente — esto indica la necesidad del servicio de reparación.

Servicing — Do not attempt to service the TV set yourself. To open or remove the covers may expose you to dangerous voltage or other hazards. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

Reparación — No intente nunca reparar el televisor por sí mismo. La apertura o extracción de cubiertas podría exponerle a tensiones peligrosas u otros peligros. En caso de avería solicite los servicios de personal de reparación cualificado.

Replacement Parts — When replacement parts are required, be sure the service technician certifies in writing that he has used replacement parts specified by the manufacturer that have the same characteristics as the original parts. Unauthorized substitutions may result in fire, electric shock, or other hazards.

Reemplazo de piezas — Cuando sea necesario reemplazar piezas, cerciórese de que el técnico de reparación utilice las piezas de reemplazo especificadas por el fabricante u otras que posean las mismas características que las originales. Las substituciones no autorizadas podrían resultar en incendios, descargas eléctricas, u otros peligros.

Safety Check — Upon completion of any service or repairs to the TV set, ask the service technician to perform routine safety checks (as specified by the manufacturer) to determine that the TV set is in safe operating condition, and to so certify.

Comprobación de seguridad — Al finalizar cualquier reparación de este televisor, solicite al técnico de reparación que realice las comprobaciones de sguridad (especificadas por el fabricante) para determinar y certificar si el producto se encuentra en las condiciones de operación apropiadas.

When the TV set reaches the end of its useful life, improper disposal could result in a picture tube implosion. Ask a qualified service technician to dispose of the TV set.

Cuando el televisor llegue al final de su vida útil, si se deshace de él de forma inapropiada, el tubo de imagen puede explotar. Cuando desee deshacerse de un televisor, solicite este servicio a un técnico de reparación especializado.

ANTENNA / ANTENA

Outdoor Antenna Grounding — If an outdoor antenna is installed, follow the precautions below.

An outdoor antenna system should not be located in the vicinity of overhead power lines or other electric light or power circuits, or where it can come in contact with such power lines or circuits.

WHEN INSTALLING AN OUTDOOR ANTENNA SYSTEM, EXTREME CARE SHOULD BE TAKEN TO KEEP FROM CONTACTING SUCH POWER LINES OR CIRCUITS AS CONTACT WITH THEM IS ALMOST INVARIABLY FATAL.


Be sure the antenna system is grounded so as to provide some protection against voltage surges and built-up static charges. Section 810 of the National Electrical Code in the USA and Section 54 of the Canadian Electrical Code in Canada provides information with respect to proper grounding of the mast and supporting structure, grounding of the lead-in wire to an antenna discharge unit, size of grounding conductors, location of antenna discharge unit, connection to grounding electrodes, and requirements for the grounding electrode.

Puesta a tierra de la antena exterior — Cuando instale una antena exterior, tenga en cuenta las precauciones siguientes.

Un sistema de antena esterior no deberá colocarse cerca de líneas de alta tensión ni otros circuitos de iluminación o alimentación, ni donde pueda entrar en contacto con tales líneas o circuitos.

CUANDO INSTALE UN SISTEMA DE ANTENA EXTERIOR, TENGA EXTREMADO CUIDADO PARA EVITAR QUE ENTRE EN CONTACTO CON TALES LÍNEAS DE ALIMENTACIÓN O CIRCUITOS, YA QUE TAL CONTACTO PODRÍA RESULTAR INVARIABLEMENTE FATAL.

Cerciórese de que el sistema de antena esté puesto a tierra a fin de que proporcione cierta protección contra sobretensiones y cargas estáticas. La Sección 810 del Código Eléctrico Nacional (NEC) de EE.UU. y la Sección 54 del Código Eléctrico Canadiense ofrecen informacón con respecto a la puesta a tierra adecuada de una unidad de descarga de antena, el tamaño de los conductores de puesta a tierra, la ubicación de la unidad de descarga de la antena, la conexión de los electrodos de puesta a tierra, y los requisitos de tales electrodos.

Welcome to Toshiba


Congratulations! You have purchased one of the finest color TVs on the market. The goal of this manual is to guide you through setting up and operating your Toshiba TV as quickly as possible. Please make sure you've received the following items: TV, remote control, batteries, manual, registration card, and extended service plan literature. If you did not receive all of the items, or any of the items are damaged or broken, please contact your Toshiba dealer. In addition, you may need to purchase other audio or video cables to connect your equipment. See "Connecting your TV" on page 2 for more information.

Please read all the safety and operating instructions carefully before you begin.

This manual applies to models 27A60, 32A60 and 36A60, and there are slight differences among them. The 36A60 is the model used for illustration purposes. Instructions in this manual are based on using the Remote Control. Check the model of your TV before using this manual.

Exploring your new TV

You can operate your TV by using the buttons on the front panel or the remote control. The back panel provides all the terminal connections you will need to connect other equipment to your TV.



Selecting a location for the TV

- Place the TV on the floor or on a sturdy platform in a location where light does not directly hit the screen.
- Place the TV far enough from the walls to allow proper ventilation. Inadequate ventilation may cause overheating, which may damage the TV.


The model number and serial number are on the back of your TV. Record these numbers in the spaces below. Refer to these numbers whenever you communicate with your Toshiba dealer about this TV.

Caution:

The plug has one prong wider than the other and will fit only one way into a standard electrical outlet (120 volt AC, 60 Hz). If the plug does not fit into the outlet, try turning it around. If the plug still does not fit, the outlet is probably non-standard and must be replaced by a qualified electrician. **Do not**


tamper with the plug or try to force it into a non-standard outlet.



Connecting your TV

If you haven't connected electronic equipment before, or you have been frustrated in the past, you may wish to read this section. (Cables are not supplied.)

- A coaxial cable is the standard cable that comes in from your antenna or cable converter box. Coaxial cables use "F" connectors.
- Audio and video cables are usually color coded according to use:
 yellow for video and red and white for audio. The red audio cable
 is for the stereo right channel, and the white audio cable is for the
 stereo (or mono) left channel. If you look at the rear panel of the
 TV, you will see that the terminals are color coded in the same
 manner as the cables.
- S-video cables provide better picture performance. S-video cables can only be used with S-video compatible components.
- ColorStreamTM cables come in sets of three and provide the best picture performance. ColorStream cables can only be used with ColorStream compatible components.




Connecting a VCR

This connection allows you to watch local channels and video programs, play or record on the VCR while watching TV, and to record from one channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- one pair of audio cables (only one cable for a mono VCR)
- one video cable



Caution:

Do not plug the TV in until you have finished connecting all of your equipment.

Caution:


If using a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable. If you have a S-VHS VCR, use the S-video connections and remove the video cable.

Do not connect the video cable and the S-video cable to Video-1 simultaneously.

Connecting a cable converter box

This connection allows you to watch cable and premium channels. You should keep your TV selected to ANT-1 so that you can use the TV features. When viewing premium channels, select ANT-2 and tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), then use the converter box to change channels.

You will need two coaxial cables.




Connecting a cable converter box and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch and record basic and premium cable channels, as well as watch videotapes. Change the TV to video mode. Tune the VCR to channel 3 or 4 (the same channel as the cable box output switch). Use the cable convertor box to change channels. The PIP source should be set to TV mode. (see page 24)

You will need:

- three coaxial cables
- one pair of audio cables (only one cable for a mono VCR)
- one video cable
- cable splitter



Caution:


If you have a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable. If you have a S-VHS VCR, use the S-video connections and remove the video cable. Do not connect the video cable and the S-video cable to Video-1 simultaneously.

Connecting a DVD/satellite receiver and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DVD/satellite, video and TV programs. You can record from the DVD/satellite receiver and TV, as well as record one TV channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- · one coaxial cable
- three pairs of audio cables (only one cable for a mono VCR)
- two video cables
- one S-video cable



Caution:

You can use a video cable instead of the S-video cable, but the picture quality will decrease. If you use a S-video cable between the TV and DVD/satellite receiver, make the audio connections only and remove the video connection.


Do not connect the video cable and the S-video cable to Video-1 simultaneously.

Connecting a DVD with ColorStream[™] and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DVD, video or TV programs and to record DVD or TV programs. You can record from one source and watch a program from another source. Your TV is capable of using ColorStream (color difference). Connecting your TV to a ColorStream compatible DVD, such as a Toshiba DVD, can greatly enhance picture quality and performance.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- three pairs of audio cables (only one cable for a mono VCR)
- two video cables
- one set of ColorStream video cables



Caution:


To play from the DVD, the DVD and TV must use ColorStream connections. To record from the DVD, the DVD and TV must select Video.

Connecting two VCRs

This connection allows you to record from one VCR to another VCR while watching a video program. You will also be able to record from one TV channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- two pairs of audio cables (only two cables for mono VCRs)
- two video cables



Caution:


Do not connect one VCR to the output and input jacks on the TV at the same time. If you are using a S-VHS VCR, use the S-video connections and remove the video cable. Do not connect the video cable and the S-video cable to Video-1 simultaneously.

Connecting a camcorder

This connection allows you to watch video materials recorded on a camcorder.

You will need:


- one pair of audio cables
- one video cable



Connecting an audio amplifier

This connection allows you to use an audio amplifier to adjust the audio level. This also allows you to use external speakers.

To control the audio, turn on the TV and the stereo amplifier. You will need one pair of audio cables.



Caution:

If you are using a S-VHS camcorder with a S-video output, connect this to the S-video input on the TV and remove the video cable. Do not connect the video cable and the S-video cable to Video-1 simultaneously.

Using the remote control


Preparing the remote control for use

With the remote control, you can operate your TV, most VCR models, and cable TV converters together, even if they are different brands. If you will be using your TV with a Toshiba VCR, your remote control is already programmed and ready to use. If you own different brands of VCRs and/or converters, you first have to program your remote control. (See "Programming the remote control for use with a VCR or a cable TV converter" on page 8.)


Installing the remote control batteries

To install the batteries:

1. Slide the battery cover off of the back of the remote control.



2. Install two "AA" size batteries. Match the + and - signs on the batteries to the signs on the battery compartment.



3. Slide the battery cover back on to the remote control until the lock snaps.

Using the remote control with a VCR or a cable TV converter

To control a Toshiba VCR:

Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to the VCR position. The buttons shown to the right will then control the VCR. The rest of the buttons will operate the TV as usual.

To control a cable TV converter:

Program the remote control to recognize the brand of your converter (see "Programming the remote control for use with a VCR or cable TV converter," page 8). The shaded buttons shown on the right will control the cable TV converter.


Set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch to the CABLE position.

Note:

This remote control's functions may or may not operate your VCR or cable TV converter. Refer to the owner's manuals supplied with the equipment to see which features are available. In addition, the original controllers may have features not available on this remote control. If you would like to continue to use these features, you may want to use the original remote control.

Caution:

- Dispose of your batteries in a designated disposal area. Do not throw your batteries into a fire.
- Do not mix battery types or combine used batteries with new ones.
- Remove dead batteries immediately to prevent battery acid from leaking into the battery compartment.
- If you do not intend to use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries.



Note:

Some cable/TV converters may require the ENT key to be pressed after pressing channel numbers. (i.e. 0 - 2 - ENT)

Programming the remote control for use with a VCR or a cable TV converter


This remote control is pre-programmed to operate Toshiba VCRs. To use VCRs or cable converters other than Toshiba models, you must follow the steps below before you operate your remote control.

- 1. Refer to the "VCR code table" or "Cable TV converter code table" on pages 9-10 to find the number that corresponds to the brand name of your VCR or converter.
 - If more than one number is listed, try each one separately until you find the one that works.
- 2. If you are reprogramming the remote control to operate your:
 - VCR, set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch on the remote control to VCR.
 - cable converter, set the TV/CABLE/VCR switch on the remote control to CABLE.
- Hold down the RECALL button while using the Number buttons to enter the three-digit code number of your brand of VCR or converter.
- 4. Point the remote control at the VCR or converter and press POWER to test the code number.

If the VCR or converter turns on, you have entered the right number.

If the VCR or converter does not respond to the remote control, you may have entered the wrong number. Repeat steps 1-4 with another code number.

Note:

- Each time you replace the batteries, you must reprogram the remote control.
- Some newer VCRs are capable of working on either of two remote codes. These VCRs have a switch labeled "VCR1/VCR2." If your VCR has this kind of switch, it may not respond to any of the code numbers for your VCR brand name. In this case, set the switch to the other position (VCR1 or VCR2) and reprogram the remote control.





Remote Control

- This Remote Control is equipped with buttons (marked O) that glow in the dark.
- Only the buttons that are used to operate the TV set are described here.



Setting up your TV

After you've installed the batteries and programmed the remote control, you need to set some preferences on the TV using the menu. You can access the menu with the buttons on your TV or by using the remote control.


- When you make a menu selection, your changes occur immediately.
 You do not have to press MENU or EXIT to see your changes.
- After fifteen seconds, the menu screen will automatically disappear if you do not make a selection. Your changes will still be saved.
- When you are finished programming the menus, press EXIT.

Changing the on-screen display language

You can choose from three different languages (English, French and Spanish) for the on-screen displays. Adjustment menus and messages will appear in the language of your choice.

To select a language:

1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ until the SET UP menu appears.






- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight LANGUAGE.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight your desired language.

Selecting the antenna input

You can connect to two different signal sources by choosing the antenna input (ANT 1 or ANT 2).

To select the antenna input:


- 1. Press MENU, then use ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight ANT 1/2.




3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight either ANT 1 or ANT 2, depending on the antenna terminal you wish to use.

Using the TV/VIDEO button

You can monitor or change the signal source that is connected to the TV. By pressing the TV/VIDEO button on your TV, you can select the VIDEO 1, VIDEO 2, ColorStream, ANT 1 or ANT 2 mode. The signal source you are currently connected to will be displayed in purple.





To select the antenna input:

1. Press the TV/VIDEO button on the TV. The signal source you are connected to is displayed in purple.



2. Press the button until ANT 1 or ANT 2 is displayed in purple, indicating the antenna terminal you wish to use.

Adding channels to the TV's memory


Your TV will stop on specific channels that are stored in the TV's channel memory when you press Channel ▲ or ▼. Use the steps below to set all active channels in your area automatically.

Programming channels automatically

Your TV can automatically detect all active channels and store them in its memory. After the TV has stored the channels in its memory, you can erase channels or add your favorite channels. If you use both ANT-1 and ANT-2 terminals, you must program channels for each input source.

To add channels:

- 1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ until the TV/CABLE selection is highlighted.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight either TV or CABLE, depending on which you use.





If you use an antenna, choose TV. If you use cable, choose CABLE.

- 4. Press ▼ to select CH PROGRAM.
- 5. Press ◀ or ▶ to start channel programming. The TV will automatically cycle through all the TV or Cable channels (depending on which you selected), and store all active channels in the channel memory.

While the TV is cycling through the channels, the message "CH PROGRAM" appears.

- 6. When channel programming is complete, the message "CH Completed (channel or cable number)" appears.
- 7. Press Channel ▲ or ▼ to view the programmed channels.






Adding and erasing channels manually

After you've programmed the channels, you can add or erase specific channels.

To add or erase channels:

- 1. Select the channel you want to add or erase using Channel ▲ or ▼. If adding channels, you must select the channel to add by using the Channel Number buttons.
- 2. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight ADD/ERASE.



- 4. Press ◀ or ▶ to select ADD or ERASE, whichever function you want to perform.
- 5. Repeat steps 1-4 for other channels you want to add or erase.

Changing channels

To change the channel, you can:

- change the programmed channels using the remote control
- select a channel directly using the remote control
- scan the channels using the TV buttons


To change to the next programmed channel:


Press Channel ▲ or ▼ on the TV or remote control.

To change to a specific channel (programmed or unprogrammed):

Press the Channel Number buttons (0-9 and 100).

For example, to select channel 125, press the 100 button, the 2 button, and the 5 button.

Adjusting the channel settings

Switching between two channels

You can switch between two channels without entering an actual channel number each time.

To switch between two channels:

- 1. Select the first channel you want to view.
- 2. Select a second channel with the Channel Number buttons (0-9, 100).
- 3. Press CH RTN. The previous channel will be displayed.

Each time you press CH RTN, the TV will switch back and forth between the two channels.

Programming your favorite channels

You can preset up to 12 of your favorite channels using the Favorite Channel Programming feature. Because this feature scans through only your favorite channels, it allows you to skip other channels you do not normally watch.

You can still use Channel ▲▼ to scan through all the channels you programmed in the TV's memory.

To program your favorite channels:

- 1. Select a channel you want to program.
- 2. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight FAVORITE CH.



4. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the FAVORITE CH menu.

SET/CLEAR will be highlighted.





- 5. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight SET and press ▲ or ▼.
- 6. Press EXIT to clear the screen.
- 7. Repeat steps 1 through 6 for up to 11 other channels.

To select your favorite channels:

Press the FAV CH ▲▼ buttons on the remote control to select your favorite channels.

The FAV CH ▲▼ buttons will not work until you have programmed your favorite channels.






To clear your favorite channels:

- 1. Select a channel you want to clear.
- 2. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight FAVORITE CH.
- 4. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the FAVORITE CH menu. SET/CLEAR will be highlighted.



5. Press the ◀ or ▶ to highlight CLEAR.



- 6. Press ▲ or ▼ until "0" replaces the channel number you want to erase.
- 7. Press EXIT to clear the screen.
- 8. Repeat steps 1 through 6 for the other channels.

Using the V-Chip

You can prevent others from viewing certain programs or channels by using the V-Chip feature.


Selecting a PIN code


Before you can block programs and channels, though, you must select a personal identification number (PIN) code. The PIN code you select prevents others from changing the rating limits you set.

To select your PIN code and access the V-Chip menus:

- 1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight V-CHIP CONTROL.







3. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the V-CHIP menu.



4. Use the Channel Number buttons (0-9) to enter your PIN code. If you are accessing the V-Chip menus for the first time, select a four-digit number to be your PIN code. Wait 2 seconds for the BLOCKING menu to appear.



5. You may now enable blocking — "Blocking programs by ratings" (see below), "Blocking channels" (see page 20), "To change your PIN code" (below) or "Blocking unrated movies or programs" (see page 20).

To change your PIN code:



- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight V-CHIP CONTROL.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the V-CHIP menu.
- 4. Use the Channel Number buttons (0-9) to enter your PIN code. If you are accessing the V-Chip menus for the first time, select a four-digit number to be your PIN code. Wait 2 seconds for the BLOCKING menu to appear.
- 5. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight NEW PIN CODE and press ◀ or ▶ to display the NEW PIN CODE menu.
- 6. Use the Channel Number buttons (0-9) to enter a new code. Wait 2 seconds for the BLOCKING menu to appear.
- 7. Press EXIT to return to normal viewing.

Blocking programs by ratings

The Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) uses a rating system to qualify motion picture content. Television broadcasters employ a rating system to qualify the content of television programs, as well. The MPAA, Youth TV and TV ratings work with the V-Chip feature and allow you to block out programming above the rating limits you determine.

Note:

If you forget your PIN code, press RECALL four times within five seconds from the V-CHIP menu. This allows you to proceed to the BLOCKING menu and reset your PIN code.





As you block ratings, all ratings higher than the ones you select are blocked, as well. For example, if you choose to block the MPAA rating R, the higher ratings, NC17 and X, are automatically blocked, too.
- 9. When you are done selecting the ratings to be blocked, press EXIT to return to normal viewing.

When you try to view a program with a ratings block, a message will appear listing the program's ratings. The program can still be viewed if you press MUTE and then enter your PIN code to temporarily bypass the block.



Note:

Not all programs are rated. To block programs or movies that are unrated, see "Blocking unrated movies or programs," page 20.

Blocking unrated movies or programs

Some movies and programs are not rated. You can block these movies and programs using the V-Chip.

To block unrated movies or programs:

- 1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight V-CHIP.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the V-CHIP menu.
- 4. Use the Channel Number buttons (0-9) to enter your PIN code. If you are accessing the V-Chip menus for the first time, select a four-digit number to be your PIN code. Wait 2 seconds for the BLOCKING menu to appear.
- 5. Press ▲ or ▼ to select SET BLOCKING OPTIONS.
- 6. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the BLOCKING OPTION menu.
- 7. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight MPAA UNRATED.

 - Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight N to unblock unrated movies.
- 8. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight TV NONE RATING.
- 9. Press EXIT to return to normal viewing.

Blocking channels

You can also choose to block individual channels. These channels will not be seen regardless of the ratings of their programming. You can choose to block up to four TV channels and four cable channels.

To block channels:


- 1. Use the Channel Number Buttons (0-9) to display the television channel you wish to block.
- 2. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight V-CHIP and then press ◀ or ▶ to display the V-CHIP menu.
- 4. Use the Channel Number buttons (0-9) to enter your PIN code. If you are accessing the V-Chip menus for the first time, choose a four-digit number to be your PIN code. Wait 2 seconds for the BLOCKING menu to appear.
- 5. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight BLOCK CHANNEL and then press ◀ or ▶ to display the BLOCK CHANNEL menu.



- 6. Press ◀ or ▶.
 - ▲ or ▼ on SET will set current channel to be blocked.
 - ▲ or ▼ on CLEAR will clear all channels from the list of blocked channels.

Note:

Blocking television programs with a rating of "TV NONE" may block emergency messages.



7. Repeat steps 1 through 7 to block other channels. When you are finished blocking channels, press EXIT to return to normal viewing.

If you try to display a blocked channel, the TV will not display it, but will display the nearest unblocked channel.

To unblock channels:

- 1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the SET UP menu.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight V-CHIP and then press ◀ or ▶ to display the V-CHIP menu.
- 3. Use the Channel Number buttons (0-9) to enter your PIN code. If you are accessing the V-Chip menus for the first time, choose a four-digit number to be your PIN code. Wait 2 seconds for the BLOCKING menu to appear.
- 4. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight BLOCK CHANNEL and then press ◀ or ▶ to display the BLOCK CHANNEL menu.
- 5. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight CLEAR and clear all channels from the list of blocked channels. Press ▲ or ▼.
- 6. Press EXIT to return to normal viewing.

Video Lock

Video locks allow the user to lock out the input sources (Video 1, Video 2, ColorStream) and channels 3 and 4.

The possible options are listed below:

Video: This option blocks out Video 1, Video 2 and ColorStream

Video+: This option blocks out Video 1, Video 2, ColorStream,

channels 3 and 4

Off: Disables the video lock feature

Note: In normal TV viewing, if you cannot access the input sources (Video 1, Video 2, Video 3, ColorStream, Channel 3 or 4) please check that this feature has been disabled.

To setup the video lock, follow the steps below:


- 1. Press the MENU button. Press ◀ or ▶ to select SETUP.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to select the "V-Chip Control" menu item.



- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to activate the menu. At the prompt, enter the correct pin code number to access the V-Chip control menu. See the section on "V-Chip control" on steps for entering the pin code number. (pag e16)
- 4. If the correct pin code has been entered, press ▲ or ▼ to select the menu item "Video Lock."

Note:

After programming BLOCK CHANNEL, change channels before turning off the television.





- 6. Press the EXIT Button to exit the menu.

Labeling channels

Channel labels will appear over the channel number display each time you turn on the TV, select a channel, or press the Recall button. You can choose any four characters to identify the channels.

To create channel labels:

- 1. Select a channel you want to label.
- 2. Press MENU then press ◀ or ▶ until the SET UP menu appears.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight CH LABEL.




- 4. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the CH LABEL menu. SET/CLEAR will be highlighted.
- 5. Press **◄** or **▶** to highlight SET.



6. Press ▼ to highlight LABEL.





- 7. Assign the label to the channel. Press ◀ or ▶ to enter a character in the first space. Press the button repeatedly until the character you want appears on the screen. Press ENTER.
- 8. Repeat step 7 to enter the rest of the characters. If you would like a blank space in the label name, you must choose an empty space from the list of characters. Otherwise, a dash will appear in that space.
- 9. Press EXIT to clear the screen.
- 10. Repeat steps 1 through 8 for other channels. You can assign up to 32 labels.

To erase channel labels:

- 1. Select a channel with a label.
- 2. Press MENU then press **◄** or **▶** until the SET UP menu appears.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight CH LABEL.
- 4. Press ◀ or ▶ to display the CH LABEL menu. SET/CLEAR will be highlighted.
- 5. Press **◄** or **▶** to highlight CLEAR.
- 6. Press ENTER.
- 7. Repeat steps 1 through 6 to erase other channel labels.

Video Label

This feature allows you to rename the input sources for your TV. The available video label names include "-", "VCR", "DVD", "DTV", "SAT" and "CBL" where the symbol denotes the following:

-: uses the default label name

VCR: Video Cassette Recorder

DVD: Digital Video Disc or Digital Versatile Disc

SAT: Satellite box

DTV: Digital TV Set Top Box


CBL: Cable box

To setup your own video label names, follow the steps below:

- 1. Press the MENU button
- 2. Press ◀ or ▶ to select the SETUP menu.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight the "Video label" menu item, then press ◀ or ▶.




Watching picture-in-picture (PIP)

The picture-in-picture (PIP) feature allows you to watch two pictures at the same time. The smaller picture can be a TV broadcast or come from an external source, such as a VCR.

To display a TV broadcast as a small picture:


- 1. Turn on the TV and select the program you want to watch.
- 2. Press the PIP button once to display a small picture. A window 1/9 the size of the screen will appear. Press PIP a second time to display a 1/16 size window.



3. Press PIP CH ▲▼ to choose the program you want to be displayed as a small picture.


To display a picture from an external source as a small picture:

- 1. Make sure you have connected the external source equipment properly. For more information, see the "Connecting your TV" on page 2.
- 2. Turn on the TV and select the program you want to watch.
- 3. Press the PIP button once to display a small picture. A window 1/9 the size of the screen will appear. Press PIP a second time to display a 1/16 size window.
- 4. Press SOURCE repeatedly to select the input source (VIDEO 1 or VIDEO 2) for the small picture. The selected source will be displayed in purple. ColorStream cannot be selected.



To turn PIP off:

Press PIP once or twice, depending on the size of the small picture screen you selected.




Note:

PIP cannot be turned on when the ColorStream input is being viewed.

You cannot display the signal sources input through the ANT-2 terminal as a small picture.


Switching the main and small pictures

Press SWAP while you are using the PIP feature to switch the main and small pictures. The main and small pictures will switch each time you press the SWAP button.




Changing the position of the small picture

Press LOCATE repeatedly while you are watching a small picture. The display position of the small picture will change in the following order:



Freezing the small picture


Press STILL while you are watching a small picture. The small picture will become a still picture. To return to the moving picture, press STILL again.



Watching multi-window PIP


Multi-window PIP appears as six small boxes across the bottom of the screen. You must program channels first (see page 13, Programming channels automatically).

The TV cycles through all of the programmed channels and shows a few seconds of each channel's programming, then freezes the image and moves onto the next channel in a continuous cycle. The channel numbers appear above each PIP window. The LOCATE, SWAP, PIP CHANNEL ▲▼, SOURCE and STILL buttons do not work with this PIP feature.



To view the multi-window picture-in-picture (PIP) feature:

Press PIP three times.



To turn multi-window PIP off:

Press PIP again or change the channel using the CH ▲▼ buttons.


Adjusting the picture

Adjusting the picture quality

You can adjust the picture quality to your personal preferences, including the contrast, brightness, color, tint, and sharpness. The qualities you choose will be stored automatically in your TV's memory so you can recall them at any time.

To adjust the picture quality:


1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the PICTURE menu.




- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ until the item you want to adjust is highlighted.

Selecting the color temperature

You can change the quality of the picture by selecting from three preset color temperatures: cool, medium, and warm.

To select the color temperature:

- 1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the PREFERENCES menu.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight COLOR TEMPERATURE.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the mode you want.

Adjusting the picture preferences

You can select your desired picture type from three preset picture modes: Sports, Standard, and Movie.

To select the picture preferences:

- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight PICTURE PREFERENCES.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight the mode you want.

Watching video input

You can use the TV/VIDEO button on the remote control or the TV/VIDEO button on the TV to view a signal coming from other devices, such as VCRs or video disc players that may be connected to your TV. (See "Connecting your TV" on page 2.)

Displaying on-screen information

Press RECALL to display the following on-screen information:


- Antenna mode (when in TV mode)
- Channel number or VIDEO mode selected
- Channel label (if preset)
- Stereo or SAP (second audio program) audio status
- V-Chip rating status


Setting the off-timer

You can set the TV so it turns off automatically. To set the off-timer:

1 D MENII 1

1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ to select the SET UP menu.





- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to select the TIMER.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to select the off time (10-180 minutes, in 10-minute increments).
- 4. Press EXIT to exit the menu.

To cancel the off-timer:

Press POWER twice, once to turn the TV off, and once to turn it on again.

Auto power off

The TV will automatically turn itself off after approximately 15 minutes if it is tuned to a vacant channel or if a station completes its broadcast for the day and stops broadcasting on that channel. This feature, however, does not work in the VIDEO mode.

Using the closed caption feature


You have two options with the closed caption feature: captions or text. A caption is a printed version of the dialogue, narration and/or sound effects of a TV program. Text is information not related to the program that appears on half of the TV screen.

To view captions or text:


- 1. Select the desired program. The captioned programs are usually marked in your local TV listing by "CC."
- 2. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ until the C.CAPT menu appears.



3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight C.CAPT.



4. Press ◀ or ▶ to select the closed caption mode.


A closed caption signal may not be decoded in the following situations:

- · when a video tape has been dubbed
- when the signal reception is weak
- when the signal reception is nonstandard

When you choose a closed captioned channel and the text mode, the text screen always appears. When there is no signal, however, the text screen will not display text characters. • Select C1, C2, C3, or C4 to view captions. Select C1 for translation of the primary language in your area.



• Select T1, T2, T3, or T4 to view Text.



5. To turn off the closed-captioned feature, select OFF in step 4.

Adjusting the sound

Muting the sound

Press MUTE to temporarily turn off the sound. While the sound is off, the screen will display the word MUTE in the lower right-hand corner. To restore the sound, press MUTE again.

When you press the MUTE button, you automatically activate the closed caption feature. To deactivate this feature, press the MUTE button again. This feature only works when the closed caption mode is set to off. See "Using the closed captioned feature" on page 28 for more information.

Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts


You can enjoy watching TV while you listen to high-fidelity stereo sound with the Multi-channel TV Sound (MTS) feature. MTS can also transmit a second audio program (SAP) containing a second language or other audio information.


When the TV receives a stereo or SAP broadcast, the word STEREO or SAP appears on the screen when the TV is on, you change the channel, or press the RECALL button.

The MTS feature is not available while in the VIDEO mode.


To listen to stereo sound:

1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.





- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight MTS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight STR.



When you are watching a stereo broadcast, the word STR is displayed in yellow. You should leave your TV set to STEREO so you can automatically receive stereo or monaural sound, depending on the broadcast type. If the stereo sound is noisy, select MONO to reduce the noise. The word STR or SAP is displayed in yellow when the TV receives the signal, and in purple when you have selected the feature.

To listen to a second audio program:


- 1. Press MENU, then press **◄** or **▶** until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight MTS.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight SAP. You will hear only the second audio program from the left and right speakers.

Adjusting the sound quality


You can change the sound quality of your TV by adjusting the bass, treble, and balance.

To adjust the sound quality:


1. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.



- 2. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight the item you want to adjust.
- 3. Press ◀ or ▶ to adjust the level.



- Imakes the sound quality weaker or decreases the balance in the right channel, depending on the item selected.
- **b** makes the sound quality stronger or decreases the balance in the left channel, depending on the item selected.



Note:


To reset the audio adjustments to the factory settings, select RESET from the PICTURE menu.

Using the surround sound feature

The surround sound feature expands the audio listening field wider and deeper to create exceptional sound quality from the TV's speakers. The feature uses stereo signals from a TV broadcast or video input.

To turn on the surround sound feature:

- 1. Select the STEREO mode following the steps under "Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts" on page 29.
- 2. Press MENU, then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.
- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to highlight SURROUND.
- 4. Press ◀ or ▶ to highlight ON.



To turn off the surround sound feature:

Choose OFF in step 4 above.

In general, you should leave your TV set to SURROUND so it can automatically produce surround stereo or monaural sound, depending on the broadcast type.

Viewing the demonstration mode

The demonstration mode (DEMO) is an option available on the SET UP menu. If you select this mode, the TV will demonstrate several of the TV's features.

To stop the demonstration mode:

Select DEMO STOP in the SET UP menu, or press the RECALL, EXIT, or POWER buttons.

Understanding the last mode memory feature

If the power is cut off while you are viewing the TV and the power is resupplied, the last mode memory feature will turn the TV on automatically.

If the power is going to be off for a long time or you are going to be away from home for a long time, remove the power plug from the wall outlet to prevent the TV from turning on in your absence.

Appendix

Cleaning and care

WARNING:

TV sets use high voltage. Do not try to remove the cabinet back. Refer servicing to qualified service technicians.

To clean the TV screen:

- 1. Unplug the TV to avoid possible shock hazard.
- 2. Use a clean cellulose sponge or chamois cloth dampened with a solution of mild detergent and warm water to clean the TV screen and trim. Do not use too much water because water spills into the cabinet can cause damage to the TV.
- 3. Wipe off any excess moisture with a clean dry cloth.
- 4. Polish the cabinet with a quality furniture polish to maintain the finish and appearance of the cabinet.

Never use strong solvents such as thinner, benzene, or other chemicals on or near the cabinet. These chemicals can damage the finish of the cabinet.

Troubleshooting

Before calling a service technician, please check the following table for a possible cause of the problem and some solutions.

Problem	Solution
TV will not turn on	 Make sure the power cord is plugged in, then press POWER. The remote control batteries may be dead. Replace the batteries.
No picture, no sound	Check the antenna/cable connections.
No sound, picture OK	 The sound may be muted. Press VOLUME. The station may have broadcast difficulties. Try another channel.
Poor sound, picture OK	• The station may have broadcast difficulties. Try another channel.
Poor picture, sound OK	 Check the antenna connections. The station may have broadcast difficulties. Try another channel. Adjust the PICTURE menu.
Poor reception of broadcast channels	 The station may have broadcast difficulties. Try another channel. Check the antenna connections. If you are using a VCR, make sure the TV/VCR button is set correctly.
Cannot receive above channel 13	• Make sure TV/CABLE is set to TV mode.
Unable to select a certain channel or video input	 The channel may be locked out with the channel lock feature, video lock feature, or erased with the add/erase feature.
Multiple images	 The station may have broadcast difficulties. Try another channel. Use a highly directional outdoor antenna.

Poor color or no color

- The station may have broadcast difficulties. Try another channel.
- Adjust the TINT and/or COLOR in the PICTURE menu.
- If you change the direction of the TV while it is turned on, the picture could suffer from color shading. If so, turn off the TV and allow it to cool down for several hours before turning it on again.

No stereo or SAP sound from a known MTS broadcast

• Make sure the MTS feature is set properly.

The remote control does not operate

- Check if the TV/CABLE/VCR switch is properly set.
- There may be an obstruction between the remote control and the remote control sensor.
- The remote control batteries may be dead. Replace the batteries.

The V-Chip PIN code does not work

• Change or reset your PIN code. (See page 16, "Selecting a PIN code.")
