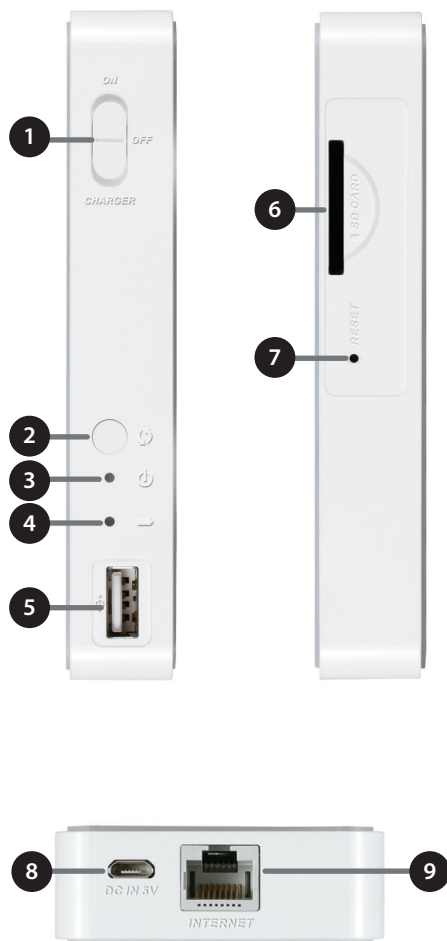

Introduction

Connect and charge devices anytime, anywhere with D-Link DIR-508L SharePort™ Go II Wireless N300 Portable Router and Charger. Stay connected wherever you are, and share an Internet connection from your home or hotel room, a 3G/4G mobile USB adapter, or even another wireless network. The DIR-508L remembers your connection details for you, so there is no need to configure the setting every time. Simply connect devices to the DIR-508L's wireless network and it will take care of the rest.

The DIR-508L is also a mobile power station that charges your gadgets anywhere, thanks to a built-in high-capacity 4000 mAh rechargeable battery. Never again be stuck with a dying smartphone.

Hardware Overview

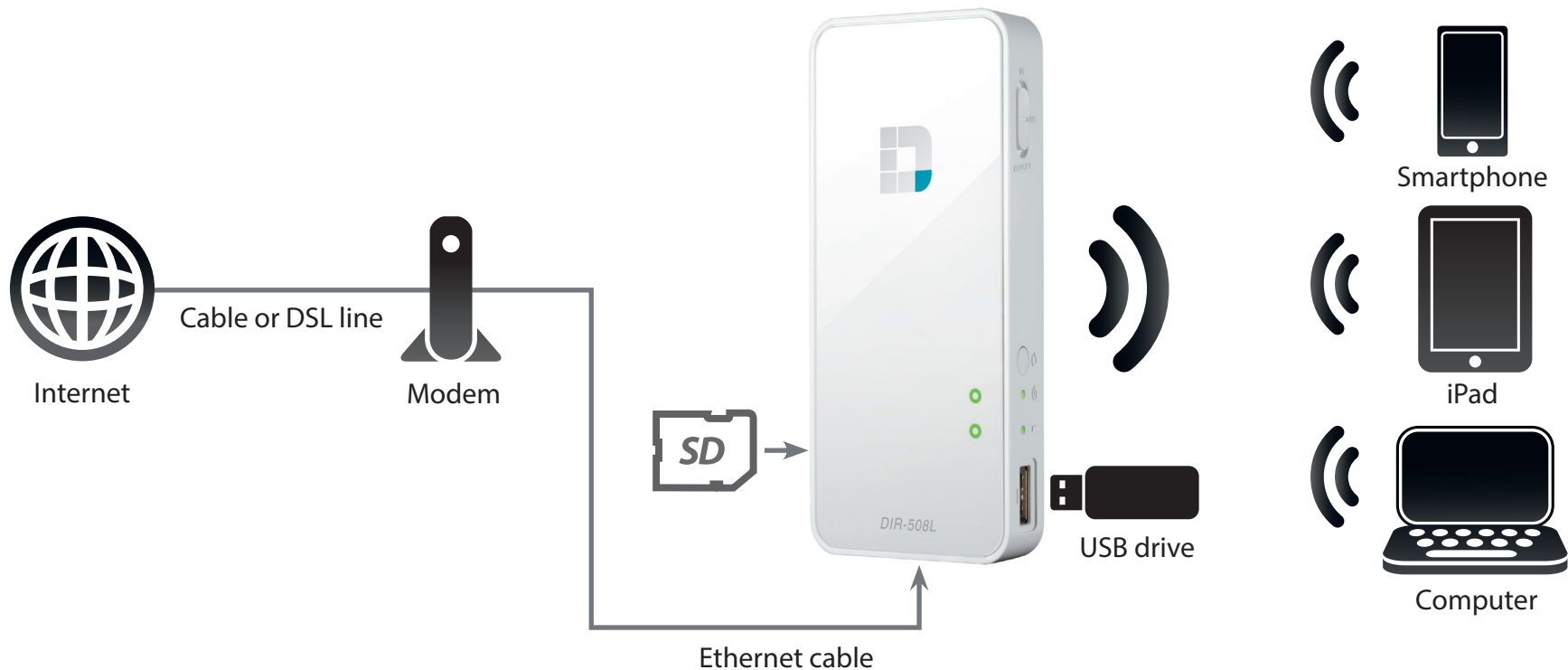

2	WPS Button	Press the WPS button to allow additional devices to connect securely and automatically.

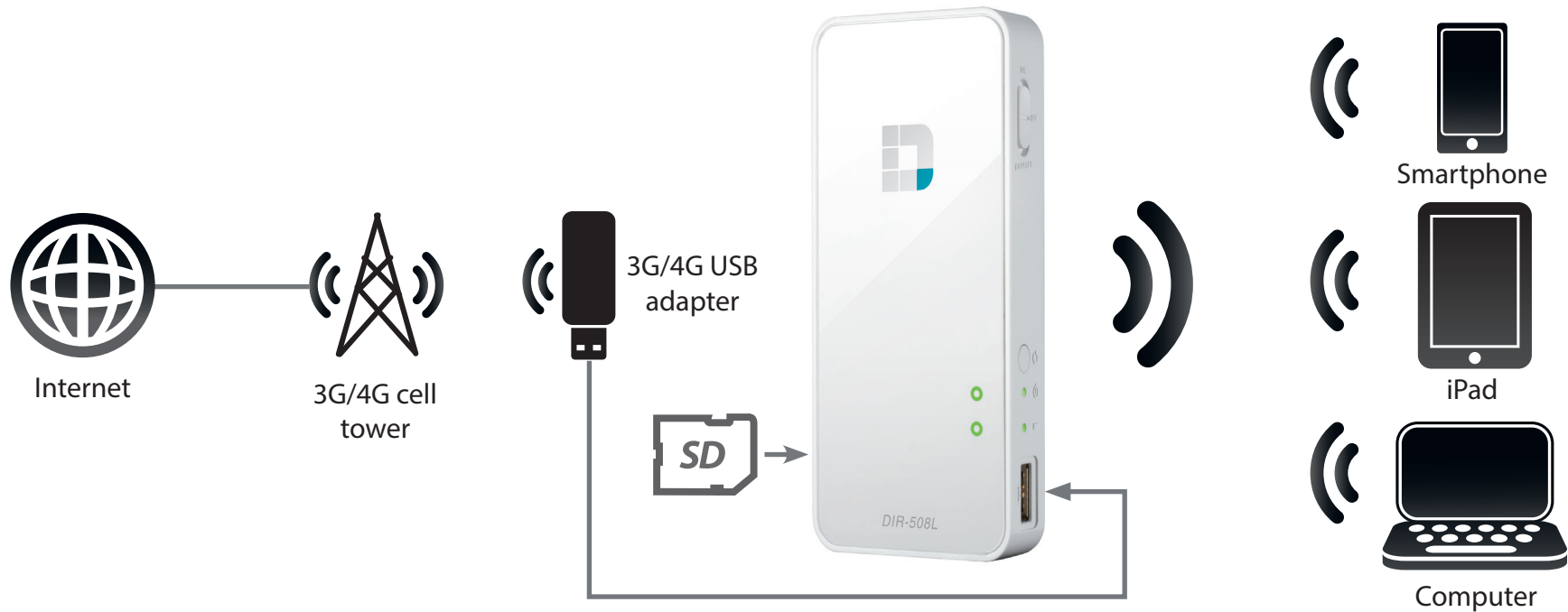

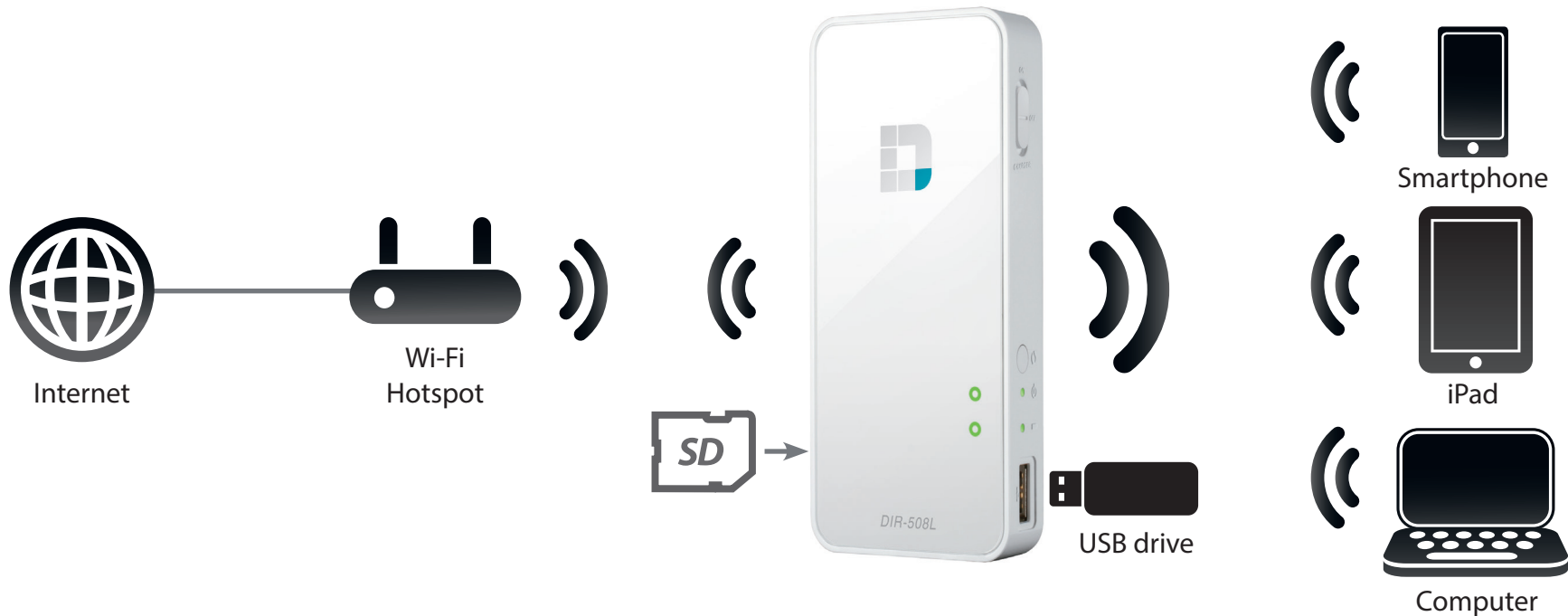

The DIR-508L can connect to an existing wireless network with an Internet connection, such as a hotspot at a hotel, airport, or coffee shop, allowing you to share that single connection with multiple wireless devices. 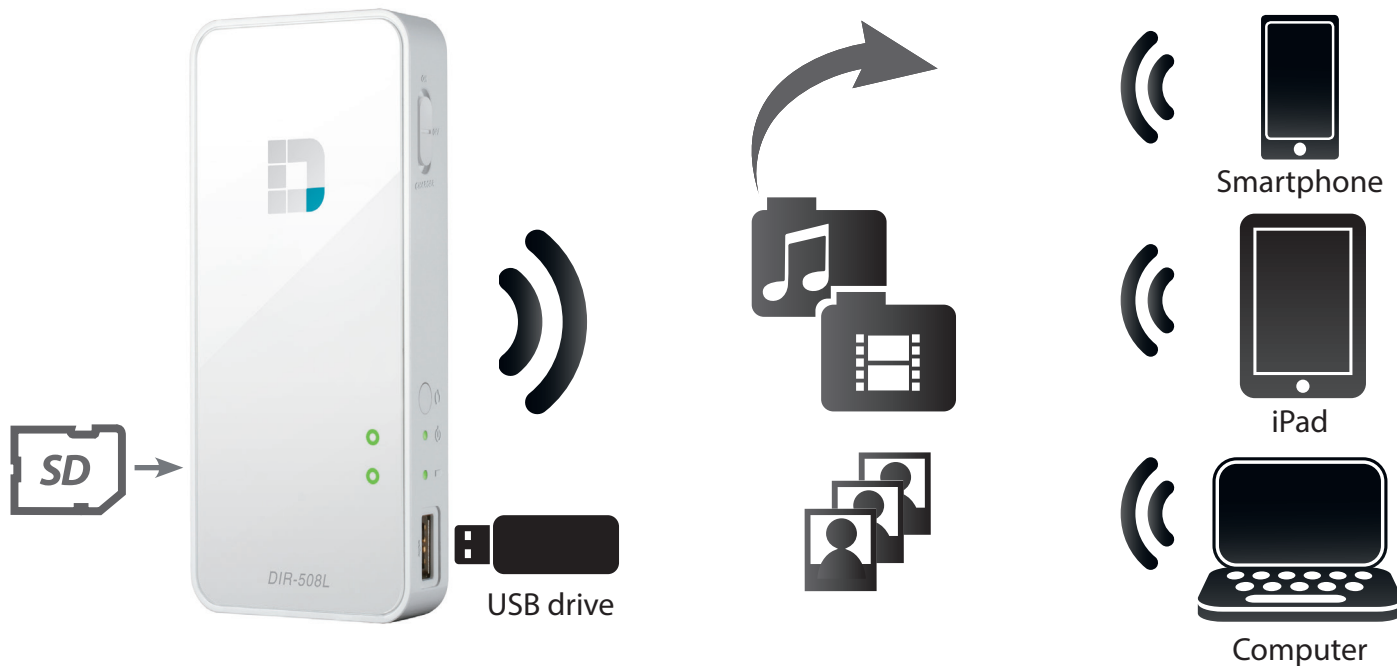

Even without Internet access, you can connect other Wi-Fi® devices wirelessly to the DIR-508L by creating a private network anywhere. You can then connect a USB drive or an SD card to locally share files with these devices on your wireless network by using the SharePort™ app. (Refer to [“SharePort/Storage Sharing” on page 38.](#))

Note: In public environments, it is highly recommended that you password protect the private LAN on the DIR-508L.



Wireless Installation Considerations

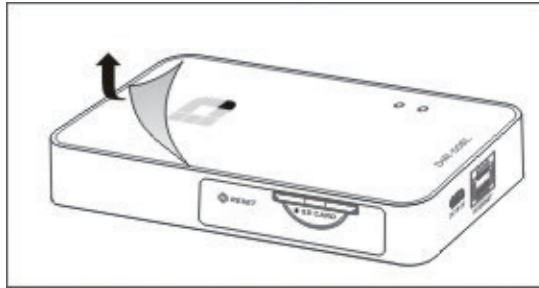
The D-Link wireless router lets you access your network using a wireless connection from virtually anywhere within the operating range of your wireless network. Keep in mind, however, that the number, thickness and location of walls, ceilings or other objects that the wireless signals must pass through may limit the range. Typical ranges vary depending on the types of materials and background radio frequency (RF) noise in your home or business. The key to maximizing wireless range is to follow these basic guidelines:

1. Keep the number of walls and ceilings between the D-Link router and other network devices to a minimum. Each wall or ceiling can reduce your adapter's range from 3-90 feet (1-30 meters). Position your devices so that the number of walls or ceilings is minimized.
2. Be aware of the direct line between network devices. A wall that is 1.5 feet thick (.5 meters), at a 45-degree angle appears to be almost 3 feet (1 meter) thick. At a 2-degree angle, it looks over 42 feet (14 meters) thick! Position devices so that the signal will travel straight through a wall or ceiling (instead of at an angle) for better reception.
3. Building Materials make a difference. A solid metal door or aluminum studs may have a negative effect on range. Try to position access points, wireless routers and computers so that the signal passes through drywall or open doorways. Materials and objects such as glass, steel, metal, walls with insulation, water (fish tanks), mirrors, file cabinets, brick and concrete will degrade your wireless signal.
4. Keep your product away (at least 3-6 feet or 1-2 meters) from electrical devices or appliances that generate RF noise.
5. If you are using 2.4GHz cordless phones or X-10 (wireless products such as ceiling fans, lights and home security systems), your wireless connection may degrade dramatically or drop completely. Make sure your 2.4GHz phone base is as far away from your wireless devices as possible. The base transmits a signal even if the phone is not in use.

Installation

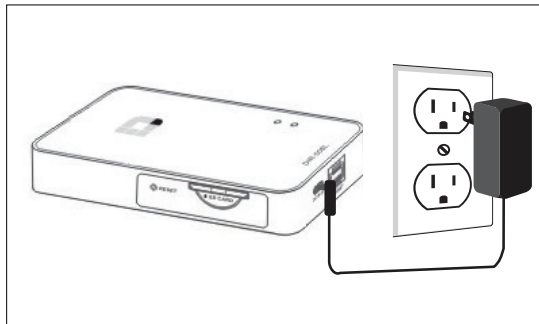
First Time Setup

1. Peel back the protective film from the top and bottom of the DIR-508L.



2. Charge the DIR-508L by connecting one end of the USB power adapter to the device and the other end to a wall outlet. Charge for at least four hours, or until the battery LED indicator is solid green or off.

Connecting your Equipment

Depending on your preferred mode of operation, the DIR-508L can be set up from any device with Wi-Fi and a web browser.

Note: Make sure the DIR-508L has been charged or is plugged in before using.

Using Broadband Ethernet: You will need an Ethernet cable connection to your cable or DSL modem.

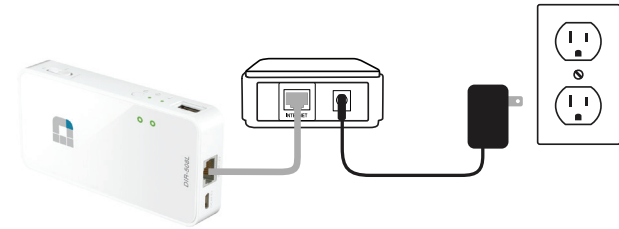
- Connect one end of an Ethernet cable to your modem and the other end to the Internet port on the DIR-508L.
- Slide the mode switch to the **On** position. Allow one minute for your DIR-508L to boot up.
- From your device's wireless utility, connect to the DIR-508L. The default Network name (SSID) is **DIR508L** with no password.

Using a 3G/4G USB Adapter: You will need a compatible 3G/4G USB adapter with an active SIM card.

- Plug the 3G/4G USB adapter into the USB port on the DIR-508L.

Note: Check the D-Link website for more information about compatible 3G/4G USB adapters.

Connecting to the DIR-508L Wirelessly

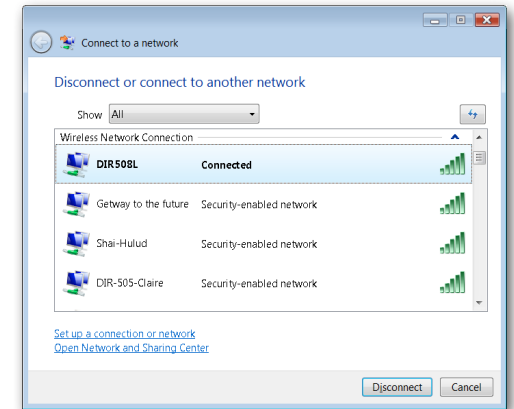
You can connect to the DIR-508L wirelessly from your mobile device or computer. Make sure the DIR-508L is charged or plugged in before using.

Turn on DIR-508L by sliding the On/Off/Charger switch to **On**. Allow one minute for the device to boot up.

From your device's wireless utility, connect to the DIR-508L. The default network name (SSID) is **DIR508L** with no password.

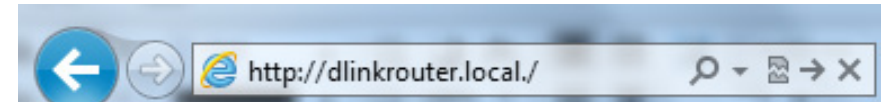

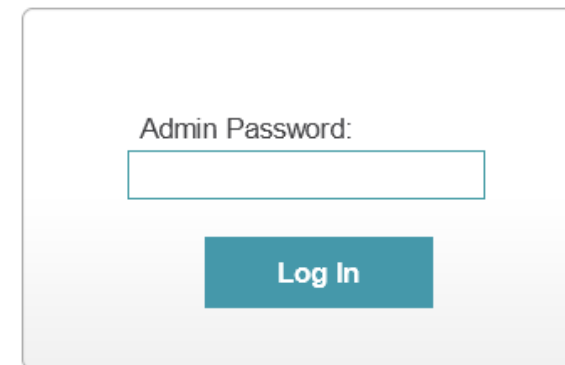

Once connected, open a web browser on your mobile device or computer and type **http://dlinkrouter.local/** (or **http://192.168.0.1**).

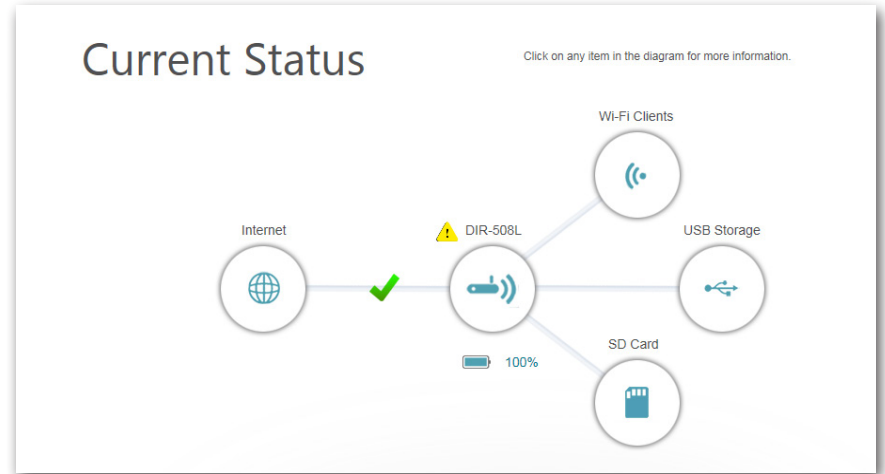




At the login screen, click **Log In**. The password should be left blank by default.

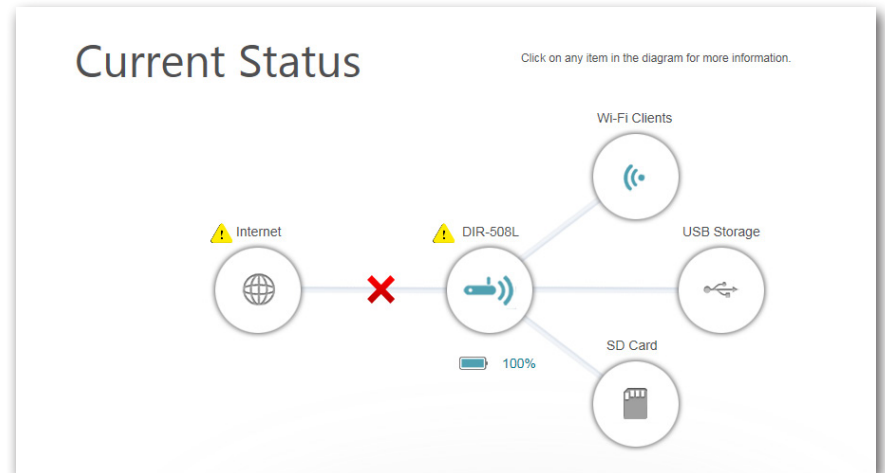


After logging in, you will see the *Current Status* page. If the Internet icon  is blue and there is a green  mark, the connection to the Internet is successful and the device is ready for use!

QRS Mobile App

From your iPad, iPhone, or Android device, go to the iTunes Store and search for 'D-Link'. Select **QRS Mobile** and then download it.

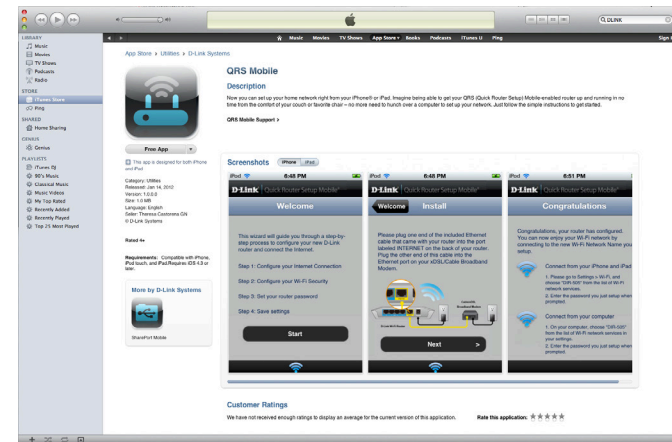

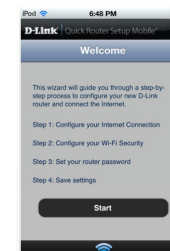
Step 2

Once your app is installed, you may now configure your router. Connect to the router wirelessly by going to your wireless utility on your device. Scan for the wireless network name (SSID) as listed on the supplied info card. Select and then enter your security password (Wi-Fi Password).

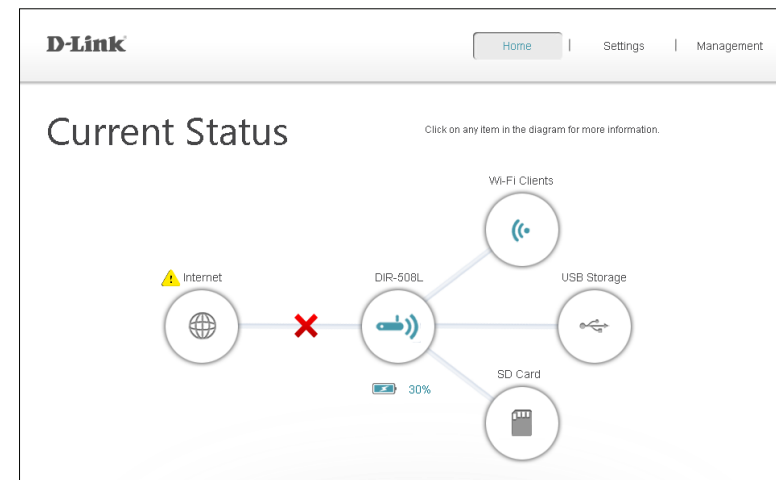
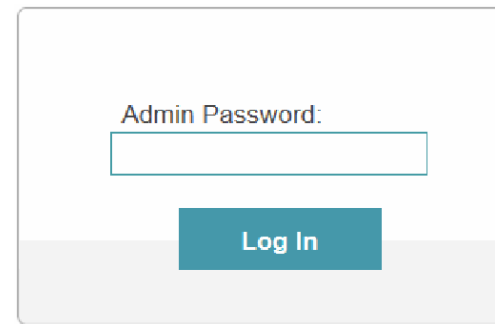
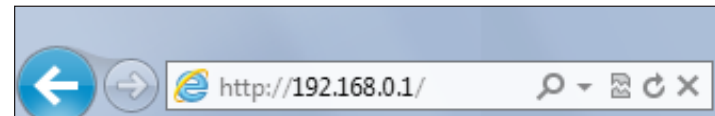
Once you connect to the router, launch the QRS mobile app and it will guide you through the installation of your router.



Web-based Configuration Utility



The DIR-508L has an auto-detection feature that will determine whether an Ethernet cable or 3G/4G USB adapter is currently connected to your device. If your DIR-508L needs additional configuration, you can click the **Internet** icon on the *Home* page to start the wizard. You may then proceed to configure your Internet connection for **Broadband Ethernet**, **3G/4G USB** adapter, or **Hotspot**.

1. To access the configuration utility of the DIR-508L, open a web browser and enter **http://dlinkrouter.local./** or **http://192.168.0.1** in the address bar.
2. If you did not create a **Password** for the Admin account, leave it blank by default. Click **Log In**.
3. The router's *Home* page will open. From this screen you can start a wizard or check on the *Current Status* of the DIR-508L. Use the bar at the top of the page for quick access to **Settings** and **Management** functions. (Refer to the next page for details about the *Home* page.)

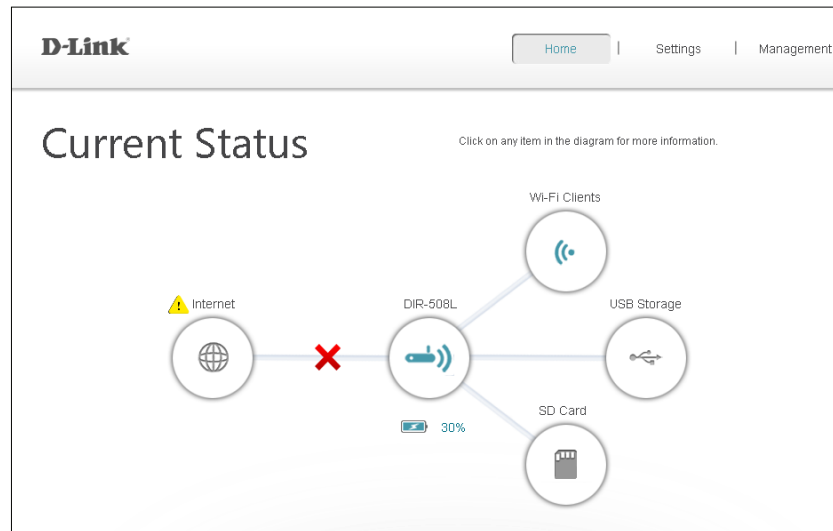


Home Page

The *Home* page contains a diagram with icons indicating the statuses of various functions and connections.

Internet: The *Internet* icon indicates the status of the Internet connection to the router. When it is gray there is no connection. It will be blue when a connection is established.

DIR-508L: The *Router* icon indicates the status of the Wi-Fi security on the DIR-508L. It is gray when it is unsecured. It will be blue when your Wi-Fi network name (SSID) and password have been set.

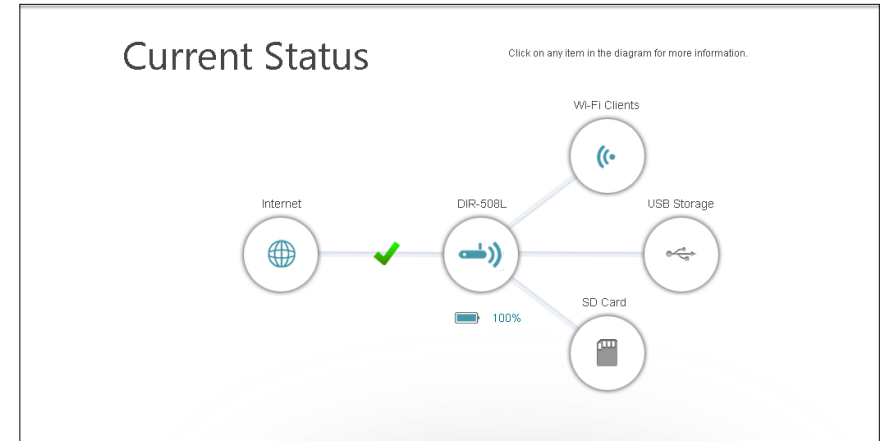
Wi-Fi Clients: The *Wi-Fi Clients* icon indicates when there are clients currently connected to the router via Wi-Fi. It will be blue when there are active connections.

USB Storage: The *USB Storage* icon will be blue if you are currently connected to a USB storage device.

SD Card: The *SD Card* icon will be blue if you have inserted an SD card.

Internet Connection

When you connect the DIR-508L to a cable modem using an Ethernet cable, you should be connected to the Internet. The *Internet* icon will be blue and the connection will have a check mark ✓.



If you connect the DIR-508L to an xDSL modem using an Ethernet cable and find that you can not access the Internet:

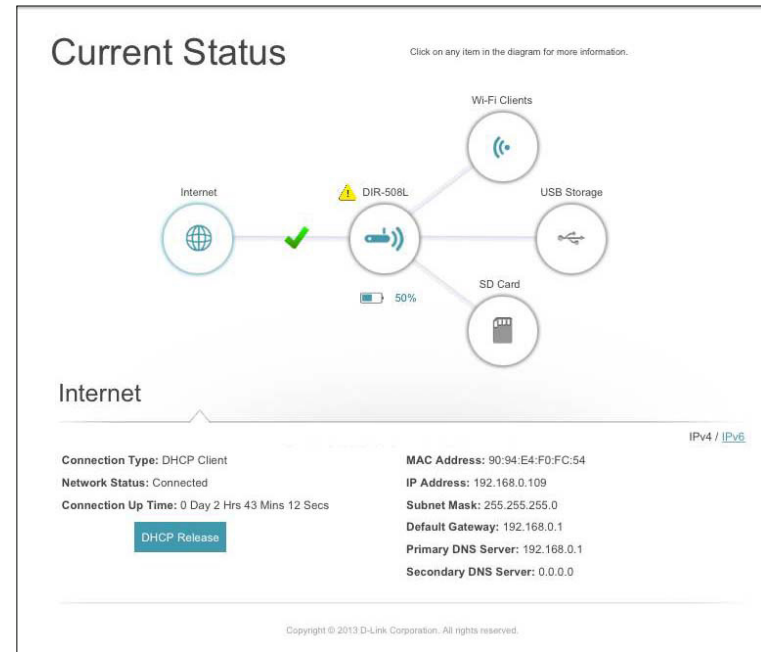
1. Find out if your ISP (Internet Service Provider) uses a PPPoE (Point to Point Protocol over Ethernet) connection. If the answer is yes, they can provide you with a PPPoE user name and password.
2. From the *Home* page, click on the **Internet** icon to start the wizard.
3. Enter the **Username** and **Password** provided by your ISP.
4. Click **Save**.

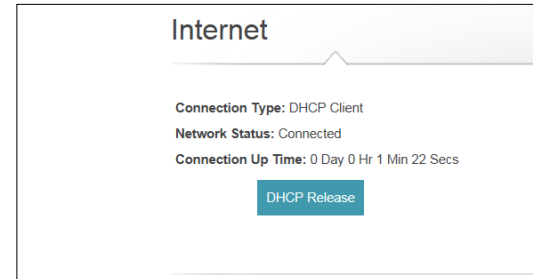

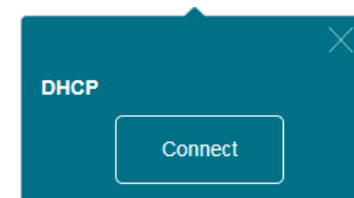

You can connect a compatible 3G/4G USB adapter to the USB port on the DIR-508L to access the Internet. Depending on your mobile service provider, you may need input for fields indicated below as optional. If so, contact your service provider to obtain the required information.

Click **Save** to store the settings.

APN: Enter your service provider's **APN** (Access Point Name).

When you are connected to the Internet via mobile broadband, the *Internet* icon should be blue and the link will have a green check mark ✓. Clicking on the **Internet** icon will display the *3G/4G Network* details. You may click on the **Disconnect** button to drop the 3G/4G connection .

Connection Type: Displays whether or not the *Connection Type* is a *3G/4G Network*.

Operator: Displays the country name and service provider.

Network Status: Displays the status of the connection to the 3G/4G network.

Connection Up Time: Displays the number of days, hours, minutes, and seconds the router has been connected to the 3G/4G network.

MAC Address: Displays the *MAC Address* of the 3G/4G adapter.

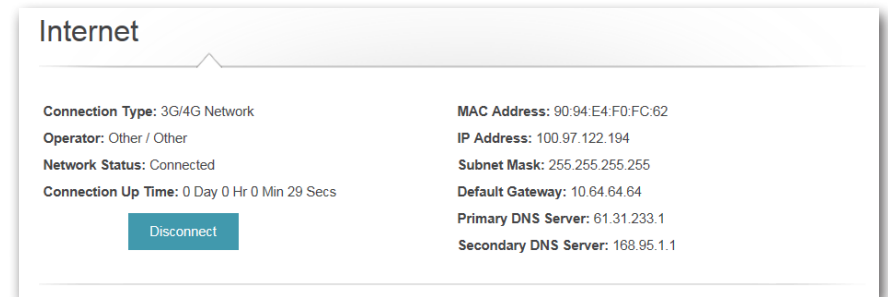
IP Address: Displays the *IP Address* provided to the DIR-508L.

Subnet Mask: Displays the *Subnet Mask* of the 3G/ 4G network.

Default Gateway: Displays the *Default Gateway* of the 3G/4G network.

Primary DNS Server: Displays the *Primary DNS Server* of the 3G/4G network.

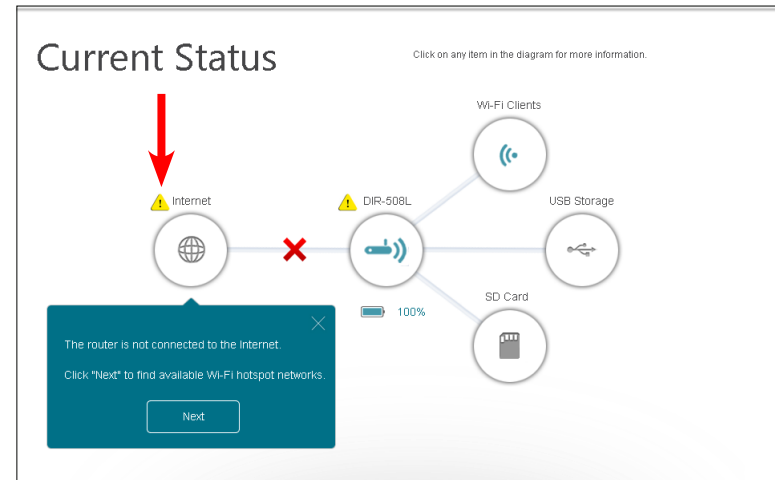

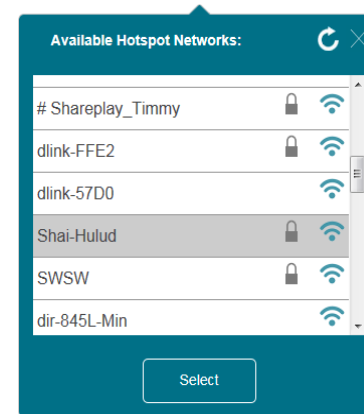
Wi-Fi Hotspot

For Internet access using a Wi-Fi hotspot, under *Current Status*, by the *Internet* icon, click on  to start the wizard.

A pop-up window will open that says, "The router is not connected to the Internet..." Click **Next** to locate an available Wi-Fi network.

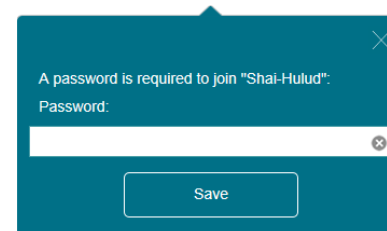


Select the *Hotspot Network* you wish to connect to. Click **Select**.



If you see a lock icon next to the network, you will be required to enter a **Password**. Click **Save**.

Wait while the router connects to the network.



When you are connected, under *Current Status*, the *Internet* icon will be blue and you will see a green check mark ✓. Click on it to see details of the connection.

Connection Type: Will say *Hotspot Client* when the *Connection Type* is a hotspot network connection.

Network Status: Displays the status of the connection to the hotspot network.

Hotspot Name (SSID): Displays the *SSID* or the name of the hotspot network.

Password: Displays the *Password* of the hotspot network.

Connection Up Time: Displays the number of days, hours, minutes, and seconds the router has been connected to the hotspot network.

MAC Address: Displays the *MAC Address* of the hotspot router.

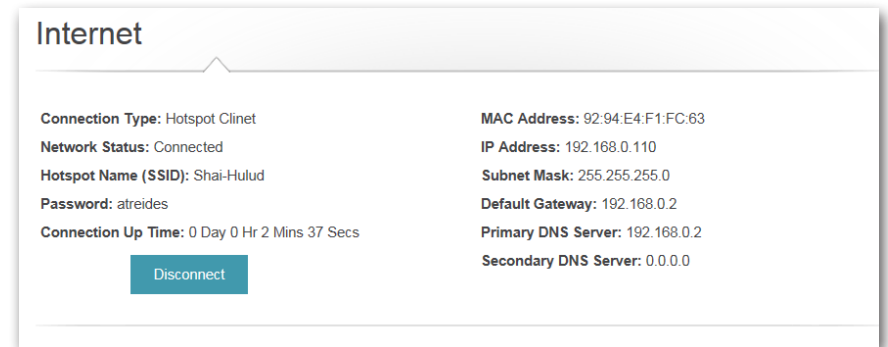
IP Address: Displays the *IP Address* provided to the DIR-508L.

Subnet Mask: Displays the *Subnet Mask* of the hotspot network.

Default Gateway: Displays the *Default Gateway* of the hotspot network.

Primary DNS Server: Displays the *Primary DNS Server* of the hotspot network.


Secondary DNS Server: Displays the *Secondary DNS Server* of the hotspot network.



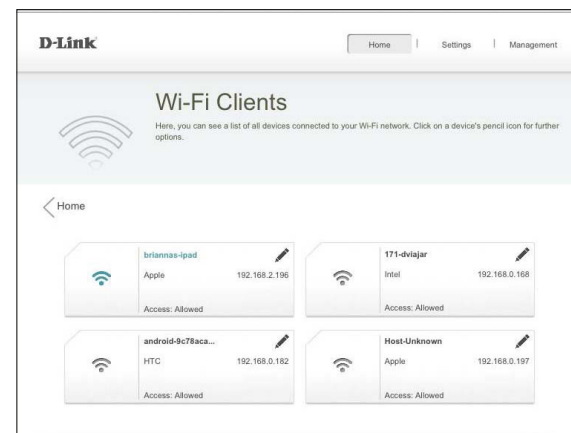
From the *Home* page, you can see when there are clients connected to the router via Wi-Fi. The *Wi-Fi Clients* icon will be blue when there are active connections.

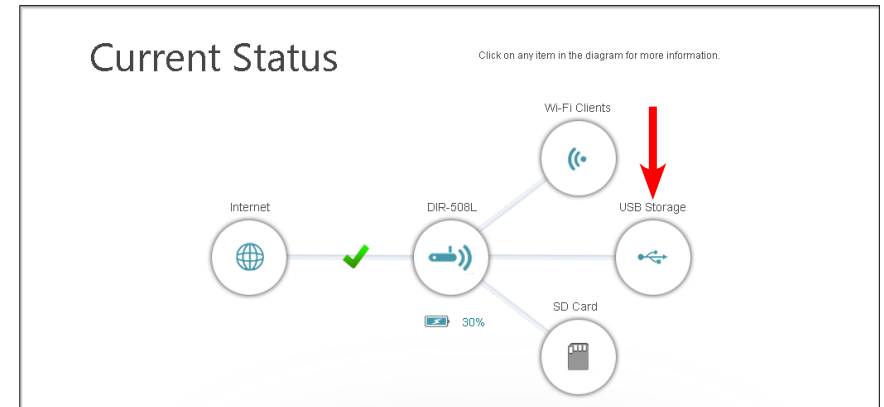

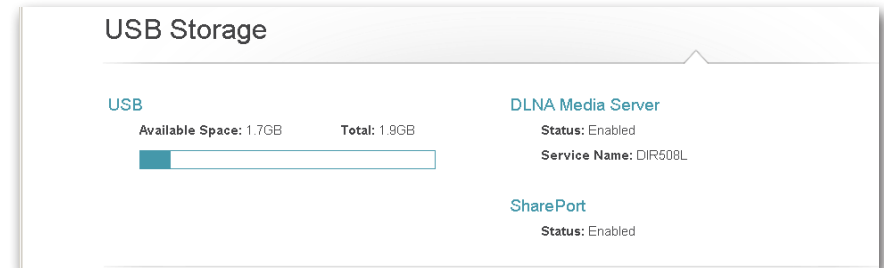

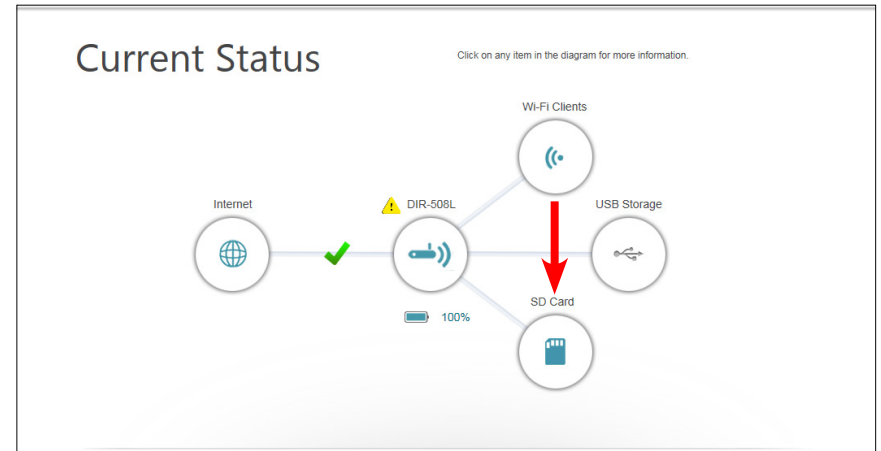

Settings

Internet Profiles

Internet Profiles are networks you want the device to remember and reconnect to in the future. A profile is created automatically the first time you connect to a particular network. The *Internet Profiles* are added to a profile list that you can later edit.

From the bar at the top of the *Home* page, go to **Settings** > **Internet Profiles** to configure your Internet Connection profiles.



You may add, edit, and delete profiles from this page.

Add a Profile:

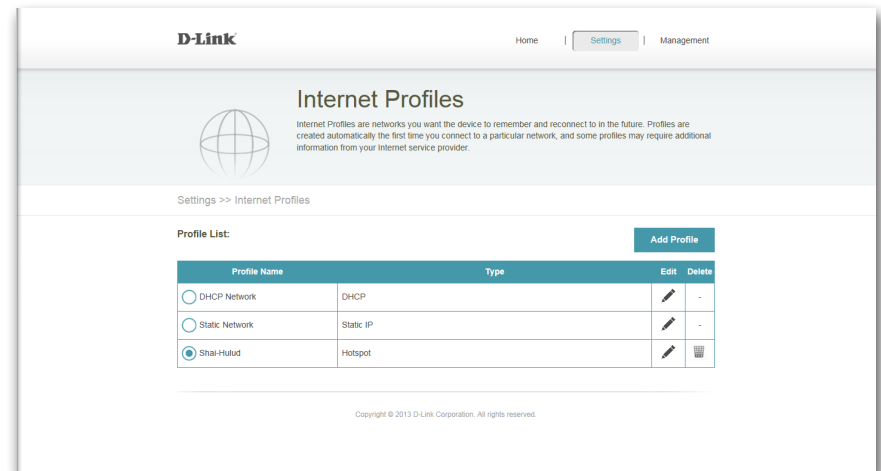
1. Click **Add Profile**.
2. On the next screen, select a **Connection Type** from the drop down menu.
3. Fill in the required information under the *Connection Type*. If required, click on **Advanced Settings...** to fill in details required by the ISP.
4. Click **Save** to store the profile.

Edit a Profile:

Click on the **pencil** icon next to the profile you want to edit.

Delete a Profile:

Click on the **trash** icon next to the profile you want to delete.



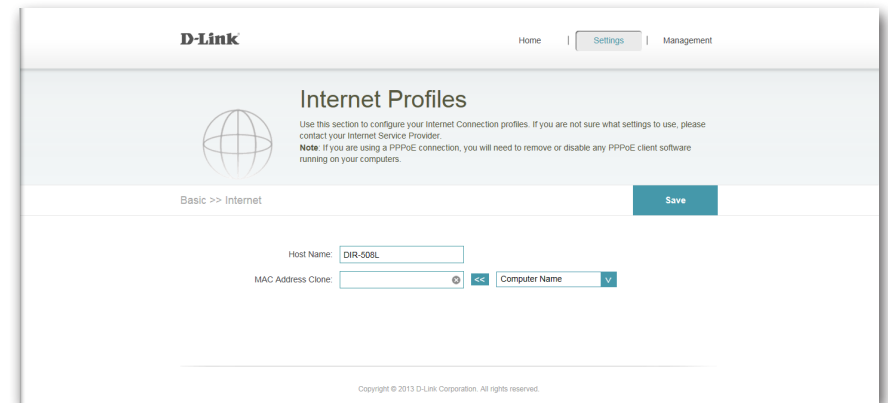
DHCP

When you **Add a Profile**, you must select a **Connection Type**. Depending on your connection method and your ISP (Internet Service Provider), you may select the default **DHCP** (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) profile. This will allow your router to automatically obtain IP Address information from your ISP and connect to the Internet.

Host Name: Enter the name of your host.

MAC Address Clone: Type in the *MAC Address* or select the client from the drop-down menu and click <<.

Click **Save** to store the settings.



xDSL Broadband (PPPoE)

When you **Add a Profile**, you must select a **Connection Type**. Depending on your ISP, you may need to configure the PPPoE (Point to Point Protocol over Ethernet) settings in order to connect to the Internet. PPPoE is typically used for DSL services. Request a PPPoE user name and password from your ISP so you can create a **xDSL Broadband (PPPoE)** Internet Profile.

Profile Name: Enter a name for this profile.

Username: Enter the **Username** assigned by your ISP.

Password: Enter the **Password** assigned by your ISP.

Advanced Settings

Address Mode: Select **Static IP** if your ISP assigned you the IP address, subnet mask, gateway, and DNS Server addresses. Otherwise, select **Dynamic**.

- **Open In...:** Tap to use a third-party app to open the file.

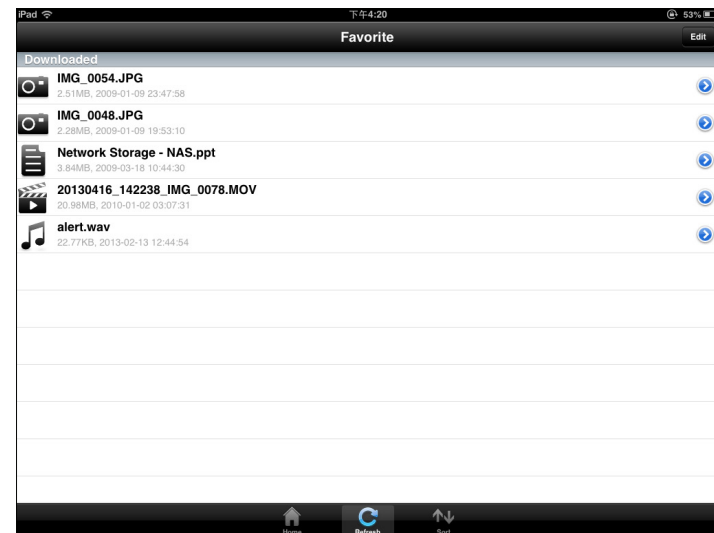
Options from the bottom menu bar:

Folder

Connecting a Wireless Client

WPS Button

The easiest and most secure way to connect your wireless devices to the router is Wi-Fi Protected Setup (WPS). Most wireless devices, such as wireless adapters, media players, Blu-ray DVD players, wireless printers and cameras, will have a WPS button (or a software utility with WPS) that you can press to connect to the DIR-508L router. Please refer to your user manual for the wireless device you want to connect to make sure you understand how to enable WPS, then follow the steps below:

Step 1 - Press the WPS button on the DIR-508L for about one second. The Power/Status LED will start to blink.



Step 2 - Within two minutes, press the WPS button on your wireless client (or launch the software utility and start the WPS process).

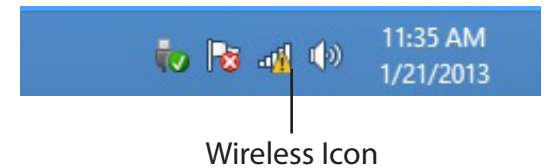

The DIR-508L supports Wi-Fi protection, referred to as WCN 2.0 in Windows Vista®. The following instructions for setting this up depends on whether you are using Windows Vista® to configure the router or third party software.

When you first set up the router, Wi-Fi protection is disabled and unconfigured. To enjoy the benefits of Wi-Fi protection, the router must be both enabled and configured. There are three basic methods to accomplish this: use Windows Vista's built-in support for WCN 2.0, use software provided by a third party, or manually configure.

If you are running Windows Vista®, log into the router and click the **Enable** box in the **Basic > Wireless** section. Use the Current PIN that is displayed on the **Advanced > Wi-Fi Protected Setup** section or choose to click the **Generate New PIN** button or **Reset PIN to Default** button.



If you are using third party software to set up Wi-Fi Protection, carefully follow the directions. When you are finished, proceed to the next section to set up the newly-configured router.

Troubleshooting

This chapter provides solutions to problems that can occur during the installation and operation of the DIR-508L. Read the following descriptions if you are having problems.

1. Why can't I access the web-based configuration utility?

When entering the IP address of the D-Link router (for example: **http://192.168.0.1** or **http://dlinkrouter.local./**), you are not connecting to a website nor do you have to be connected to the Internet. The device has the utility built-in to a ROM chip in the device itself. Your computer must be on the same IP subnet to connect to the web-based utility.

- Make sure you have an updated Java-enabled web browser. We recommend the following:
 - Internet Explorer® 8 and higher
 - Firefox
 - Chrome
 - Safari 5 and higher
- Verify physical connectivity by checking for solid link lights on the device. If you do not get a solid link light, try using a different cable or connect to a different port on the device if possible. If the computer is turned off, the link light may not be on.
- Disable any Internet security software running on the computer. Software firewalls, such as Zone Alarm, Black Ice, Sygate, Norton Personal Firewall, and Windows firewall, may block access to the configuration pages. Check the help files included with your firewall software for more information on disabling or configuring it.

- Configure your Internet settings:
 - Go to **Start > Settings > Control Panel**. Double-click the **Internet Options** icon. From the **Security** tab, click the button to restore the settings to their defaults.
 - Click the **Connection** tab and set the dial-up option to **Never Dial a Connection**. Click the **LAN Settings** button. Make sure nothing is checked. Click **OK**.
 - Go to the **Advanced** tab and click the button to restore these settings to their defaults. Click **OK** three times.
 - Close your web browser (if open) and open it.
- Access the web management. Open your web browser and enter the IP address of your D-Link router in the address bar. This should open the login page for your web management.
- If you still cannot access the configuration, unplug the power to the router for 10 seconds and plug back in. Wait about 30 seconds and try accessing the configuration. If you have multiple computers, try connecting using a different computer.

2. What can I do if I forgot my password?

If you forgot your password, you must reset your router. Unfortunately, this process will change all your settings back to the factory defaults.

To reset the DIR-508L, locate the reset button (hole) next to the SD card slot. With the router powered on, use a paperclip to hold the button down for five seconds. Release the button and the router will go through its reboot process. Wait about 45 seconds to access the router. The default IP address is **http://dlinkrouter.local./** or **192.168.0.1**. When logging in, the username is **admin** and leave the password field blank.

3. Why can't I connect to certain sites or send and receive e-mails when connecting through my router?

If you are having a problem sending or receiving e-mail, or connecting to secure sites such as eBay, banking sites and Hotmail, we suggest lowering the MTU in increments of ten (Ex. 1492, 1482, 1472, etc).

To find the proper MTU Size, you'll have to do a special ping of the destination you're trying to go to. A destination could be another computer, or a URL.

- Click on **Start**, in the box type **cmd**, and press **Enter**.
- Once the window opens, you'll need to do a special ping. Use the following syntax:

ping [url] [-f] [-l] [MTU value]

You should start at 1472 and work your way down by 10 each time. Once you get a reply, go up by two (2) until you get a fragmented packet. Take that value and add 28 to the value to account for the various TCP/IP headers. For example, let's say that 1452 was the proper value, the actual MTU size would be 1480, which is the optimum for the network we're working with (1452+28=1480).

Once you find your MTU, you can now configure your router with the proper MTU size.

To change the MTU rate on your router follow the steps below:

- Open your browser and enter the IP address of your router (**192.168.0.1** or **http://dlinkrouter.local**) and click **OK**.
- Enter your username (**admin**) and password (**blank by default**). Click **OK** to enter the web configuration page for the device.
- Click on **Setup** and then click **Manual Configure**.
- To change the MTU, enter the number in the MTU field and click **Save Settings** to save your settings.
- Test your e-mail. If changing the MTU does not resolve the problem, continue changing the MTU in increments of ten.

Wireless Basics

D-Link wireless products are based on industry standards to provide easy-to-use and compatible high-speed wireless connectivity within your home, business or public access wireless networks. Strictly adhering to the IEEE standard, the D-Link wireless family of products will allow you to securely access the data you want, when and where you want it. You will be able to enjoy the freedom that wireless networking delivers.

A wireless local area network (WLAN) is a cellular computer network that transmits and receives data with radio signals instead of wires. Wireless LANs are used increasingly in both home and office environments, and public areas such as airports, coffee shops and universities. Innovative ways to utilize WLAN technology are helping people to work and communicate more efficiently. Increased mobility and the absence of cabling and other fixed infrastructure have proven to be beneficial for many users.

Wireless users can use the same applications they use on a wired network. Wireless adapter cards used on laptop and desktop systems support the same protocols as Ethernet adapter cards.

Under many circumstances, it may be desirable for mobile network devices to link to a conventional Ethernet LAN in order to use servers, printers or an Internet connection supplied through the wired LAN. A Wireless Router is a device used to provide this link.

What is Wireless?

Wireless, or Wi-Fi, technology is another way of connecting your computer to the network without using wires. Wi-Fi uses radio frequency to connect wirelessly, so you have the freedom to connect computers anywhere in your home or office network.

Why D-Link Wireless?

D-Link is the worldwide leader and award winning designer, developer and manufacturer of networking products. D-Link delivers the performance you need at a price you can afford. D-Link has all the products you need to build your network.

How does wireless work?

Wireless works similar to how cordless phone work, through radio signals to transmit data from one point A to point B. But wireless technology has restrictions as to how you can access the network. You must be within the wireless network range area to be able to connect your computer. There are two different types of wireless networks Wireless Local Area Network (WLAN) and Wireless Personal Area Network (WPAN).

Wireless Local Area Network (WLAN)

In a Wireless Local Area Network, a device called an Access Point (AP) connects computers to the network. The access point has a small antenna attached to it, which allows it to transmit data back and forth over radio signals. With an indoor access point, the signal can travel up to 300 feet. With an outdoor access point, the signal can reach out up to 30 miles to serve places like manufacturing plants, industrial locations, college and high school campuses, airports, golf courses and many other outdoor venues.

Wireless Personal Area Network (WPAN)

Bluetooth is the industry standard wireless technology used for WPAN. Bluetooth devices in WPAN operate in a range up to 30 feet away.

Compared to WLAN the speed and wireless operation range are both less than WLAN, but in return it doesn't use nearly as much power which makes it ideal for personal devices, such as mobile phones, PDAs, headphones, laptops, speakers and other devices that operate on batteries.

Who uses wireless?

Wireless technology has become so popular in recent years that almost everyone is using it. Whether it's for home, office or business, D-Link has a wireless solution for it.

Where is wireless used?

Wireless technology is expanding everywhere not just at home or office. People like the freedom of mobility and it's becoming so popular that more and more public facilities now provide wireless access to attract people. The wireless connection in public places is usually called "hotspots."

Using a D-Link Cardbus Adapter with your laptop, you can access the hotspot to connect to the Internet from remote locations like: Airports, Hotels, Coffee Shops, Libraries, Restaurants and Convention Centers.

A wireless network is easy to setup, but if you're installing it for the first time it could be quite a task not knowing where to start. That's why we've put together a few setup steps and tips to help you through the process of setting up a wireless network.

Tips

Here are a few things to keep in mind when you install a wireless network:

Centralize your router or Access Point

Make sure you place the router/access point in a centralized location within your network for the best performance. Try to place the router/access point as high as possible in the room so the signal gets dispersed throughout your home. If you have a two-story home, you may need a repeater to boost the signal to extend the range.

Eliminate Interference

Place home appliances, such as cordless telephones, microwaves and televisions, as far away as possible from the router/access point. This will significantly reduce any interference that the appliances might cause since they operate on same frequency.

Security

Don't let you next-door neighbors or intruders connect to your wireless network. Secure your wireless network by turning on the WPA or WEP security feature on the router. Refer to product manual for detail information on how to set it up.

Networking Basics

Check your IP address


After you install your new D-Link adapter, by default, the TCP/IP settings should be set to obtain an IP address from a DHCP server (i.e. wireless router) automatically. To verify your IP address, please follow the steps below:

Click on **Start > Run**. In the run box type **cmd** and click **OK**. (Windows® 7/Vista® users type **cmd** in the **Start Search** box.)

At the prompt, type **ipconfig** and press **Enter**.

This will display the IP address, subnet mask and the default gateway of your adapter.

If the address is 0.0.0.0, check your adapter installation, security settings and the settings on your router. Some firewall software programs may block a DHCP request on newly installed adapters.

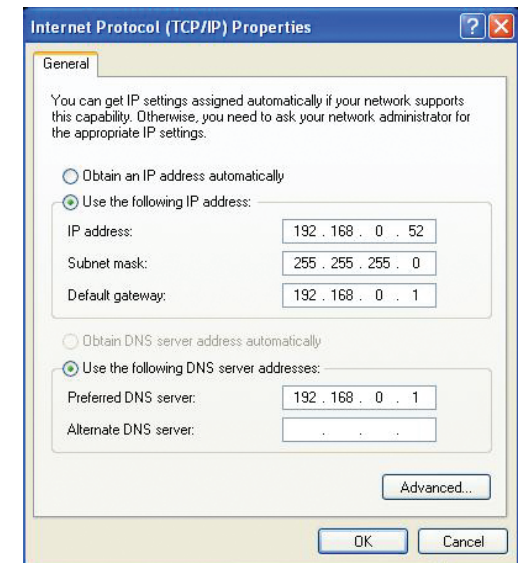
